LOCAL STUDIES MATERIAL

A group of Surrey archivists, led by Dr David Robinson, County Archivist, are examining the best ways of making local studies material as conveniently available as possible, while at the same time keeping rare and valuable books and documents safe. NATIONAL REGISTER OF ARCHIVES

An organisation that appears to be less well known to Researchers than it merits, is the National Register of Archives. This was set up in 1945 to collect and disseminate information about manuscript sources for British history, outside the Public Records. It covers the papers of people of note, family and estates, businesses, church, local authorities, societies and organisations generally.

There are two main indices - Personal and Companies. Of the first they hold references to men and women of importance in every field of British history - arts, sciences, military, naval, governmental and religious. The companies index covers the fields of industry, mining, transport, commerce and finance.

In many cases the Register will hold copies of material available: otherwise they will be able to indicate precisely where the information is held, giving appropriate reference details.

The address of the Register is: Quality House, Quality Court, Chancery Lane, London WC2 1HP, telephone 071-242-1198. The Register is open to all - no render's ticket is necessary. Hours 9.30am to 5pm, Monday to Friday.

September 18 - Dixon Hall, Leatherhead Institute. 7.30 for 8pm "The Bells and the Bridge of Leatherhead".

This year marks the 200th anniversary of the installation of eight bells in the parish church of St Mary and St Nicholas. Alan Smith, Captain of the bellringers, will tell the history of the bells.

(Friday, 18 September is also the opening day of a Festival by the church to celebrate this bi-centenary. There will be guided tours of the bellringing chamber, which is not usually open to visitors, between 10am and 4pm. - an excellent opportunity for a preview of Alan Smith's talk. }

The second talk of the evening will be by Dr Derek Renn about Leatherhead's bridge over the Mole which had a major restoration 210 years ago. The bridge has an interesting history which Dr Renn will describe.

October 22 - Ashtead Peace Memorial Hall, 7.30 for 8pm 2 "Ashtead Past and Present"

Members will remember the interesting (and amusing) evening that Michael Gale presented two years ago. This talk will give yet more information about the Ashtead of the past.

November 20 - "Joseph Payne", a talk by Richard Aldrich

Who was Joseph Payne? Leatherhead should feel proud of being his home for over twenty years from 1845-1866, but few people nowadays will even have beard of him. His local claim to fame is that he was founder and Headmaster of a boys' Grammar School which was at the Mansion (now the public library) in Leatherhead from 1845 until about 1875. But apart from that, he was probably the most eminent and celebrated educationalist of his day and was appointed as the first Professor of Education in 1872. He was a remarkable man with very advanced views of education, and Mr Aldrich, who is President of the UK History of Education Society, will be describing the life of this much-neglected former resident of Leatherhead.

PAST EVENTS Visit to Ripley

The afternoon walk round Ripley took place on 24 June, a beautful summer's day. John Slatford, Chairman, and Audrey Sykes, Sccretary of the Send and Ripley History Society, were our guides and showed us some of the local buildings of historical interest.

Few would realise the significance of Ripley in naval terms, although pub names such as "Anchor" and "Ship" should give a clue, for Ripley was a stop on the road used by naval men travelling to and from Portsmouth. (We were told to disregard the story that Nelson and Lady Hamilton stayed at the Talbot Hotel, which is just as well as our own myth had them staying at the Burford Bridge Hotel.)

It is not surprising that many buildings date from Georgian times, but some are much older, the earliest being Vintage Cottage, 1400. Some buildings have received listed status as a result of the initiative of the Society. They are all readily identifiable - it was good to have them pointed out.

Of particular Society interest was the gift to them by the National Westminster Bank of a small building no longer in use. This was moved by crane and transported to a site near the Village Hall where it will be developed as a museum. While enjoying tea at the hall we saw a photographic record of this interesting (and expensive) operation. We saw the building on its new foundations. Much work lies ahead for the Society.

We are most grateful to them for an informative and enjoyable tour which gave some idea of what remains to be seen another day.

Wey Navigation Project Visit
