1951-2001 THEATRE AT POLESDEN LACEY



The first production in 1951 - 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' No scenery, no covers for the orchestra.

At the time of going to press the Polesden Lacey Festival, known until recently as 'The Open Air Theatre', (PLOAT), has been given the go-ahead to perform in June. Efforts to contain the Foot and Mouth Disease have affected most of us, National Trust properties and nearly all footpaths on the North Downs were closed. Surrey was fortunate that by late April it was free from this terrible affliction and Polesden Lacey was reopened, though the more extensive walks are still closed. Booking for the Festival was opened on this special year - 50 years since the theatre performed its first production.

But to start at the beginning - through the enthusiasm and dedication of Betty Harrison of the Bookham Community Association, a pageant production of Merrie England was performed in the grounds of Polesden Lacey in 1949. With the success of the experiment, the BCA sought for a way of celebrating the 1951 Festival of Britain and conceived the idea of building a permanent outdoor theatre for 'the people'.

It was ambitious in concept, but did not lack willing volunteers, and preparations began in 1950 to build the open air stage we recognise today – set against the lovely background of Surrey Hills. Shakespeare's A Midsummer Night's Dream was chosen for the inaugural performance, which took place on 30th July 1951. The tradition of Shakespeare at Polesden was born.

The theatres reputation grew steadily due to the unstinting commitment of Elsie Green, who became its Resident Director from 1953 until her retirement in 1988. With success established, the concept of the season began to change. A second week was introduced to include the work of other dramatists, and then, by extending to a third week, a wider variety of entertainment became possible. Gilbert and Sullivan, light operetta, grand opera, ballet, classical concerts, jazz, big bands, music hall, folk dancing and a spectacular firework finale have been enjoyed at the festival.

A Shakespeare production has always been performed, and to celebrate the 50th birthday of the theatre, Peter Halo, himself a veteran actor and director, is to direct a special production of 'The Taming of the Shrew' with a cast including many previous Polesden actors and actresses.

With major changes in the overall programme and the introduction of more concerts and jazz, two years ago it was decided to change the name to 'Polesden Lacey Festival' as this would more appropriately describe the choice of entertainment for the programme.

For several weeks, with the closure of National Trust properties, the open air concerts in Polesden Lacey were in danger of being cancelled. Fortunately, we have had a reprieve and our 50th session will go ahead.

I am grateful to Sheila Warner, a member of the theatre committee, for writing most of the front page article and to Tim Jenkins for giving me the photograph of the first production on a floppy – such is modern technology! Tim's mother was wardrobe mistress during the early years and he has memorabilia from year 1 to 49. Sheila would be very pleased to hear from any one in the photograph, on stage or in the orchestra (374567).

Was it by chance that Howard of Effingham chose 'Oliver' for their recently performed musical? A sell out for 4 nights, it was a superb performance, and six of the cast have been chosen to be in the Polesden production. However, Polesden will not be able to match the 120 members of cast on stage for the finale.

Bookham offers a wide variety of interests as shown by the list of clubs in the Bulletin. Some clubs are finding it difficult to continue functioning since a chairperson, secretary or treasurer are not coming forward to replace those who have served for many years. The Residents Association is in danger of closing unless volunteer officers are found. The BRA performs a vital role in Bookham. They are in touch with Mole Valley Council, our MP and the police performing quite a different role from the BCA. Bookham will be a much poorer community if the BRA ceases to exist. If this happens, I am concerned for the long term future of the BCA. No Bulletin. No Old Barn Hall!

After many months of wet weather, causing potholes in our roads, resulting in expensive repairs for many motorists, let us hope that we have a good summer, a sunny Village Day, but not too hot.





In common with many organisations these days it is very difficult to persuade anyone to take on the role of committee members, let alone positions of secretary, treasurer or chairman. I believe that the BRA play an important role in the life of the Bookhams, although it is very specialised compared to the Bookham Community Association. We wish Brenda good luck in her efforts to solve their problem. From the BCA point of view we are still trying to find a replacement for Beryl Warne. our secretary, and as the year passes the situation will become more difficult. So please think about the situation and give us a call. At the latter part of last year we lost the services of Ray Loynes after many years of devoted service. However you will probably see a new face around at the Barn Hall. He is Alan Clark and has not long returned to this country after many years in New Zealand. We welcome him back to Bookham.

At this time of year we are of course thinking about our main fund raising event of the year, which is Village Day. During this last year there has been a considerable amount of money spent on the halls due to refurbishments which have been necessary to maintain the building, and so this Village Week will be very important to us. Hopefully the rain supply will be exhausted by June and we shall have some fine weather to ensure the day's success. A full programme of events is published in this Bulletin covering both Village Day and the following week but a few highlights are listed below. The theme this year is 'Fantasy Worlds' and the imagination could run wild with both

As usual we shall have two other judges for the procession to decide the best entry for the Peter Hancock Cup. Our judges are Mole Valley Councillor Tony Moore and his wife and as I am sure they already realise it will be a difficult task.

Our much appreciated sponsor for the day is T.W.White & Sons. In addition our thanks go to the traders of Bookham for supporting us by advertising in the Village Week Programme and for their generous donations of raffle prizes for the day and the following week.

Apart from the activities of the day, the following week will have events during each day, ending with the usual Jazz evening on the Friday evening. We look forward to seeing you on the 16th June and during the following week and hope you will have an enjoyable time.

BOOKHAM'S NEW RECTOR

Penny Fleming was inducted Rector of St Nicolas Church, Bookham on 25th April. So who is she? My first impression was of a warm people-person with a soft Scottish accent. Penny told me that she comes from the west coast of Scotland, but her mother was English and Penny moved south after studying at Glasgow university. She began her career as a primary school teacher but later taught French and German in secondary schools. As she spent spare time helping out in her local parish she began to think about going into ministry and around that period the Anglican church was considering women becoming deacons. Penny trained for two years at Westcott House in Cambridge, was made a deacon at Guildford Cathedral in 1989 and took up a curacy at The Bourne in Farnham. Bristol was the first

diocese to ordain women priests but Guildford soon followed, so Penny felt it was an historic occasion when, along with many others, she was ordained as priest in April 1994. Afterwards she became Vicar of Wotton and Holmbury and in 1999 a rural dean. She has also been vocations advisor for the diocese, helping others think about their ministry. Penny has a daughter and twin sons — all married or about to be — and one grandchild. Sadly she is separated from her husband.

I asked Penny what she enjoys most about her work. 'Oh, the worship! And meeting with people at special points in their lives – births, marriages, even deaths. It's a privilege to do what you can to help. And then it's wonderful when people's faith

takes off and expands – I believe people have moments when it suddenly becomes more real and it's great to be around then and to help. I love words, which helps when writing sermons – and it's great to have a job when you're expected to read! No, I don't just read theology. I have a great weakness for crime novels and enjoy modern literature but my all-time favourite is Jane Austen. To think that the job description didn't even mention that she stayed here in Bookham, with her Uncle, the Rector!

What does Penny like least about her job? She pulled a face. 'Meetings, long ones, where nothing constructive happens.

And raising money. Yes, that's important but it wasn't part of my thinking in deciding to do this work.'

What would she want to say to the community of Bookham? 'I look forward to meeting as many of you as I can and to making a positive difference by my presence here. I'm eager to learn more about how your lively community works. In a 'village' of ten thousand it takes hard work to make such a thing happen. People always worry about what is happening for young people and about whether "care in the community" works. I'd hope the churches can contribute, for example our pastoral assistants will visit anyone in need, not just Anglicans.

St Nicolas now has two women clergy and I asked Penny

how people had reacted to this. She laughed. 'Some people assume sparks must fly between two women, but I've known some stormy relationships between male vicars and curates! A man from outside this parish said that Bookham would be "flooded with women". Would this individual have used the same expression of men? But I don't consider gender to be divisive. I'm dedicated to minister to male and female alike and have never put off the men in my churches! Besides which, St Nicolas has a male lay-reader and a male non-stipendary priest.'

What are Penny's priorities in Bookham? 'I was given them by the PCC. We're keen to be even more

involved in the community and to be a real spiritual resource to our own members as well as to new ones. Many people are looking for spiritual answers though they don't always think to look in church. And we want to work ecumenically with the whole church in Bookham and to see renewal. But I'm not arriving with some pre-ordained plan. I want to get to know the place first.'

So when you see Penny, do welcome her and introduce yourself!



TO BOOKHAM BAPTIST CHURCH - A NEW HOME

What do the following have in common - the Boys' Club in Dorking Road, the Grange Centre in Rectory Lane and the Dawnay School in Griffin Way?

The answer – each was used as a temporary home for various parts of the life of Bookham Baptist Church between June 2000 and Easter this year. The church has now moved into comprehensively redeveloped premises in Lower Road, close to the centre of Bookham village.

The members of BBC are determined not to look on this as a return to the old church but see it as the next stage in their journey together. With new facilities, brighter rooms, increased scope for activities and a prime location in Bookham these are exciting times and an opportunity for growth in several dimensions.

So just what has been happening at the Boys Club, the Grange Centre and the Dawnay School – and what of the future now that Lower Road is back in action?

One of the core daytime activities in the new premises is the Rainbow Playgroup that uses the hall four mornings a week. After their temporary home at the Boys Club they are now operating with a full range of facilities built to house a dynamic and growing playgroup that is based on Christian values. Each Thursday morning the hall is thronged with parents and toddlers as the very popular Noah's Ark group meets to enjoy the new facilities. With a bigger hall offering more space there is scope to increase the range of activities and to accommodate more children.

The Grange Centre played hosts to the group 'Womens' Own', a growing group that caters not just for ladies from Bookham Baptist Church. They were made very welcome on Monday afternoons with tea and cakes, and the relative luxury of wonderfully comfortable chairs! Now, back at the Lower Road site, they enjoy the convenience of being in the centre of Bookham and facilities which have been improved to address the needs of the less mobile.

The Dawnay School was the 'church' on Sundays and also the venue for groups such as the men 'keeping fit' on Monday evenings. Since returning to Lower Road everyone has benefited from improved facilities for Sunday worship and weekday groups, with more rooms to accommodate the growing numbers. Open aspects onto Lower Road mean that passers by can capture something of the atmosphere of the church and its people.

With offices on site the church now has personnel available in Lower Road for many hours each day. For everyone in Bookham, whether church members or not, this allows easier access and the opportunity to talk about matters of either a general or confidential nature using counselling rooms. The offices on the first floor match the good standards of today's world of work and are set up to exploit computer technology to the full.

Looking back at the past year of disruption, what have been the highs and lows? At the top of the list of highs must be the experience of being at the various locations, where everyone made BBC so welcome. It was also very encouraging to have it demonstrated so vividly that a church is a body of people and where they meet is far less important than the meetings themselves. To this must be added the opportunity for the church to reassess its purpose and the way it makes use of property, particularly the Lower Road site.

A negative was the suspension of the informal coffee shop that was so valuable to some people in the village. The church will be opening its doors day by day in the future and will see this as a central part of its community involvement for the years ahead. Any building work is disruptive to those around the site. BBC knows that some people did experience difficulties and it would have been wonderful if these could have been avoided. The builders did a sterling job limiting the disruption to passers by and to neighbours, but there were times when the situation became more than a little strained.

If there is one message for Bookham following the reopening of the Lower Road premises it is that BBC is keen to be part of the community, not apart from it. At the point where the church moved out of Lower Road last June the headline in the church magazine was that 'things will never be the same again'. The coming months will amply underline the truth behind this phrase.

Senior Minister, Ian McFarlane, comments 'We have been thrilled at the way God met our needs during the time away from Lower Road. He has made provision for a large proportion of the cost of building to be met already. We have a vision to see the whole Christian church united in its work and witness in the area. We want to play our part in that and pray that the buildings will indeed be used for the glory of God and the benefit of the whole community'.

And as a postscript, the premises will be open for anyone to come in and look around on Village Day, 16th June. Do take the opportunity to see inside, whether for the first time or to see the new, improved version!

Three Literary Giants in Bookham

Libby Matts continues her history series, culling information from the diaries and letters of Fanny Burney, Richard Brinsley Sheridan and Jane Austen, who all stayed in our village around the same time... but did they ever meet?

1793 On 31st July Fanny Burney, a former lady in waiting to Queen Charlotte, married the French emigree General Alexander D'Arblay who had been living at Juniper Hall. Three months after their honeymoon, 'spent at Phoenice Farm at the top of Bagden Hill,' the couple, 'removed to a very small house in the suburbs of a very small village called Bookham. We found it rather inconvenient to reside in another person's dwelling.' Mrs Catherine Bailey, widow of former churchwarden, John Bailey, owned the 'small house', Fairfield Place. With its garden and orchard it adjoined Fairfield and still stands on the Pound Piece Plot - in Fanny's day a narrow cottage, with a parlour, hall, diningroom and scullery on the ground floor. The couple had only Fanny's royal pension of £150 pa for income so the General started a market garden, attacking the plum trees and asparagus beds with his sword, much to Mrs Bailey's displeasure.

1794 Fanny started writing her third novel, Camilla. Son Alexander was born in December and baptised in the church, while Fanny recalls a visit from carol singers from Eastwick Village. She called their home 'L'Hermitage'.

1795 Fanny completed Camilla, which was to earn her £3000.

1796 Richard Brinsley Sheridan, who the previous year had married Esther (Hecca) Ogle, whose dowry of £8000 remained in trust. They bought the manors of Polesden Lacey and West Humble, plus the mansion of Polesden, with its lands and pleasure gardens made up to 341 acres. These cost £12,384

1797 In January Fanny complains, 'No one has been here since your departure but a poor woman and in the same state less willingly – a poor dumb beggar, whom you may remember in our walks in Bookham.' In October the D'Arblays left Bookham to live in Camilla Cottage, the house they had built in West Humble. Still poor, they borrowed newspapers from Bookham's Revd Samuel Cooke and of that family Fanny writes, 'The father is worthy, the mother is good, so deserving, so liberal and so infinitely kind, that the world certainly does not abound with people to compare them with. The eldest son is a remarkably pleasing young man. The younger seems as sulky as the sister is haughty.'

1798 Fanny reports that Mrs Pullen has told her that, 'she can no longer send every day either cream or butter, as almost all the other families live close by, for her boy has departed for the winter – but they are sure of being served

three times a week.' The Pullen family still run Home Farm today!

1799 Jane Austen writes to her sister Cassandra, 'Dreads going to Bookham and hopes something might happen to prevent it.' Was this because Theophilus Cooke, Samuel's son, had just lost the election to be Master of Balliol? Anyway, on May 21st Jane arrived in Bookham where she stayed until June 2nd. She must have fully acquainted herself with the area because she started The Watsons two years later. She never finished this novel and it remained unpublished until 1871. It concerns a poor clerical family living three miles from Dorking on the turnpike road, perhaps West Humble. Yet Jane never met Fanny Burney!

Sheridan had plans to write another opera and Summer and Autumn found him at Polesden writing The Foresters. He was very short of money, not a candle there, nor tea for Hecca. In June she, Charles, their son, a servant Nancy and Lawson had scarlet fever. 'The husband of a poor woman who washes for this house, and lives in a cottage of mine, is just come and says all his children are taken ill – it's fortunate that I can send him assistance.' But in October the papers reported, 'A large tent was erected on the lawn capable of accommodating 300 persons, who were treated with English cheer and ancient hospitality and the industrious and deserving girls of character were rewarded each by a harvest present from their amiable hostess. A select party dined at the Mansion House which was enlivened by the vivacity and gaiety of Mr Sheridan and the peasantry

departed after preserving the utmost regularity, order and decorum at a proper hour, all filled with gratitude for their hospitable and kind reception.

1804 Sheridan was a generous landlord, immensely popular with his tenants and a firm supporter of them in the Land Enclosure Acts of 1804-1805.

Most readers will be familiar with The Leatherhead and District Local History Society and its museum. Some however might ask: "what has this got to do with the Bookhams?" The answer, in short, is: "yes there's a great deal which is relevant to ourselves."

In the first instance the title of the Society, with the words "and District", has very real meaning for all those living in this part of the world. The members come from all the "villages" around Leatherhead, including Ashtead, Fetcham, Great and Little Bookham and some from even further afield.

SERVING THE LOCAL COMMUNITY Carewell

The communities of Bookham and surrounding villages are now served by a thriving young charity that provides a domiciliary care service for disabled and elderly residents.

Carewell had an interesting origin. A group of disabled people felt strongly that users of a care service should have the opportunity to be involved in its management. This does not often happen elsewhere. Considerable determination was needed to overcome many obstacles but, three years later, the reality is in full swing with the service registered with Surrey Social Services. They are full members of the UK Home Care Association.

All the Trustees and the Manager are users of the service or members of close family. They are supported by a Clinical Manager, who is a qualified district nurse, and a team of ten experienced care assistants. Registered as a charity in February 1999, Carewell has grown rapidly and now provides care for seventeen clients.

There is always a demand for more care, both for clients and to relieve their family carers, so Carewell is constantly looking to recruit more local staff. The main qualities necessary are a caring attitude, reliability and commitment to helping our clients. A sense of humour also helps. Whilst experience is highly valued, it is not necessary, as thorough training and supervision are given to all new staff.

There is strength in a service that is truly local. The knowledge that the Trustees and managers bring to bear about local services and facilities has been invaluable for clients and staff. At times of crisis such as last year's fuel shortages and recent flooding problems, care visits were uninterrupted. We can happily claim, as a more dubious establishment used to say, "We never close!" Anyone interested in joining our team of care staff is welcome to contact us. Tel: 459734.
