Planning permission has been granted for Matter Architecture's design for a new outdoor learning centre for people with disabilities at The Grange Centre in Bookham, Surrey. The proposal is for a series of new and retrofitted buildings that will provide flexible learning spaces and workshops for horticulture, woodwork and pottery activities. It also includes covered outdoor areas, new greenhouses, a shop selling Grange-made produce and a cafe with a training kitchen.

The new facilities will improve the experience of those participating in its Skills for Life training programme. The café and shop will provide much-needed work placements, and opportunities for interaction with the public.







We call them 'Mystery Readers' (it's a secret who will be coming into school to read the story on a Friday afternoon). It is wonderful to see the look of delight on the pupil's faces when they see the guest reader and get swept away whilst listening to the story.



Santa's Sleigh and the local street collections at Christmas are a very important part of our fundraising. Having missed 2020 because of COVID it was great to be back on the streets of Bookham, Effingham and East Horsley during December.

The welcome from everyone we met was just fantastic and the look of wonder on the faces of the young children who came out to meet Santa brought back lovely memories of our own children and grandchildren when they were young.

Thanks to the generosity of everyone we met, we managed to raise over £4,000 which was an excellent result and has enabled us to help many local families who otherwise would have



struggled over the Christmas period. We know from the feedback we received that, because of your donations, the people helped were able to enjoy a happier time than otherwise would have been the case.

We are now working on our fundraising plans for 2022, a year in which the Club celebrates its 50th birthday, more details to follow over the coming weeks.

Bookham & Horsley Rotary continues to support The Grange.

One of the questions we are asked is "what exactly is Rotary, where does the money you raise go and who do you support?"

Throughout the 50 years since the Club was created, we have supported The Grange in Bookham in wide ranging ways both financially and providing help. A good example is the project recently completed in Bookham working with The Grange in refurbishing the garden at the rear of The Acorns where 8 people The Grange supports, live in individual flats. When the property was built funds weren't available for the rear garden to be landscaped.

After many years of saving and via donations by The Grange, sufficient money was available for the work to be done. Not only did the Rotary Club make a financial contribution, but also committed to provide volunteer labour to work alongside Moore Creations, the Contractor employed by The Grange to design,



project manage and carry out the more technical hard landscaping required in the garden. To help keep the costs down, Rotarians provided around 70 hours of labour. We cleared and levelled ground, cut back vegetation, dug footings for paths and walls, laid matting and wood chippings, erected and painted the summer house. All physical, hard work but the 10 Rotarians taking part had good fun and fellowship doing it.

The refurbishment is now complete so it can not only be enjoyed by the residents, but it will also help them to be more involved with their neighbours and the wider community.

Rotary is the largest service organisation in the world with over 1.4million members, nearly 33,000 Clubs in over 200 countries. Anyone can join, but we also have a number of people, whilst not Rotarians themselves, are happy to join in with events and projects.

A large Advent wreath followed which was constructed from a circle of twisted vine into which were inserted test tubes to take foliage and flowers around the centrally placed candles.

At our early December meeting Robin White, a freelance florist, presented "Floral Festivities", starting with a white woodland scene of amaryllis, roses, carnations and cabbages, giving us several helpful tips as he worked. A rather different colour scheme for Christmas of purple and pink was his next offering using purple sprayed and glittered (biodegradable) foliage and lotus heads with pink roses, germini and carnations. Copper, orange, yellow and red were the colours of an arrangement topping and following the lines of a crescent shaped pedestal which Robin finished by adorning with large shiny copper coloured balls. carnations and green balls with the shiny one at the focal point, and a traditional red arrangement of flowers and berries with gilded leaves. Raffle winners were delighted to take home beautifully fresh flowers which would last until Christmas.

Bookhams Residents' Association Tree Warden reports:



Hurrah – at last - The Garstons Triangle Takes Shape!

Some two years ago we all feared that the triangle might be lost to development, posing a threat to Village Day and Bookham's public outdoor events. Through the combined action of local residents, Bookhams Residents' Association (BRA), Bookham Community Association (BCA), and liaising with both Surrey and Mole Valley Councils, we have now secured this area as a public space complete with benches and plantings.

Just before Christmas two benches were fixed onto concrete bases, adding to the shrubs and trees which were planted earlier last year. Covid managed to intervene throughout 2020/2021 causing supply shortages and delays through illness. But through a concerted effort we managed to both secure

the land by getting it recognised as an asset of public value and designated as local green space on the Mole Valley Local Plan.

Doug McCann and Angela Benny acted as local road co-ordinators, liaising with residents in both The Garstons and Mead Crescent, and getting teams stuck in to raking when the long growth was cut back in November. Thanks go to the Pyatt and Mickova families for their raking and their baking – not only did they get stuck into raking up the long grass, but they also raised £110 from a bake sale to go towards tree planting in Bookham. BCA's Keith Slark and BRA's Peter Seaward helped push progress in numerous Zoom meetings over two years.

Thanks also go to Angela Smith who has donated one of the benches in memory of her husband, former Councillor Jim Smith, who served Bookham for many years. Near to her home, we hope that she will be able to enjoy these benches in the years to come.

The changeover to frequent mowing by Mole Valley District Council at the same time as the

Old Barn Hall fields (from the previous Surrey County Council less frequent longer cuts) the whole area should become a seamless part of the Old Barn Hall fields, ready to host Village Day, Food Festivals and indeed be used for recreation by the residents of Bookham.

While the Garstons Triangle is still taking shape we hope that within a year or two it will look and feel like the old and much loved Willow triangle – a lovely green space for the people of Bookham. A great example of people working together for the common good.

This Club was founded in 1987 when four of us from Bookham went to rock climb the Old Man of Hoy (a steep and serious sea Stack in the Orkney Islands).

We now have about 60 members from far and wide. There is a wide range of ages, interests and abilities.

We organise weekly evening climbs in the winter months to local Indoor climbing walls.

If anyone would like to join us, they would get a warm welcome and learn from our experienced members if you are new to it. There is no fee to join and the Club has no rules or insurance as it is just a loose group of friends with interests in climbing. We do not instruct or guide or take payment for such; just so you, the reader, know what we are all about.

In the Summer months we make regular evening trips to the local Sandstone cliffs near Tunbridge Wells which are an excellent training ground for the bigger cliffs. A few of us (the crazier ones) do regular meets to the beautiful, white, south coast Chalk Cliffs where we climb with Ice Axes and Crampons. This is more appropriate for advanced climbers.

Jewellery, Pottery, Wood, Pewter, Decorations and many other articles lovingly created by our highly skilled home craft makers.



Leatherhead & District Local History Society

LEATHERHEAD'S THREE COTTAGE HOSPITALS



The first Leatherhead Cottage Hospital was located at 8 Clinton Road from 1893. It had eight beds and ran up a £130 debt. It closed in 1902. A local committee was formed to build a new hospital. Wealthy residents donated funds and land was offered at Fortyfoot Road by

Walter Cunliffe of Headley Court.

The foundation stone of the Queen Victoria Memorial Hospital was laid in October 1903 and the new establishment opened officially in August 1904 with just six beds and one cot. It cost £2,625 to build and admitted 58 patients in its first year.

At first any qualified doctor might obtain permission to treat his patients at the hospital although this was later restricted to those living within three miles and practising for at least two years. In the absence of free health service care, patients were expected to pay between half a crown and 10s/6d a week.

Passing years meant increasing demand. The year 1927 brought 381 patients as hospital admissions replaced home treatment for sick children and maternity cases. A waiting room was now required as well as an accident and emergency ward.

Staff numbers rose too. By 1936 there were plans to spend £40,000 on a third hospital building after annual treatments in a single year reached 3,248.

A site had been identified in Poplar Road and Charles Leach, president of the hospital committee, personally bought it for £10,000 to

pre-empt housing development. He laid the foundation stone in May 1940 and the new hospital opened on 26 June 1941 with 24 beds for adults, ten for children and six private rooms.

In summer 1948 with the creation of the National Health Service, the Leatherhead Hospital governing body was abolished and management taken over by the newly formed Epsom Group committee.

In 1960 volunteers founded the League of Friends of Leatherhead Hospital. In the years to come they would raise some £4 million to pay for structural work and equipment. For more information from the L&DLHS go to www.leatherheadhistory.org.

Dorking and District RSPB Local Group



Do you prefer exploring the chalk downs of Norbury Park and Polesden Lacey or the woods and ponds of Bookham Common? Do you wish you knew more about the lifestyle of the red kites and buzzards that soar overhead, where the herons breed or the relationships between the ducks and coots?

Over the past two years, many of us have got to know the areas closest to home and wise words have been written about the benefits to our physical and mental health of spending time outdoors, especially in green spaces.



Bookham residents are lucky to have many green areas close to hand with many interesting birds, insects and plants.

Getting to know local wildlife is fascinating but can also be frustrating. Birds fly off as one tries to compare them with book illustrations, dragonflies zigzag out of view and plant growth is affected by the immediate environment. Even with smartphones to hand, taking a useful photo or making notes to investigate back home is often easier said than done. Nothing beats the old-fashioned

way of learning by going out with someone who knows a bit more than oneself.

RSPB Dorking and District local group covers the local area, has regular walks and meetings in person and online to provide the chance to learn more in a friendly way. Check out our activities on Facebook @ Dorking RSPB or our website https://ww2.rspb.org.uk/groups/dorkinganddistrict/.

And brief answers to those earlier questions? Red kites are scavengers that soar above looking out for carrion and helping to clear up carrion. Buzzards are raptors that mainly live on small rodents but are not too proud to eat worms in larger gardens. Grey herons breed in a colony high in the mature trees on Bookham Common. Gadwall (dabbling ducks rather like mallards with a black rear) let the coots do the hard work of finding waterweed in deeper areas, then diving to gather it; the gadwalls then aim to steal some of the weed from the coots so they get a wider diet.


