A HISTORY OF ASHTEAD

THE MOUNTS, PACHENESHAM

The final comprehensive report on the excavations of the 12th-14th century manor house site, the major work of the Society's early years, can be completed quickly if members will come forward to help catalogue and draw the pottery finds. M.25 MOTORNAY

Field walking has been discontinued until land is under plough again. It appears unlikely that work on the section of the hotor way around Leatherhead will commence within three years. Are any members, historians rather than archaeologists, interested in helping with historical research on land along the proposed M.25 route? The aim is to reduce the risk of missing possible sites by studying indexes, Tithe maps for field names and other possible clues.

Also, help from botanically inclined members with hedge survey work is being sought by the M.25 Working Party of the Surrey Archaeological Society. Please get in touch with S.R.C.Poulter (Leatherhead 74773) if interested in either venture, or wish to be added to the list of members who will be advised of future archaeological excavations. Volunteer members have been notified of an emergency dig at Leigh Hill Obbham where a housing development is proceeding around an Iron Age site.

LARGE SCALE EXCAVATION : VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Work will continue this summer at the Iron Age hill fort of Anstiebury (near Leith Hill) between 9 July and 4 August. Last year's dig showed that the fort had been occupied in Roman times - this year the entrance will be excavated. EUROPEAN ARCHITECTURAL HERITAGE YEAR, 1975

The Council of Europe has designated 1975 as European Architectural Heritage Year with the object of awakening public interest; protecting and enhancing buildings and areas of architectural or historic interest; conserving the character of old towns and villages; and considering how best ancient buildings can be assured of a role in contemporary society.

Representatives of many aspects of national life, including archaeology, attended a meeting convened by the United Kingdom Council in December 1972, at which the objectives of the campaign were outlined. A central administration is being provided by the Civic Trust and the C.B.A. has already given an assurance of its active support. The Urban Research Committee is planning a series of Seminars on various aspects of urban archaeology with the intention of publishing a monograph in 1975, and the Committees responsible for the Archaeology of Churches and Industrial Monuments will also be considering the form which their contribution might take.

What can the Leatherhead & District Local History Society do?

Two suggestions have been put forward already to your Committee: (i) Individual members could 'Adopt' a local building and endeavour to find out all they can about it and its past inhabitants, and (ii) The Society should undertake a major research project into all aspects historical, archaeological, architectural - of one of the most important buildings in our area.

Your comments, suggestions and constructive criticism of these preliminary ideas are invited. Or have you some better suggestions?

HISTORY OF JUNIPER HALL, MICKLEHAM

We have been asked by Mr. Sankey, Warden of the Juniper Hall Field Centre, to help him trace records of the building before, say, 1790, when part of it was a public house known as The Royal Oak. Information to Mrs. Fuller or Mr. Sankey, please.

DETAILS OF REMAINING PROGRAMME FROM JULY 1973

SUNDAY 15th JULY. Afternoon look around Godalming. Coach leaves Leatherhead at 2 pm and other pick-up points pro rata. Subject to weather conditions being suitable there will be an opportunity for those members so inclined to walk back along the Wey and then pick up the Coach again at Guildford.

ASHTEAD WALK Unfortunately Saturday 4th August has coincided with a busy period for weddings and the absence on holiday of the Rector. Since it is unthinkable that a walk in Ashtead should not include a visit to the Church, it has been decided to postpone the event until early in October (see below).

SATURDAY 18th AUGUST. Day visit to Crich Tramway Museum etc., and Cromford Derbyshire, leaving Leatherhead 8 am. Arrangements are well in hand and the Derbyshire Archaeological Society has been most helpful with information and suggestions about items of Industrial Archaeological interest in the district. It is hoped there will be time to visit the Middleton Top Engine House which contains a Beam Engine built 1829 to haul wagons up a 1 in $8\frac{1}{4}$ incline. The area is part of the Derbyshire High Peak Trail and promises to provide an interesting day's outing. Fare £1.50; 25 bookings to date.

SATURDAY 15th SEPTEMBER. Day visit to Bath leaving Leatherhead 8 am. This historic City has many places worth visiting apart from the Roman Baths, Pump Room, Assembly Rooms and Abbey. Fare £1.25 (does not include any admission charges); 32 bookings to date.

SATURDAY 29th SEPTEMBER. An afternoon around Mickleham under the guidance of Miss E.F.M. Strudwick. Meet outside Church 2.30 pm.

SATURDAY 13th OCTOBER. Walk around Historical Ashtead (postponed from August). Meet outside Church at 2.30 pm. This is probably the first walk in Ashtead in recent years. There are no doubt a number of members who are well acquainted with Ashtead and from these we would welcome any suggestions and information about points of historical interest in the village. From this it will be possible to build up an itinerary in the same manner as for Leatherhead, Fetcham and the Bookhams.

FRIDAY 19th OCTOBER. The Dallaway lecture at St. John's School, Leatherhead, 8.00 pm. Please publicise this lecture amongst your friends. The subject is "Canals, Midlands & Northern England" by Mr. L.A. Edwards. <u>Some</u> of the proceeds of the silver collection are retained by the Society to help with finances - this is to correct an error in the previous Newsletter.

FRIDAY 9th NOVEMBER at Red Cross Hall, Leatherhead. 8.00 for 8.15 pm. An illustrated talk on Bees and Beekeeping by Mrs. Furness of Ewell.
