

#### Vacancy



A pecularity in this Ward is that the initial letter in the name of each of the four representatives provide over 50 per cent. of the letters in the name of the Ward:



No doubt there is a large number of residents in Bookham who feel grateful for the large areas in the district which are permanent open spaces under the management of the National Trust for Places of Historical Interest or Natural Beauty. But there are very few who support the National Trust by becoming a member or sending a donation in cash.

Although the State is sympathetic with the aims and objects of the National Trust, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer has also promised in due course to make a grant in connection with the Jubilee Appeal, the National Trust relies for its income on member's subscriptions, donations, benefactions, and bequests.

Members are entitled to visit any of the Trust's properties free of charge and are kept in regular touch with all the Trust's activities. Join now and become a co-partner in the preservation of the beauties of your country.

Local National Trust properties include Great and Little Bookham and Banks Commons comprising 447 acres of natural country mainly wooded with oak.


Leatherhead U.D.C. are borrowing £18,650 from the Public Works Loan Board for a period of 60 years for the purchase of Bookham Grove.

The Ministry of Health has informed the Leatherhead U.D.C. that the scheme for converting Bookham Grove into two flats is too costly and at their suggestion a scheme for four flats is in preparation. Application for the use of the building has also been made by the Coal Utilisation Research Association.

\* The L.U.D.C. hope to have the roads and sewers substantially completed on their Sole Farm Road Estate by 31st March next and to commence the construction of houses on 1st April.







#### The Churchyard

The state of the churchyard has recently become a subject for criticism and complaint, a few facts may therefore be useful in bringing about some improvement. The Parochial Church Council for the Parish of St. Nicolas, Great Bookham is the authority responsible for the churchyard.

Any person no matter what his religion or creed who dies in the parish has a right to interpment in the churchyard so long as it has not been closed. The funeral expenses include the fee for digging and filling in the grave the fee being paid direct to the gravedigger who need not necessarily be an employee of the Council. The Council charge a few shillings for a number peg to identify the grave with the church record.

The Council has to rely upon what money can be allotted from church funds for its churchyard expenses. The church funds are made up from what is collected in church for church expenses and what is subscribed by worshippers —a system known as church dues. It is obvious therefore that a heavy and somewhat unfair burden falls on those who attend the church services.

To keep the churchyard in proper condition labour for at least four days per week is necessary. The cost of labour to enable a man to keep up a proper standard of living to-day is from 15/- to  $\pounds 1$ per day. Therefore a sum of at least  $\pounds 200$  per annum is required for the churchyard alone.

The help of those who tend their relatives' graves is also necessary to see that the dead flowers, glass vases and jars are not left about. One complaint heard recently was that of a person grumbling that it was dangerous because of broken glass to let the dog off the lead ! ! The churchyard has always been a feature of Bookham and it is up to Bookham to keep it beautiful.


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
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
