year and we would be glad to do this if we could be more confident that the maintenance of standards was an on-going thing. Dropping of litter is still a problem. Fortunately, when the judges came, it must have been shortly after spring cleaning week—they did not see much litter and they observed that the bins were well used and well sited. They did point out, however, that the tidiness of the playing fields and recreation grounds was only fair.

The excellent maintenance of St Nicolas Church and graveyard was commended. Our tradesmen and innkeepers will be pleased to know that the external appearance of their properties, too, was described as excellent and this, indeed, is progress when we recall that the 1973 report was, on the whole, unfavourable. Their surrounds and flower beds were considered very good. Finally, praise was given to our gardens and the upkeep of private verges, this adding significantly, it was said, to the attractiveness of the locality. We reached the satisfactory level of an 80% mark.

Even though the Barn Hall got a ranking of 86%, we were unlucky in the day chosen by the judges. Our Grounds, which are usually immaculate, showed evidence of litter and the dustbins were neither clean nor tidy. For the record, we would like it to be known that the dustmen had not visited us and our volunteer groundsman was on holiday. All the same, we take this opportunity to appeal to all users of the Hall to deposit rubbish and leftovers in an orderly fashion after their events. Most of them do so but there are the occasional defaulters and this is disheartening to our volunteers and caretaker who give considerable and continuous service.

We are glad to finish with glad tidings. Heating and lighting were described as excellent, furniture and curtains excellent, notice boards excellent and fire precaution equipment excellent.

VILLAGE DAY

Lovely weather and a fine turn-out of more than 2,000 people made our 25th Village Day a great success. It is heartening to observe that the tradition with which we began of making this a real family occasion still continues. Long may it do so! The cooperation of so many organisations and clubs in running stalls and sideshows creates the neighbourhood spirit. It is good to meet old friends, some of whom we may not

have seen for years and some who have left the district but are attracted back to this special day.

We can only give an 'omnibus' thank-you to all who helped so generously and we append, as usual, at the end of this column a list of the firms and traders who so willingly supply us with gifts and prizes.

We estimate that some 1,500 came into the Exhibition. This is a feature of Village Day and is always of high standard but we think it is probably true to say that this fourth show of 'Bookham Past' exceeded all others in excellence of presentation and imaginative interpretation of a theme which always interests Bookhamites. We are indebted to the little band of enthusiasts who worked so hard to give us a visual picture of the history of our country as shown in the development of our own village.

As we go to press it is impossible to give exact figures of the profits of Village Day and Village Week but it should be over £900, a sum which will help the Community Association to carry on its many activities for the benefit of the whole neighbourhood.

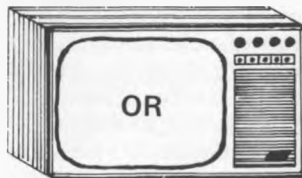

BOOKHAM COMMONS

Bought by the People for the People

The story of the Commons should cover 3 areas: Great Bookham, Little Bookham and Banks Common—a total of some 447 acres.

Early in the 1920's the Lord of the Manor of Great Bookham, Mr H Souchon, planned to live abroad and sell his estate, but it was only when a new entrance road (now The Park) was made into Eastwick Park from Church Road that residents realized that portions of the Estate had been sold to a building firm (Harvey Estates Ltd). The firm had also acquired the rights over the Waste of the Manor, known as Great Bookham Common, at that time much favoured by gypsies as a venue on the way to Epsom Downs for Derby Week. The land was used for grazing. The Contractor also had possession of the timber—fine oak and ash trees—and it was learned that it was intended that these should be cut down and removed.

A hurried meeting of a few residents was held, resulting in a request to Mr Souchon to halt the sale of the Manor Rights over the Common. The residents were given, by him, 3 weeks to buy back the rights for £1,200, in those days a large sum of money to raise at short notice. It was accomplished. There were only 23 subscribers but their love of Bookham, which, at that time, was essentially a rural area with a population of about 2,000, saved the pending vandalism. The Rights were vested in the National Trust for all time and, we of this generation, have a responsibility to maintain what they preserved.

A strip of land—the Waste of the Manor of Little Bookham, to the west of Great Bookham Common and extending to Hundred Pound Bridge, still remained in private ownership. The Lord of this Manor, Mr H C Willock-Pollen, noting what had taken place, generously presented to the National Trust his Rights over Little Bookham Common.

Shortly after, Mr R R Calburn, of Effingham, brought together the whole area of Common land lying to the north of Bookham by presenting to the National Trust, the 3rd portion, some 33 acres, known as Banks Common.

The National Trust, as is its custom, established a Management Committee of local residents to be responsible for the maintenance of the whole area, in consultation with the Area Agent at Polesden Lacey.

This sub-Committee, under the chairman-

ship of Dr A Easton, meets regularly and is advised by Mr John Simson, Assistant Agent for the Surrey and West Sussex Region of The Trust, based at Polesden.

The Commons were not endowed and The Trust cannot be financially responsible for their upkeep. Consequently the sub-Committee must rely for its income upon grants from local authorities (£600 in 1973) and subscriptions from local residents (under 200). More could help in this latter direction, remembering that conservation begins at home. You can, for example, join the National Trust by joining through the Bookham Commons' Treasurer, Mr W Rombach, Arbor Vitae, Vicarage Close, whereby the sub-Committee receives a rebate from The Trust. You can subscribe annually or, preferably, by covenant.

In recent years, Eric Youngman, the Commons Keeper, with some voluntary help, has made major improvements. Glades have been opened up, paths cleared, ditches drained, horse rides marked and the Eastern Plain, grazed before the war by cattle, and subsequently overgrown with bracken and silver birch, restored to its original beauty.

Water fowl have returned to the Isle of Wight Pond which was completely cleared last year. The restoration of the Upper Eastern Pond is now under way with voluntary labour.

The Commons are of special scientific interest. Of the 139 families of flowering plants and ferns found in Britain, as many as 82 have been reported over the last 20 years in the flora of Bookham Commons. Here, also, have been recorded about 1,200 species of two-wing flies, 1,000 species of beetles, 264 of butterflies and moths, 180 of spiders, 100 of birds and 22 species of mammals.

With such a splendid amenity in our possession, it is good to hear that a small group of people are endeavouring to form a Friends of Bookham Common, whose object would be to raise money and stimulate voluntary help.

Obituary. The short illness followed by the death, on May 5th, of Arthur Weston was a great shock to those of us who knew and respected him. Staffordshire born, he had the qualities of integrity and persistence which are characteristic of people bred in that country.

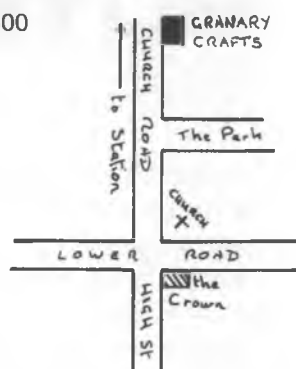
