The Governments Roadmap for lifting Covid19 restrictions mean that we can reopen the halls in stages

#### Step Three: 17 May.

- Film shows, plays and concerts can take place, subject to social distancing.
- Up to 30 people will be able to attend weddings, receptions, funerals and wakes. Christenings and bar mitzvahs will be allowed.
- Controlled indoor events can take place with up to 50% capacity and social distancing.

The "rule of 6" will apply to indoor events. Guidance on social contact between friends and family will be reviewed.

The Covid19 secure main hall and Harrison Room will be open from the above dates for the activities allowed with Covid19 Special Conditions of Hire applying.

#### Step Four: 21st June

All legal limits on social contact are removed.

Dancing is permitted.

Restrictions on numbers at weddings, funerals and other events are abolished

All rooms fully open – subject to any conditions announced later.

You can forward book with confidence knowing that, if future Government restrictions cause you to cancel, no charges will be made and deposits will be returned.





Thanks to this generous funding our former Conference Room has been transformed into our new 'multi use space' for the people we support to use for key sessions and socialising.



# **Royal National Lifeboat Institution**

After a long break I am again doing my favourite pastime sailing a safety boat on the River Thames.

I do this for two sailing clubs and one Sea Scouts troop. Last year I only went out on the Thames once. This is very much unlike the RNLI boats which had the busiest summer in the 195+ years it has been in existence.

It costs a lot of money launching a lifeboat and our income has suffered from our volunteers being unable to raise money for our funds.

The answer is an ICL hand 80-column card punch dating from the early 1970s. Punch cards were used widely to input and store data for specialised data processing equipment in the 1900s but online terminals, magnetic tape and hard disks made them obsolete by the end of the twentieth century.

Bookham Seniors Computer Club (BSCC) does not teach its members how to use card punches but provides help on using modern devices such as desktop computers, laptops, tablets and smartphones and applications such as Windows 10, email, Word, Excel, PowerPoint, WhatsApp, YouTube and Zoom. Timothy Walker brings a lifetime of experience as a botanist to our July lecture 'The Healing Power of Plants'. Despite being used for thousands of years, the role of plants in modern medicine is still considered to be peripheral by many people. COVID willing the talk will be followed by our traditional July drinks and nibbles.

Following the August break our September talk will introduce some of the traditional tools of the early artist. In 'First Catch a Squirrel'

Chantal Brotherton-Ratcliffe will explain how the 14th century artist Cennino Cennini's The Artists' Handbook gives us an understanding of some of the surprising materials which any artist had to master before he could begin to paint.

In September (and also COVID willing) Judy Money has organised a five day tour of the 'Historic Houses and Heritage of Norfolk' including visits to Ely, Norwich and Sandringham. It looks interesting.


We also had lots of cooking opportunities with Chinese New Year, enjoyed stir fry and pancakes cooked on the open fire and lots of

With a background in music teaching and





# **Leatherhead & District Local History Society**

#### THE STORY OF THE GRANGE

The Grange in Bookham provides homes, skills, social opportunities and care for some 130 adults with learning disabilities. The site in Rectory Lane pre-dates 1600 and was the subject of a fascinating online lecture by local historian Vivien White in March.

She showed how the original building was a yeoman's house, was then used as cottages for farm labourers, then transformed into a gentleman's residence in the 19th century and was sold to the School of Stitchery of Lace, forerunner of the present charity, in the 20th century. Its 500-year history is filled with human interest stories and Vivien hopes to complete a book on The Grange later this year, if archives open to allow her to complete the research.

In the meantime Eloise Appleby, today's chief executive officer of The Grange, is training hard for a sponsored 95-mile walk along the Wst Highland Way in Scotland in late June to raise funds for the charity which was hit hard by the Covid-19 restrictions.

Vivien explained why The Grange has always technically been in Great Bookham although right on the boundary with Little Bookham. Historical maps show that while jutting into Little Bookham, it was probably built on that spot to be close to strips of land in common fields overlooked by and belonging to the original owner.

One early owner was Henry Collins, a rector of Little Bookham church half a mile away. He died in an epidemic leaving a wife and young family. After the children grew up, the property was sold to a local yeoman.

It was occupied by farm labourers until the late 18th century when a rich London gentleman, Henry Seawell, who was renting a house nearby, bought it together with the land. His great-grandson developed the building into a substantial residence and gave it the name The Grange. This he sold to wealthy London solicitor, Arthur Bird at the end of the 19th century and Bird extended the house. He also bought other property in Bookham and even had the route of Rectory Lane moved in order to give The Grange a lawn in front of it and a grand entrance.

The School of Stitchery of Lace, established to give employment to nurses injured in the First World War, moved there in 1938. The name changed in the 1970s and it became a registered care home in the 1980s,

encouraging disabled adults to live more independent and fulfilling lives. Pleas support Eloise's sponsored walk via https://uk.virginmoneygiving.com



As a student in my final year at the Howard of Effingham, the challenges of the COVID pandemic have come thick and fast for myself and my peers in Year 11. Having already had a Year 10 marred by the first lockdown, as well as a spell of isolation in December which resulted in an intense two weeks of back-to-back mock exams squeezed in before the Christmas holidays, the news of lockdown in January and the cancelling of exams brought a strange mix of emotions for many students in my year.

The younger years followed soon after, and the classic hubbub of school life has returned in full force. So despite the concerns about exams and final grades, all at the Howard can share a smile in the knowledge that the full daily timetable of online lessons gave everyone the routine needed to emerge from the nightmare of coronavirus stronger and more resilient than ever.

The children loved the snow. They made snow castles and had a pretend Ice cream shop in our outside area, where they offered a wide variety of flavours of "Snow Creams" to other children and Rainbow staff.

They also enjoyed listening and joining in with the story 'Whatever Next' about a bear that goes into space in a cardboard box rocket. This led to discussing and imagining what it would be like to fly to the moon and back and how we could get there, what we would take etc. The children wanted to make a large rocket. We collected several large boxes which they painted and decorated some and used in their pretend play. We displayed laminated posters of all the planets in the solar system and the children, using their imaginations, flew to Mars and Jupiter etc.
