From the Chairman

HALLS REOPEN

We are delighted to confirm that the changes announced by the Government on 12 July enable us to return use of our halls virtually back to normal. We are, however, extremely aware that the pandemic is not over and that we must ensure that the halls remain a safe environment by following all the appropriate Government guidance.

Although most signage and one-way systems will be removed from the halls, for the time being we will continue with our enhanced cleaning regime throughout the building. Please continue to be

courteous about not crowding other users and remember to wash your hands and use the hand sanitiser and cleaning wipes which we will continue to provide.

Of course, if you have any potential COVID symptoms, you should not come to the halls.

The wearing of masks in any area will be optional for both users and staff and there will no longer be any such restrictions on large gatherings and events can return to normal. 



Local Girlguiding units have enjoyed the resumption of many fun, face-to-face activities, following the loosening of lockdown restrictions

7th Bookham Brownies celebrated the Queen's 95th birthday in their own unique way! Rather than marking Her Majesty's milestone in a more traditional fashion - making crowns or having a cream tea - the girls were instead inspired by the story of "The Queen's Knickers" by Nicholas Allen.

Brownies and adult leaders were surprised with their own pair of knickers to decorate and

held a fashion show to show off their creations (pictured). 7th Bookham have also been working towards the River and Canal Trusts Challenge Badge, looking at pictures of canal boat artwork and creating their own, playing pooh sticks while going for a walk along the River Mole, making posters highlighting what is best to feed the ducks and learning about water safety.

4th Bookham Guides collected four bags of rubbish from the areas around the Bookham Guide Hut for the Great British Spring Clean. The unit has also enjoyed orienteering at Bookham Common with Effingham Guides and tie-dyed socks for Father's Day.

1st Bookham Guides will be 100 years old in November 2021 and to celebrate they are time travelling across the last century. Their journey started via Zoom in the 1920's, with the Guides discovering the beginnings of cinema through clips of silent Charlie Chaplin movies. In the 1930's, the Guides were shocked to discover that houses didn't have inside toilets!

The girls then learnt from historians how Guides helped during World War 2 in the



1940's. Face-to-face meetings had resumed as the time travelling journey reached the 1950's, with Guides hearing stories from Trefoil Guild members who were Guides themselves during that decade. The unit then enjoyed a fantastic evening with a guest who brought along her toys from the 1960's - the Guides didn't realise that Barbie was that old! 1st Bookham Guides have also been learning navigation, knotting, lashing and fire lighting skills!

Polesden Lacey Shakespeare

Long ago, in 1949, the Bookham Community Association (BCA) organised a pageant at Polesden Lacey called Merrie England, which inspired Betty Harrison, secretary of the BCA, to propose the idea of producing one of Shakespeare's plays for the Festival of Britain in 1951 and performing it in a new permanent open air theatre! It was an enormous challenge, but through enthusiasm and the hard physical effort of volunteers from the village, the present stage was built. A Midsummer Night's Dream was performed on the 30 June 1951.

In 1953 the stage was prepared for Elsie Green's, directorial debut: no set or lighting, just hessian wings & amplification... but with the whole Surrey Philharmonic Orchestra! Her first production, As You Like It, was set mainly in a forest. After that, she directed Shakespeare's plays at Polesden for 36 years as Resident Director.

Polesden productions' reputation gradually grew. Plays were re-staged locally as well as in Chichester Festival Theatre. Audiences increased and the best actors, from far and wide came, maintaining a very high standard.

Starting in 1971 two productions each summer were produced, one Shakespeare and one "Classic" and in1979, there was an added concert by The Spinners folk band and folk

dancing. Sets became more elaborate, involving professional designers and builders, and evening performances were introduced. In the 1980s, there was a wide range of productions, including Gilbert and Sullivan operas, musicals, orchestral and big band concerts, with a covered stage and bars.

In 1986, "Polesden Fair" was established as part of the two-week festival, which became a permanent and important fixture in the calendar, expanding to three weeks in 1999, with more than 20,000 people attending.

Sadly, revenue generated by the Shakespeare productions gradually fell. Performances of Shakespeare at the Open Air Theatre seemed under threat.

Enter Margaret Hunter! Whilst in hospital, she heard of the Trust's decision; despite her predicament, putting together a group of enthusiasts to underwrite performances: "The Friends of Polesden Lacey Shakespeare". To bring costs under control, Margaret went back to minimal 1950s sets and an inexpensive sound system. Evening performances stopped, avoiding high costs of lighting on and off stage. The first production in 2009, under her management, was a great financial success and the charity, Polesden Lacey Shakespeare was created. In addition to the Shakespeare play each year, some profits are



used to fund visits to schools by a professional company, (including our alumni), to perform child-friendly versions of the Bard's plays, and run workshops demonstrating the joy of Shakespeare.

Additionally, the company funds Pop-up Shakespeare: short scenes from Shakespeare and child-friendly versions of his plays, performed around the grounds of Polesden Lacey, free to all visitors: August 14th & 21st, this year.

Margaret retired in 2012 and 2013 was Gary Andrews' first year as Artistic Director and this year he produced A Midsummer Night's Dream, the last production, under present management. Ways of putting on Shakespeare productions in the future are being actively considered so, hopefully, they will continue in some way at Polesden Lacey.

What a strange year it has been! The Covid restrictions have created a whole range of social problems, and Eastwick Allotments have provided a green oasis for these difficult times. It has been possible to enjoy social contact with social distancing in a pleasant open air environment.

Based at Eastwick Allotments is Bookham and Fetcham Gardeners' Association, which has been in existence since 1955. You do not have to be an allotment holder to be a member of the Association - many of our members don't have an allotment but are gardeners from near and far.

Do come and visit our shop on a Sunday morning between 10.00 a.m. to midday and stock up on much of what you will need for your garden or allotment. As well as tools, fertilisers, compost and bird food, seed potatoes, onion sets and garlic for both

Autumn and Spring planting will be available and as with everything we sell, our prices will be lower than you are likely to find elsewhere. For example seeds from D.T.Brown will be available by pre order at a 50% discount on retail prices

Membership is just £3 a year and it is our claim that you will certainly save your membership fee in your purchases.

The Plastic Free Bookham project – Transition Bookham





Our project has continued to be on hold in recent months, but we have carried on doing some background work to help reduce local waste. You might be aware there is a Surrey recycling search tool and app, which allows you to check by postcode and item whether you can recycle an item at the kerbside, at the recycling centre, or whether it needs to go in your black bin. You can search items and/or download the app at the Surrey Environment Partnership website in the section What to do with an item (www.surreyep.org.uk/what-to-do-with-an-

item/). There's also lots of other useful information on reducing waste.

What's missing from the Surrey search tool is information about local recycling schemes, such as those within the TerraCycle programme. Nor does it clearly cover the 'bring' sites such as the recycling banks at the Lower Shott car park or the newly enhanced soft plastic recycling at Sainsburys and Tesco (selected stores only).

Thanks to the technical skills of Les Huett from Bookham Residents' Association, there is now a search tool on the BRA website covering schemes in Bookham and the surrounding areas. Visit www.bookhamresidents.org.uk/terracycle-dropoffs-near-bookham . We'd like to keep this as up-to-date as possible, so if you know of anything that we haven't included or find that a scheme has been discontinued, please let us know by email at

The Bookham Help your Neighbour Scheme is planning to restart its service on 1st August 2021 following its suspension due to the Covid 19 pandemic. We provide transport to local medical facilities for elderly and vulnerable residents of Bookham when no other means of transport are available to them.

As a result of the pandemic, we regret that we must introduce some constraints on the service we offer:

 Please give 5 working days' notice if possible and we will not be able to accept requests closer than 2 working days beforehand.

- Clients must have had 2 Covid vaccinations, wear a mask and be able to get in and out of a vehicle unaided.
- We can no longer accommodate walking frames or wheelchairs.
- We regret that we are now unable to accompany a client into a medical facility so they will be set down at the door and collected afterwards. This means that they must be able to reach their clinic unaided and be able to contact their driver for collection using their own mobile phone or by requesting that staff make a call for them

Could you help?

Help Your Neighbour is operated by volunteers who either man our mobile phone one morning a month or drive our clients to their appointments. They give as much or as little time as they choose and are not tied to any regular commitment. We urgently need more volunteers to make the scheme a success.

Peter Pan Playschool

We're very fortunate to have a lovely big garden at Peter Pan which we've been really enjoying over the Summer term and it's a great place to learn about how things grow and change over time. We've planted different seeds and seedlings - radishes, beetroot, cucumbers, potatoes and green beans which we've really enjoyed watching grow – although quite a few have been nibbled by friendly caterpillars or slugs and snails! We also had some baby caterpillars, which grew bigger and bigger, until they made themselves nice warm cocoons to sleep in and it took ages for them to wake up but when they did it was worth the wait to see the butterflies emerging! We released them into the garden where several landed on the children before flying away.

Sometimes parents ask how we manage 2 year olds and 4 year olds in the same environment as in other settings they may be kept in separate groups. We find having the children in a mixed setting works well as the 2 year olds learn language, play skills, sharing, self-help skills and a whole host of other skills being modelled by the older children, and the older children learn empathy and gain self-

confidence where they include the younger ones in their play – they can be the leaders, but they learn how to do this sensitively, and they get a lot of enjoyment from helping the younger children with handwashing, putting on an apron, getting resources etc. It's really lovely to see in action.

Peter Pan Playschool is an inclusive preschool setting, which cares for children from 2 years old until school age. We offer weekday morning sessions 9.10-12.10 during term time, with optional extended hours until 1.10 and 2.40 on Monday, Thursday and Friday. We accept Government FEET and FEE funding as well as the extended 30 hours funding. As with all local groups, life continues to be challenging for the Society but, also common to them has been our venture into Zooming. Under the expert guidance of

our Treasurer, Chris Rose, lectures to members continue to go without a hitch. Hopefully, after the August break, it will be possible to join with friends and meet again with live lectures at The Old Barn Hall.

In June we had a special talk given by committee member Edmund Morgan-Warren 'All that Glitters is not Gold -

The analysis and marking of gold and silver are among the earliest examples of consumer protection with references dating from biblical times, and the present system of hallmarking has its origins in the 13th century. Hallmarking is more than simply a guarantee of quality but is a rich source of information about the article.

Members learned about the origins of hallmarking and the four main components of a hallmark as well as marks commemorating notable dates such as the sovereign's jubilee and the millennium. We also saw the rainbow logo mark introduced in 2020 to mark the work of the NHS during the pandemic.

The talk was illustrated by many examples including gold and silver watches, rings, a wartime ARP badge and its hallmark and a silver Armada dish, a reproduction of items made using silver from the Spanish Armada.

Our September talk will introduce some of the



traditional tools of the early artist in 'First Catch a Squirrel - historical materials and techniques of painting C15 - C18'. Chantal Brotherton-Ratcliffe will explain how the 14th century artist Cennino Cennini's 'The Artists' Handbook' details some of the surprising materials which any artist had to master before he could begin to paint, such as using the tail of a squirrel to make his paintbrushes.

In September Judy Money has organised a five-day tour of the 'Historic Houses and Heritage of Norfolk' including visits to Ely and the cathedral, the Sainsbury Centre for the Visual Arts in Norwich and the Sandringham Estate.

Members will be kept informed but all will depend on how any Covid restrictions affects







distancing and social contact. Eventually, new members will be warmly welcomed to the Society lectures at 7.30 on the fourth Tuesday in the month at The Old Barn Hall. http://theartssocietybookham.org.uk/

Leatherhead & District Local History Society

WHAT IS HAPPENING THIS YEAR?

Leatherhead Museum is gradually moving towards normal operation this summer after nearly two years of closure because of the Covid-19 pandemic. A trial period is under way with openings of Hampton Cottage, Church Street, on Saturdays only and restricted numbers of visitors. But a formal unveiling of a blue plaque in memory of late L&DLHS president Linda Heath is scheduled in September on the west wall overlooking the garden and this is expected to mark a return to normality as the pandemic fades away.

Volunteers have continued to maintain the Museum throughout its closure and important specialist contract work has also been undertaken. The mid-bay partition on the first floor has been reduced to open up the roof zone to enhance the spatial impact. Electrical improvements have been completed and



certified, heaters repaired, the courtyard repointed, a new door added, and signage improved. Current displays include Local Buildings of Interest in watercolours by John Hassell and son (1780-1850). But the call is out for more volunteers to run the Museum as the number has fallen during the closure.

For Heritage Weekend on Saturday, 18 September, the Museum will show a display of local historic maps. This will follow the L&DLHS contribution to 2021 Heritage Open Days on Friday, 17 September - a talk entitled Leatherhead Food - Chips with Everything. Local historian Bill Whitman was once a consultant at the Leatherhead Food Research Association in Randalls Road and will be speaking either on-line via Zoom or back at the L&DLHS's traditional venue in the Abraham Dixon Hall at the Leatherhead Institute. Either way it will start at 7.30pm with public confirmation of the format issued in good time ahead of the event.

Despite the Museum's closure, the Society has also remained active throughout the period with its programme of regular online lectures via Zoom organised in cooperation with Dorking Local History Group. What's on offer changes frequently so it is best to visit the Surrey History MeetUp website to find the latest updates.

Online talks in coming months include the

following:

16 August: Searching for Inspector William Donaldson (1807-55) (Henry Pelham, Inspector Donaldson's great great grandson, talks about the first serving policeman to be murdered on duty in Surrey.)

27 September: A history of Croydon High St until 1901 (Carole Roberts)

25 October: Canal History & Heritage (including Wey & Arun Canal) (Roger Butler)

22 November: Dissolution of the Monasteries-Superstition, Scandal & Dodgy Dealings (Julia Hickey)

31 January: The South at Work, Surrey Glassmaking (Geoff Mead)

21 February: To Journey's End – the Life of RC Sherriff (Pete Allen)

21 March: Quakers at War (in Surrey and elsewhere) (Frances Hurd)



Mole Valley Ramblers

As representatives of Mole Valley Ramblers Yvonne Abel and I were lucky enough to attend the launch of a new artwork by James Tunnard called Radius. It is located at top of the Denbies vineyard in Dorking, near the junction of the North Downs Way and the bridle path leading down to Ranmore Road (which is part of the new Leith Hill Greenway).

It takes the form of a bench made from locally sourced oak, the artist James has used the contours of the vineyard slopes and cleverly mirrored the undulating curves of this sculptural seat to reflect the shapes of the surrounding hills and valleys as well as the radial symmetries of growth found in trees and

other plant life. The curved form of the seating area orientates visitors towards the inspiring views that radiate out from the hillside.

The front facing panels of the bench are inscribed with beautiful quotations and the reverse of the panels have inscriptions of haiku poetry created by the Mole Valley Poets. The four points of the compass are scored into the seat which has been aligned accordingly.

There are a series of these art works throughout Surrey and another similar series in Kent. They are always situated in beautiful locations and frequently have a spectacular view.

St Nicolas Church

Sitting in the very heart of our village St Nicolas Church is a beautiful, Grade 1 listed building. There has been a church on this site for over 1000 years and during that period the interior and exterior have evolved to suit the needs of the local community at the time.


The current interior is largely the result of remodelling by the Victorians and represents just a fraction of its history. The current layout suits Victorian-style worship but does not work in the 21st Century. Parts are not accessible to people with limited mobility, it's cold and drafty in the winter, uncomfortable to sit in for any length of time and completely inflexible in terms of layout.

We are excited to be able to build on what we have inherited and create a church which better suits today and tomorrow's needs. We are planning to create a space for church and community. One that works much more effectively for as wide a group of people as possible and can be used seven days a week.

Our development plan addresses some of the most essential needs, whilst anticipating the use of a more flexible space. We aim to engage a much wider community of local people in our services, events and groups by updating and using the internal space of the church in a more flexible way while respecting our past by carefully preserving the most significant parts of the church's history.

Once we have delivered our plan the church building will:

- Be warmer in winter with a more efficient heating system and reduce our carbon footprint.
- Be accessible to those with restricted movement and anyone with children in pushchairs



- Be a flexible and carefully preserved space by redecorating and removing the uncomfortable pine Victorian pews we will unlock the potential of the largest space in the village. Seating will be provided by versatile and more comfortable chairs.
- Have a better located, and more architecturally coherent font and donation box – the font is an architectural mix, so the 12th/13th century bowl will be placed on an elegant bronze stand and the donation box relocated.
- Displaying important historical elements of the church's past prominently – the chancel will remain and the fragments of earlier pews which the Victorians preserved will be included in a new rack to display the embroidered millennium kneelers.

Separate but linked item?

We are also very conscious of our heritage and looking forward to sharing these with the

community during National Heritage Week, which runs from 10th-19th September 2021.

The church will be open each day as usual and will also be holding bookable events from Saturday 11th September through to Sunday 19th September, ranging from a choral evensong to a children's event and a history of the church told through the stained-glass windows.

The theme of "Feed our Soul" will encompass the history of important physical elements of the church building and the activities the church family undertake to nourish themselves. The church is always open from 9am-5pm Monday-Saturday and everyone is welcome to pop in at any time to enjoy the peace, learn more about the building and the church community and/or to take part in one of these our events.
