

From the Chairman

Helping the environment

We are delighted that BCA has been approved as a Plastic Free Bookham Community Ally, meaning we have moved away from single use plastic items for our kitchen and cleaning supplies.

- All crockery and cutlery provided to hirers is reusable and does not include single use plastics.
- We buy all supplies in bulk and refill soap dispensers etc. We do
 not provide washing up liquid as this should be provided by the
 hirer. Our dishwasher uses bulk bottles which can be refilled. Our paper towels come in



- people to refill their own bottles.
- We are encouraging users of the hall to consider their use of plastics in their activities.

Dealing with increasing costs

As with everyone we are finding our outgoings increasing. Maintaining a comfortable warm environment in our halls means our energy costs are substantial and will be going up considerably. We have maintained our hiring fees at 2019 levels and, thanks to Government help, reduced fees for our regular users to help them restart after Covid. We have, however, had to make the decision to increase our hiring fees by 15% for the year commencing 1st January 2023. The new rates are available from Roger and on our website.

Eastwick Schools

At Eastwick, our Library is at the heart of our school – the children love visiting with their classes and have already borrowed over 1,000 books in the first four weeks of the Autumn Term. Mrs. Brooks, our librarian and learning support assistant and Mrs. Cobb, our French Teacher and ELSA, also run a weekly Book Club which is hugely popular.

Their first session involved turning the Library into an Italian Bistro – complete with table cloths, LED candles, roses and atmospheric background music – where the children were

given book menus and asked to sample different genres at each table.

Based on the children's feedback, the following week saw the Library transformed into Hogwarts for a Harry Potter Theme. Book Club. Members received personalised invitations via Owl Post to attend their session via Platform 9¾, which now covered the doorway to the Library. Once inside, where there were lots of activities for them to choose from, they were greeted by Professor Brooks and Professor Cobb, as well as a special



Magical Creature (Penny the therapy dog).

The following week, Platform 9¾ magically disappeared but was replaced with a doorway of hanging ivy for the children to slip through as the Library became a jungle for wild animals. Tropical butterflies, cuddly gorillas, orangutans, crocodiles and tigers all hid amongst the foliage and books about Rainforests, Reptiles and other Wildlife. The children made butterfly origami and decorated monkey cupcakes whilst Mrs Brooks (dressed as a tiger) read from The Jungle Book.

The Library continued to be a fun jungle for the whole of the school to explore for the rest of the week. However, it will keep changing; future themes include Space, Mystery Crimes to Solve and Under the Sea. We are very lucky to be supported greatly by our PTA, The Friends, in keeping our stock updated! We are delighted to see the children engage so enthusiastically and love hearing their excitement when they talk about their Library.





South Bookham SPACE

The beautiful South Bookham SPACE is situated next to Chrystie Recreation Playground. It is a multifunctional, multipurpose building with on-site parking and three separate and distinct areas for hire.

The main area is available for event hires such as birthday parties at weekends. However, it also offers an extensive range of indoor activities for all ages; from TinyTalk and baby massage, to children's dance, a wide variety of Pilates classes for all levels of ability, Pole Fitness and Yoga. When hiring you will have access to a well-equipped kitchen and toilet facilities, and we can also provide chairs and tables for up to 60 people. We now have limited download WiFi throughout the building.

The Outer SPACE is a floodlit multi-use games area which hosts fitness sessions, tennis, 5-

aside soccer, netball and basketball. There is access to male & female changing rooms with showers and we can provide goals, nets and hoops.

The new Social SPACE extension is large enough to accommodate meetings, classes and social events for up to 12 people (depending on format), with kitchen facilities and a balcony overlooking the Outer SPACE. The Social SPACE facilities include a stairlift to the first floor and a hearing loop to encourage full accessibility. It is equipped with a projector and interactive whiteboard as aids to teaching and coaching.



Changes are afoot at St Nicolas Church



Sitting in the very heart of our village, St Nicolas Church is a beautiful, Grade 1 listed building. It's been there for around 1000 years during which it has evolved to meet the needs of the local community.

The last big change was in 1885 when the Victorians remodeled it to suit their style of worship. However, we are now in the 21st Century and parts of it are not accessible to people with limited mobility. It's cold and drafty in the winter, uncomfortable to sit in for any length of time, and inflexible.

We are excited to build on what we have inherited and create a building which better suits the needs of today's church and community and that:

- Is warmer in winter with a new, more efficient heating system that reduces our carbon footprint.
- Is accessible to those with restricted mobility and anyone with children in pushchairs.
- Is a flexible space with comfortable chairs rather than pews so that it can be used for a wide range of church and community events
- Has a better located font, reduced in height to make it safer and so that children gathered round can see the baptism.
- Respects the history of our ancient and much-loved building. Key elements of the church's past will be preserved. We will retain the Victorian chancel, the memorials,

the organ, the ancient screens and the fragments of Jacobean carving.

It is our aim to make everyone in the village feel that this is a space that they can use. If you belong to a village organisation that might like to use the church for an exhibition or community event we would like to hear from you at bftf@stnicolasbookham.org.uk.

We have the funds in place to pay for the initial building work. However, we need help to complete the transformation of the interior, with redecoration of the walls and, potentially, the cleaning of our beautiful stained glass windows. If you would like to contribute financially you can make a donation or 'sponsor a chair' at £250 each, either on your own or with a local group or with friends. All donors will, if they wish, be recorded in a special book rather than on plaques.

Just before half term, we held a Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts and Maths week. Our children in Year 1 and Year 2 were able to build and programme Lego models to make a fair ground. It was amazing



to see how quickly they learnt what they needed to do and to see the joy in their faces at what they were able to achieve.

We are looking forward to see what the next few terms bring for us and our children at Polesden Lacey Infant School.

Bookham Rifle Club – its origins



In order to keep enthusiasm going, and with the active encouragement of the Territorial Army and War Office, many Home Guard rifle clubs were formed, and Bookham H.G.R.C. came into official being at the first committee meeting held on 26th February 1943 at the Victoria Hotel. The village of perhaps 1500 souls in 1939 had doubled in population with evacuees, refugees, and the Canadian soldiers. The Victoria Hotel then at the village crossroads, became the Home Guard headquarters, and the land on the other side of the Guildford Road was the Grove Estate owned by Madam Haywood. The butts were the walls of an old greenhouse and from memory, there were three firing points in the open. If it rained, one got wet, The Grove range closed at the end of April 1952, and so ended

an era

In early 1952, an offer of the walled garden of Thorncroft Manor was made by the Leatherhead Council, at a nominal rent, if it could also be used by the other clubs in the area

The original lease was granted to the Leatherhead and District Rifle Club but, upon the collapse of the Leatherhead club, Bookham Rifle Club stepped in. This was 1953 - and with the help of tremendous locally sourced skills the club was up and running in 2 years.

Over many years of club successes at all ranges and all shooting disciplines, many competition cups, shields and trophies were started that are all able to be won by today's members, just showing how rich our heritage is.

1959 was the point where all ranges were open and County, national and international successes followed. Over the years much construction, rebuilds and extensions took place - suffering floods and storms in between. The biggest development made was from 2012 where a new clubhouse and indoor range was to be built. David Sprigg was

instrumental to this redevelopment, having secured the necessary funding from various sources to enable us to rebuild. The resulting facility is now regarded as one of the best in the south east of England.

The Club were very saddened by the loss of David in 2021, He had been battling cancer for some time. David was such an enthusiastic member of the Club having first joined at the age of 9, then re-joining the Club later in life.

David was passionate about teaching and introducing young people to the sport of shooting. Having founded the Stagecoach school of performing arts and, using that as his model, he co-founded with Jeanette Leviers, The Target Shooting School to teach your people the sport of shooting. It is a testament to David's enthusiasm that the School has grown in a very short time from one venue at the Club to ten throughout Surrey, Sussex and Kent.

In honour of David we invited his wife Dee and members of his family to the AGM in June so that Dee could officially unveil the new David Sprigg Clubhouse

Lamp to save the day and get him back to his family and Princess Jasmine in Cairo.



classrooms with accessible facilities for people with disabilities, dark room, staff room and study rooms. Since then many other projects funded by the Friends have been completed.

How to clean your nest boxes

If you have a nest box or two in your outdoor space, you have already done something brilliant for the birds in your backyard. But to help make it safer you should clean it.

Why do we need to clean nest boxes?

The nests of most birds are also home to fleas

and other parasites, which can remain and then harm young birds that hatch the following year. By removing old nests you are helping to give the chicks the best start in life.

When to do it:

The ideal time boxes should be cleaned is in the autumn, from September onwards, once the birds have stopped using the box.

You can clean it in the winter, but the earlier in the season the better, to avoid any early nesters. If you decide to do it later in the winter it is best to observe the nest first to make sure no-one has moved in.

What do I have to do?

- 1 First remove your nest box from its location. If you have to use a ladder it is always best to have someone else around to help and to hold it steady.
- 2 Once down, most good nest boxes have a removable lid or a hatch so you can clean inside. Depending on the design, you may need a screwdriver.
- 3 Once open put on your rubber gloves and remove as much of the old nest as possible. Often they come out whole so you can see all the different materials the bird has used to make its home!
- 4 If you find eggs in the box which haven't hatched, these can only be removed legally between September and January (August-January if you're in Scotland) - and must

- then be disposed of. Do double check the nest is no longer active as some species can nest right through September.
- 5 Scrape away any remaining debris and then carefully pour boiling water into the nest, to kill any harmful bugs. DO NOT use insecticides or flea powders.
- 6 Let the nest box dry out thoroughly before closing it back up.
- 7 If you have hay or wood shavings available, these can be put into the box to increase birds or mammals using it for shelter over winter.
- 8 Put the nest box back up and look forward to spring, when hopefully some birds will choose it as their new home!
- 9 Make sure you thoroughly wash your hands, arms and any clothes which come into contact with the nest box.

Can I take a peek inside the nest box at any other time of year?

It is best not to. Birds like to be left alone to raise their young, with some abandoning their nest if they think it has been discovered.

We have enjoyed welcoming back our existing families and our new children this

term. New relationships are growing and blossoming for the children and staff.

Children have started this term by doing some fun autumnal activities. These included using many natural resources they collected with parents help while out and about These resources were used in our craft area making an autumn display as well as in our outside area and discovery tray.

The children were also proud to make apple



crumbles where they chopped up their own apples and made the crumble mix. With the remaining apples (and other veg) they also did apple/veg printing.

This term we are including 'PLAN DO REVIEW' time in our daily routine for all children at the start of each morning. All staff had training on this last term and straight away could see the benefits this would have on children.

Every morning, as soon as children arrive, they take part in a small group active learning/open ended activity with their Key Person. This activity is carefully chosen to extend children's learning and language.

After small group has finished children will be asked what they 'plan' to do next in the setting. Children may let staff know by a look or gesture to an area especially, if very young, or by speaking to their key person, or even symbolise their idea in a simple drawing. The adult will then note the children's ideas.

Depending on the child's age/stage they may communicate their plan by language/gestures, either or both. This is the 'PLAN' stage. The children will then go on to what they planned to do, the 'DO' part. A little later their Key Person will ask each child how their plan went



and what they did. This is the 'REVIEW' part.

This addition to the session has many benefits for the children. It encourages them to think critically, plan ahead, use their memory, develop concepts of time and order and helps them develop confidence.

Celebrating Success at The Howard

The Howard celebrated record results at both KS5 and KS4. Impressively, the school bucked the national trend at both key stages with our results improving on our 2021 outcomes, and putting us among the top schools in Surrey and nationally.

At KS5, 19% of our grades were A*, and 47% of our grades were A*/A compared with 40% in the South East. 92% of our grades were C or above, with the national average being 82%. 10 students achieved 3 or more A* grades at A Level, with one of our students being identified as the top performer nationally in A Level Physics, and another achieving five A* grades. Most importantly, our students achieved the grades that they needed to do what they wanted to do next.

At KS4, 45% of grades were 9-7 compared to 27% nationally. Our grade 5+ pass rate (considered a 'strong pass') is 80% vs 60% nationally, and our grade 4+ pass rate (considered a 'standard pass') is 90% vs 75% nationally. 6 students achieved 10 x Grade 9s at GCSE, and the vast majority of students 'added value' to the grades which they were predicted across all subjects. Again, students achieved what they needed to take their next steps, with large numbers returning to our 6th Form, and others going on to Colleges or 6th Forms elsewhere.

We are incredibly proud of the achievements of all of our students, particularly given the additional stresses of Covid-19 and other events over the last couple of years.
