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EDITORIAL

In this article the Sports Editor has been invited to express his personal views, it being understood that they are not necessarily those of the Booknam Community

Association.]

On 31st December, 1950, after a brief existence of rather less than two years, the Bookham Sports Association was wound up.

It is not for us to go closely into the reasons for this rapid decline and eventual fall. The natural suspicion of innovation in this village—and this was innovation on the grand scale and Bookham, for all its recent growth, remains very much a village --- was one cause. To this may be added. first, the refusal of one of the biggest of the local clubs to join the Association; secondly, a feeling that too many of its leading personalities had no real connection with Bookham; and, finally, the fact that it was basically concerned almost solely with the financial aspect of local sport.

Yet in so far as it was intended to be a Sports Clubs' Union the conception of the Association was good. There are in Bookham some eleven clubs running ten different sports; and eleven cooperating clubs, with their combined membership would constitute a formidable body. In association they could avoid some of the contretemps which have blotted the history of Bookham sport from time to time. The Bowling Club actually came into existence in circumstances which

set it at odds with the Cricket Club, as a result of the decision of the 1934 Leatherhead Council that the only place in Bookham where a bowling green could be laid was in the corner of the cricket field, where it would reduce the boundary of that field to the most ludicrously short distance; and since the war we have had disagreement over the proposed new pavilion, which must have contributed in some degree to the delay over its erection.

One suggestion that might well be given consideration at a later date is for occasional meetings at regular intervals-if only once a quarter-of a Council of Club Secretaries, at which problems arising between local clubs, or between the clubs and outside bodies, could be discussed and action taken. concerted The suggested body could include representatives of local youth organizations, and might then be able to tackle the problem of the virtual absence-apart from the Junior Section of the Football Club-of sporting provision for the under-18's in Bookham.

Such a Council could, of course, have only an advisory status (we are not advocating any weakening of the powers of the duly elected committee of any club), and there are other difficulties, such as the secrecy of a club's committee proceedings; but if these could be overcome real benefit to the village might come from this or any other arrangement which would make for more united action by its sports clubs.

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BOOKHAM CAMERA CLUB

By the time these words are in print the first signs of spring will be well on the way and how many of you will have said, "Oh! What a picture those snowdrops are!" Well, why not make a picture of them—photographically?

Modern films, both in colour and monochrome, make photography a most delightful pastime and one within reach of all of us. Psychologically it is of the greatest benefit in these troubled times, and helps us to relax and forget for a while all our workaday trials and tribulations.

For a lot of people photography never gets beyond what the enthusiast terms the "snapshot" stage; you know—"Father on the beach" or "View from Land's End"! To some people, however, the question arises—Where do we go from here? One gets to the point when snapshotting no longer satisfies and a certain sense of frustration and a wish to do better things, sets in.

Now is the time to join a club.

There are so many advantages to be found in a club that it is impossible to enumerate them all here, but there is no doubt at all that it is the quickest and easiest way to producing good photographs. You will find, upon joining a club, that members are most anxious to help in every way and you quickly discover how to correct all those mistakes that you were making whilst working alone. No longer will the small contact prints—done by the chemist satisfy you. You will want to start doing your own developing and making your own enlargements.

When this stage is reached you will be entering your prints in the club's monthly competitions, and having your work constructively criticized by fellow members. This ariticism is one of the most valuable features of club life—without it you could go on for years and get nowhere.

Now, having decided that you would like to join a club, what better than one which is on your own doorstep - The Bookham Camera Club? This Club has been in existence since 1946 and. though not large, stages a yearly exhibition which would do credit to an organization four or five times its size. It is probably the only club in the country which has its headquarters in a village. although its members come from places as far away as Oxshott and Ashtead. Members meet at 7.45 every Friday evening at The Croft, Church Road, Great Bookham, to hear a lecture or to compete in one of the monthly competitions or watch a practical demonstration on photographic technique and so on.

Mr. Fred Barford, well known in the district as the founder and proprietor of The Victory Press which printed this *Bulletin* for many years, died on the 14th January at the age of 67. He had lived in the village for about 20 years and one of his great interests was the Bookhams Bowling Club, of which he was President last year.

Mr. R. Rowley, Hon. Secretary of the Club, writes: "The death of Fred Barford came as a profound shock to all members of the Bowling Club. He was one of the oldest members, and a Past President and Captain.

"On the green he was popular, friendly and generous; he was always and everywhere appreciated and welcomed. His memory will be treasured and his name will be held long in affectionate remembrance by all. The sympathy of the members is extended to Mrs. Barford and her daughters."

Sidney Madge

Your Editor has kindly asked me to contribute a few recollections of one of our oldest tradesmen, Mr. Sidney Madge, who passed to his rest on the 2nd February.

"A landmark has been lost to Bookham," was said by many people when the sad news became known.

When I first met him, nearly forty years ago, Mr. Madge was deeply immersed in village life. Among his many activities he was churchwarden, Parish Councillor and School Manager. He volunteered and served in France during the Firs. World War.

In his public life he was a tireless worker for the good of the community. Many people in Great Bookham have cause to remember his ready help and kindly sympathy in time of trouble. May I give just one instance of his practical kindness. In 1913 the headmaster of the village school was most anxious for the older boys to learn gardening. At once Mr. Madge placed a long strip of the Glebe field (which at that time he farmed) at the disposal of the schools. He took a great interest in the laying-out of the plots and the progress of the young gardeners.

So we leave him in the shadow of the old village church he loved so well and served so faithfully. May he rest in peace. E.E.G.

Amy Smith

We regret to learn of the death, on the 15th January, of Mrs. Amy Smith, a pioneer of cycling. She and her husband were the first pair to ride at 20 miles an hour on a tandem, and Mrs. Smith was believed to be the first woman cyclist to win prizes in open competition with men. Mr. and Mrs. Smith had cycled through Europe to Turkey, and their last cycling trip abroad was to Spain some 30 years ago, when Mrs. Smith was nearing her 60th birthday.

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
"BRITAIN AND FREEDOM ARE WORTH SAVING FOR"

The Bookham Ward, through its loyal and enthusiastic band of voluntary workers, makes a special appeal to all readers who are not at present members to join existing groups or new groups which it is hoped to form. By so doing they will not only be giving a ready response to the National Call, but will also help the Leatherhead and District Local Savings Committee, of which our Ward forms part, to make a good showing in increased membership when after the 31st March next the returns in connection with the competitions have to be sent in.

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BOOKHAM COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION Annual Meeting, 1951


The principal item on the agenda of this year's A.G.M. was the review of the year's activities, contributed by the Hon. Secretary, Mr. E. E. Oldershaw. He mentioned three notable achievements-the building of the openair stage at Polesden Lacey, the painting of the outside of the Barn Hall, and Village Day. All three had called for a great deal of concerted effort on the part of the members of the Association. and for the building of the stage they had had the co-operation both of the National Trust and the Leatherhead U.D.C. Village Day had attracted a large attendance and the Exhibition in the Barn Hall had been a great success with its portraval of "Bookhams, Past and Present"

Membership now exceeded 400 and during the year there had been formed under the auspices of the Association a Drama Group. an Over 20's Club and a Badminton Group; all were doing well, and the Table Tennis Club continued to flourish. The Women's Committee had earned the thanks of all members for their zeal in attending to the catering, both at the regular monthly socials and other events run by the Association. Thanks were due to the Bulletin Committee for their conduct of the Association's organ. the Bookhams Bulletin.

Dr. Waterfield (President) paid tribute to the work of the officers, hams Past and Present. especially Mr. Oldershaw and the Hon. Treasurer (Mr. L. P. H. Hansford). The Association continued to play its part in village life, he said, and had now undertaken to raise £5 towards the cost of inscribing the names of the 1939-45 war dead on the memorial. The statement of accounts showed the surplus on the general account for the year was £84. Village Day produced a profit of £16 14s., the Over 20's Club £9 13s, and the Old Time Dance Club £28 4s.: but the table tennis showed a small loss of 12s. Mr. Hansford said they had to face a loss of £75 revenue this year as a result of the transfer of the clinic and the library. That had to be made up in some way, preferably by a combination of increased membership and increased lettings. They also received a donation of £25 from the Old Time Dance Club.

Dr. Waterfield was unanimously re-elected President, Mr. C. V. Brayne Vice-President, Mr. Oldershaw Hon. Secretary, Mr. Hansford Hon. Treasurer, Mr. W. G. Stephens Hon. Auditor, and Mr. R. Calnan Membership Secretary.

Suggestions for the extension of the Association's activities were made and the Council were asked to bear in mind clubs for Over 60's, a stamp section, Debating Society, children's naturalist section, gramophone section and to consider the possibility of restaging the exhibition of Book-



Members pay 6d. per night, but visitors are welcome and come for 1d. per night for three weeks, after which they must become full members by joining the Community Association.



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
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SPORTS NEWS Bowling Club


Football Club


Gilmais Club


