Dear Member,

In the Leatherhead district we are surrounded on all sides by greenery so that in the areas furthest from the centre the lush growth is almost to be compared with the scenes described in Thomas Hardy's "Woodlanders." OCCASIONAL PAPER No. 2 "The Dame, The Prisoner and The Pewterer" by G.J.Gollin, M.A., C.Eng., has now been received from the printers. It relates to the Manor of Little Ashtead 1671 - 1851. Mr. Gollin is a member of our Society and lives at Ashtead.

Mary Knightley, the daughter of a wealthy citizen of Kingston upon Thames, married Aquila Wyke, Governor of Westminster Abbey Gatehouse prison. When her second husband, Sir Edward Broughton, died she became Governor and inherited his estates in North Wales. Eventually, these, together with the estates in Kingston, Leatherhead and Ashtead, owned by her brother Sir Robert Knightly, became the property of the London pewterer, Aquila Dackombe, direct descendant of her daughter Mary Wyke. The Ashtead estate included the Old Court and the White House farm, the Manor of Lower Ashtead.

<u>Autumn/Minter 1977/1978</u> Mole Valley Adult Education service will be organising 10 lectures at Therfield School on Monday evenings on the subject of the History and Antiquities of the Leatherhead district. It is expected that enrolment for the series will cost about £6. but any member who would like to participate will be contributing indirectly to the Museum fund because the lecturers from our Society (four) have kindly agreed to donate their fees. ARCHAEOLOGY - contributed by S.R.C.Poulter

Members of the Society have been assisting every Saturday since the beginning of april in excavating a section through Stane Street, between Headley and Ashtead, directed by Lady Rosamund Hanworth for the Surrey Archaeological Society. The base of the Roman Road and a ditch have been uncovered but it seems that most of the metalling had been removed before a mediaeval boundary bank was thrown up over them. Plough marks in the natural chalk have been found that apparently pre-date the road and, just as the work was ending, the remains of a wall, near the edge of the present bridle way, probably built with some of the flint metalling, have been uncovered.

Surrey Archaeological Society excavators are moving on to a hill fort at Hascombe but in addition to this, there can arise the need for volunteer excavators from our own Society for swift action in our district. LEATHERHEAD MULEUN AND HERITAGE CENTRE - contributed by D. Bruce.

The plans finally agreed between the sub-committee and the Architect have been passed by County and Mole Valley Councils. Various quotations have been received and after much deliberation, the work has been awarded to a local builder who impressed the committee with his keen interest in the building and the work of the Society - also his terms were favourable.

Work has now begun at the rear to jack up the structure, demolish shoddy repair work and insert new foundations and damp courses where these are presently non-existent. Members will now see exposed much of the wooden frame which unfortunately is in poor condition or missing altogether. The timber floors at ground lever, which are not original, will be removed and the ground lowered by about 6" before laying new concrete floors, thus ensuring dry feet and sufficient headroom.

This first phase of the work will fall within our present financial resources, but the subsequent phases will not, so that members are urged to make every endeavour to tap all sources of cash in order that the restoration can be a continuous operation. Mr. Fortescue is leading a fund raising team and all contributions, ideas, suggestions etc. should be sent to him. For example, has anyone an empty shed or garage which would be a collecting centre for waste paper? Have you thought of charging admission to see your mini-stately home, historic treasures and garden? Offers of help concerning building matters - cheap or free materials (urgently required sound oak timber, quite short pieces in some cases could be useful), labour skilled or unskilled (decorating, simple carpentry or skilled joinery, etc.) should be sent to our 'Clerk of the Works', Alan Christian Tel.
