The future programme is at the moment being arranged by various members on the Committee, each one of them taking responsibility for an outing or lecture. We hope this will produce a programme of the usual high standard, but it is an interim measure, and a full-time Programme Secretary is urgently needed.

NEWSLETTER DELIVERIES

Each of the areas of Ashtead, Leatherhead, Bookham & Effingham, and Fetcham, has a person who takes charge of the Newsletters for their area, sorts them and delivers them to the appropriate distributor - and in some cases undertakes to deliver some Newsletters himself. LEATHERHEAD MUSUM COMMITTEE

Since the inception, in 1976, of the project of buying and restoring Hampton Gottage as a Museum of Local History, the Museum Committee has been mainly concerned with fund raising and the restoration. These tasks have been large fulfilled : only the toilet needs to be built, for which funds are still needed.

It is felt that a new stage in the Museum's history has been reached, and that the composition of the committee needs to be changed, with greater emphasis on the running and presentation of the museum. It it suggested that the committee should include in its members a representative of the Society (the Chairman or his nominee), the Curator, the Museum Treasurer, the Museum Secretary, a representative of the Museum Trustees, a Maintenance Manager, a Publicity Officer and a Museum Manager.

The Maintenance Manager would be responsible for looking after the fabric of Hampton Cottage and its outbuildings, and should therefore have some experience in building techniques and would have a team of "willing volunteers" to do any work under his direction, or, if necessary, arrange for the work to be done by professionals.

A Publicity Officer is badly needed - the success or failure of any endeavour frequently rests on the effectiveness of any publicity.

The Museum Manager looks after the day to day running of the museum, ie he/she organises the Stewards rotas, the cleaning of the interior, and the tending of the garden. Ralph Hume currently fills this post admirably, assisted by Joe Parry and Roberta McNulty. The garden has yet to be laid out properly - we hope to do this shortly and gardeners will be needed.

The Curator, David Bruce, is responsible for organising the displays within the museum, and requires assistance in the planning and execution of the displays, which includes display furniture, staging, caption writing, typing etc. Vernon Wildgoose presently assists with his excellent notices and captions, but other and similar skills are required. Display cases are terribly expensive to buy, but fairly simple to construct by a reasonably skilled carpenter/joiner. The artistic and imaginative arrangement of exhibits within the cases greatly enhances the attraction of any display.

The Museum Treasurer is John Bull.

Volunteers are therefore required for the following: a Maintenance Manager and handyman/ woman assistants; a Publicity Officer able to write appropriately to the media and other contacts (schools, clubs etc); Curator's assistants able to undertake display work, "window dressing", or carpentry, and to help plan future displays; and gardeners.

Similar appeals for help from members have been made in the plat, with mixed results (sometimes with a deadly silence) and it may be that we shall need to look outside the Society for the volunteers needed. So if you are unable to offer your own services, perhaps you know of someone not a member who might be willing to spare a little of his or her time and skills in the jobs outlined above.

RICHARD HUCK, PHOTOGRAPHER, LEATHERHEAD

We are indebted to our early local photographers, more than any other group of people, for our knowledge of how our area looked up to one hundred years ago; therefore it is only right that we should try to learn as much about them as possible. Recently we mentioned photographers Parrett, Youell and Warren. Now a further name can be added - Richard Huck of St John's Road, Leatherhead. We have just been given a photograph of a group of workmen working on a building at St John's School, Leatherhead, and it is estimated that the date is about 1880. References to Richard Huck appear in Kelley's Directories for 1882 and 1890 but not in those for 1874 or 1899.

Information regarding Richard Huck would be welcomed - he gave the photograph we have the reference number 7714, so there could be many more examples of his work about.

ARCHAEOLOGY NEWS

A watch has been kept on the work being done in the construction of the M25 Motorway. One area has produced a number of pieces of Romano-British and Iron Age pottery, some of it being dated to the middle of the first century. In addition there have been finds of Roman roofing and floor tiles together with pieces of burnt clay daub and nails. Over the whole area there have been struck flint flakes, some with secondary working.

Redevelopment of the Bridge Street Pharmacy site at the top of Bridge Street, Leatherhead, has revealed a well similar to the one in the garden of Hampton Cottage. It had been partially filled in before it could be examined and seems to have been used as a soakaway after it went out of use as a water supply. When found the bottom was dry and the depth was 23 feet below the present surface. The bowls of two clay pipes and several pieces of pipe stem were also found on the site. One has the initial "J" on the left hand side of the spur but the other side is too corroded to be decipherable.

CHURCHYARD SURVEY

The Women's Institute of Bookham are carrying out a survey of the St Nicholas Churchyard. They are making a record of all gravestones and noting the flora and fauna in the churchyard.
