Remembrance Day, 1939

There are no members of the community more in need of assistance than the incapacitated ex-service men who, as the result of their war service, have broken down in health and are not

in receipt of a pension.

Since the inception of the Poppy Day Appeal, and thanks to a generous public, it is possible to give limited assistance. With increased funds at the disposal of the British Legion Poppy Day Appeal, a far greater work could be done to help these men who helped their country in its time of need. Thanks to the splendid work of the local organiser and those ladies and gentlemen responsible for the sale of poppies, a gradual increase has taken place in the Bookham Ward, and as stated in the Bulletin last year the sum of £94 was realised. It would indeed be a magnificent gesture on the part of the residents of Bookham to give a trifle more on November 11th next, in order to raise a sum of £100.

Regarding the administration of the fund, the local benevolent committee of the British Legion render assistance to all ex-service men and their dependents irrespective of membership of the British Legion or otherwise, and no expenses are incurred in its local administration. It cannot be too strongly emphasised that no genuine case is ever turned down, and records show that nothing is left undone to assist the needs of those who served in the Great War be in employment or the burial of the destitute.

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Air Raid Precautions.

Since July last, various leaflets have been issued from the office of the Lord Privy Seal to every householder in the country. These leaflets are of paramount importance, and must surely be a guide in the matter of civil defence.

There may be some residents in the Bookhams who are not in possession of these leaflets, and whilst not spreading alarmist propaganda we feel that we shall be supplying a public need by giving information from time to time.

Perhaps it would be as well to summarise these leaflets. No. 1 entitled "Some things you should know if war should come" deals with Air Raid Warnings, Gas Masks, Lighting Restrictions, Fire Precautions, Evacuation, Identity Labels, Food, and Instructions to the Public in the case of emergency.

No. 2 Masking your windows. No. 3 Evacuation. No. 4 Your Food and Water in War-time. Copies of these leaflets can be obtained from your local Council Offices.

Without doubt the most vital and important part of our Civil Defence scheme is the Street Warden, and in this matter your attention is drawn to the present disposition of the Wardens in the Bookhams Ward, but if in doubt, consult the Divisional Warden Mr. James Douglas, Ednam House, Gt. Beyond the above list there is still required the following to make Civil Defence measures effective, not only in the Bookham Ward but the whole area covered by the Leatherhead Urban District: A.R.P. Wardens, A.F.S., Stretcher Bearers, Rescue Parties, Decontamination, Report Centre and Messengers.

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For War Pensioners

Complaints have been received from war pensioners regarding Life Certificates No. 2D., on the grounds that this Certificate is in the form of an open post card, and thereby gives undesirable publicity to a pensioner's award.

A new Life Certificate has been in use now for nine years and the information on the post card is not available for inspection by anyone other than the pensioner who posts the form, Post Office officials, and Pensions officials.

It has however been possible to arrange with the Ministry of Pensions that any pensioner who objects to using an open post card may, if he so desires, return the post card to the Ministry of Pensions in a sealed envelope, postage free.

Re-enlisted Service Pensioners. The War Office has advised that Service Pensioners, re-enlisting on a special attestation for the period of a National Emergency, or rendering mobilised or embodied service on a non-regular attestation during such an emergency, receive their pensions during this further service, which does not count for increase of pension.

A Service Pensioner re-enlisting on a normal engagement in the Regular Army would cease to draw his pension (except pensions for distinguished conduct) but would be eligible to receive revised pension award admissable to his case on his final discharge.

National Health Insurance Fund—War Pensioners. Special provision was made in the National Health Insurance Act of 1936 whereby war pensioners whose insurance under the National Health Insurance Fund has lapsed may be entitled to free medical benefit. The prescribed conditions for the grant of such medical benefit which is given by the Navy, Army and Air Force Insurance Fund, are:—

 The man must have been discharged from His Majesty's Forces during the period of the late War, that is between 4th August, 1914 and 31st August, 1921

2. He must be in receipt of a War Disablement Pension.

3. His total income from all sources must not exceed £160 a year. Medical benefit consists of free Doctor and medicine only, and does not include any cash payments during illness.

All applications for medical benefits under these special arrangements should be addressed to the Local Insurance Committee, the address of which can be obtained from any Post Office, or the Hon. Sec. local Branch of British Legion.

Women's Voluntary Service.

The Women's Voluntary Service for Civil Defence is making detailed arrangements in connection with the reception of the official refugees who may be expected in Great and Little Bookham. They will come from the Leatherhead Central Schools by bus to the schools at Townshott, Great Bookham, where the work of finding them suitable billets will be carried out under the direction of Mr. H. Bostock (Billeting Officer) and Mrs. Bowen, W.V.S. Key Women, with a staff of assistants recruited from those who have not undertaken any other form of A.R.P. work.

It is anticipated that a canteen primarily for the service of a mid-day meal to the children coming to the villages, will be established at the Old Barn Hall, with Mrs. S. Madge as canteen organiser.

Women who are unable to undertake more active work are invited to enrol with W.V.S. for the making of hospital supplies, for which depots will be established at convenient centres in the district.

Volunteers are urgently required for clerical and canteen work and more helpers are required for assisting to organise play centres and out door games. Full details may be obtained from Miss R. 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
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Fetcham's Story

(concluded.)

Fetcham Church was built in the 12th century but many alterations have taken place. The tower was altered and rebuilt in the 17th and 18th centuries. In 1877 the South Aisle was pulled down and rebuilt. In 1877 the Chancel was restored, a reredos erected and a vestry built by the Rev. G. Moon in memory of his father the late Sir F. Moon, Bart. In the tower are three bells, the treble bearing the inscription William Eldridge made mee 1665," the second "Robertus Mott me jecit 1588," the third is by William Land 1613. The registers commenced in 1559. In the Burial Register dated February 28th, 1697 are particulars of an unknown wanderer found dead from exposure on Fetcham Downs. Local legend has identified this man as being the Judge Jeffry's butler who informed the law officers where his master might be found at Leatherhead. This traitor hoped to receive the reward of f 1000 on his master's head. time of the Parliamentary wars, the Rev. Thomas Turner, a loyalist, was seized in Fetcham Church at Evensong by troopers, being charged with having sent £120 to the King. His surplice, with orange sash, was ripped off and worn by a trooper. They strapped him on to a spare horse and in this manner carried him to the White Lion Prison, Southwark. Twenty years passed before he became free again. In that period he suffered many harships and was robbed of the whole of his possessions.

In the old vestry book minutes of Leatherhead Town are several items in which Fetcham is mentioned:—

"March 4th, 1721. An assessment to be made at 2d. in the pound for to discharge the House of Corrections and maimed soldiers."

"December 15th, 1723. Whereas Mary Puckneld hath a swelling in her legg it is ordered Mr. Geo. Aitkenhead should care of it, and the parish will satisfy him."

(Mr. G. A. was an apothecary at Leatherhead).

"April 12th, 1751. Ordered that no poor be relieved without having the badge on."

"April 19th, 1754. Agreed that John Matthew do take Mary Boughton for two whole years as a servant, gratis, and to find her in all necessaries during the said time in health and sickness and to leave her in good repair."

"April 2nd, 1795. The Parishes of Leatherhead and Fetcham were to provide two men to serve in His Majesty's Navy. John Ragg and Daniel Windsor volunteered and were paid six guineas each."

"March 24th, 1805. A rate of $4\frac{1}{2}$ d in the pound was to be raised to meet the penalty of £44 7 8 assessed on the Parish for having failed to raise the men for the permanent and additional force of the Realm."

Connected with Fetcham Park are tales of money and treasure supposed to have been hidden by one of the Hankey family, also of underground passages, leading out of the Park.

In our time all roads surrounding it have been deeply trenched for main drainage, but so far no trace of the treasure has been found. Fetcham may well feel proud of its fine Village Hall. This delightful old barn was built in 1750, by the Howard family, then in possession of the Eastwick Manor. Built entirely by the manorial workmen, its fine oak beams chopped out with the adze by those old craftsmen from timber grown on the estate.

Fetcham's story ends and we leave its old houses full of romance and the memories of many generations who lived, loved and enjoyed their lives to the full in the light of their times as they knew them, fearing God and honouring the King, a kindly, sturdy, yeoman race, the soul and backbone of old England.—Anon.

The Bookhams Need.

This village is similar in many respects to others in Surrey, inasmuch that it has its Football, Cricket, Bowls and other Sports Clubs, but unlike others there is no connecting link, each club operating separately, which is sometimes a disadvantage. In many country villages one finds a general Sports Club housed in a comfortable building, with its own particular section for the various games. Many industrial firms also similarly provide for their employees' recreation.

It is not only for players of outdoor games that such accommodation is needed, as Badminton, Table Tennis, and other indoor games could be played during the winter months. Beyond this it is a recognised fact that many residents in Bookham possess good dramatic talent which could be used to brighten the social life of the village. (When referring to "Bookham," Little Bookham is also included, and the Bowling Club realised this before styling themselves "The Bookhams.")

The government has urged its "Keep Fit" Campaign, and what could be more desirable than that the various sections of sport in Bookham should get together and endeavour to secure central accommodation where they could meet and obtain beneficial exercise by indulging in the particular games that they play.

Of course the big question is finance; but surely there must be many of the residents of Bookham who figure on the sports clubs' fixture programmes as Vice-Presidents who would be only too willing to assist in this way.

Two Useful Hints.

In cases of indigestion, relief has been experienced by taking this mixture: Upon two ounces of camomile flowers pour some boiling water, and let it stand till cold; then strain, and add a little bicarbonate of soda. One teaspoonful to be taken three times a day.

In making paste for household use it is a good plan to add a teaspoonful of powered alum to the mixture of boiled flour and water. The paste keeps twice as long and is more than twice as strong as when made without the alum.

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
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
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
