Historic Bookham station on track for a full refurbishment thanks to Network Rail

Work is underway to refresh Bookham station, a Grade II listed building in Surrey, to improve passenger journeys and preserve the much-loved structure.

The work – which is likely to take about six months – will take place while the station is open and will not affect South Western Railway services.

The main focus is to repair the station's structure, which unfortunately has been plagued with wet rot, a fungus that attacks timber. Teams from Network Rail and its contractor Osborne will also replace a large section of the roof.

Engineers will also refurbish and repaint the station's footbridge – which is also Grade II listed – with most of that work taking place at night when there are no passengers.

As a result of the work on the roof, passengers will not be able to access the station building, and a temporary ticket office has been built in the car park. Once the affected timber is removed, all of the floors and walls will need to be treated by chemicals before the station can be returned to its former glory.

Located on Church Road in Bookham, the station was opened in 1885 and has 2 platforms which provide train services to Guildford and London Waterloo via Epsom and Worcester Park.

Mark Killick, Network Rail Wessex route director, said: "We are delighted to be able to refresh the historic station at Bookham for the benefit of passengers and the local community.

"While the work is taking place on this Grade II listed station, we will try to keep noise to a minimum and apologise for any disruption.



Alan Penlington, South Western Railway customer experience director, said: "Our customers will see big improvements at Bookham station, and it will be great to see the footbridge restored to its former glory.

"We recognise these works will be disruptive, but the station will remain open and operational throughout. I'd like to thank our passengers for their patience whilst these vital works are carried out."

These are, of course, in the one room – the self-contained boiler room - that still has asbestos wall boarding which needs to be safely removed first. We have been assessing different solutions and quotations and work to replace them is starting this month so all should be cosy for the autumn.

Bookham Butterflies WI

Bookham Butterflies WI were very busy during lockdown helping a variety of local causes and enjoying a number of virtual meetings.

The committee organised a sponsored walk – undertaken by members within their own households – called "Mosey for Meals", raising an amazing £1,000 for Epsom and Ewell Foodbank. We joined forces with Leatherhead Rotary Club who were also fundraising and with their donations the overall total was an outstanding £8,000.

Butterflies members also gave almost £300 towards creating a hamper of ethical, organic skincare treats for staff at local care homes, some of whom have temporarily moved in. Our hampers went to Bellsgrove, Keswick and The Red House.

Meanwhile a group of Butterfly members - alongside many people from the wider local community - has spent the weeks of lockdown making a variety of essential items for local hospitals, medical practices, care homes and schools.

These include hundreds of scrubs, bags, headbands, mask adaptors, tabards, hats, isolation gowns, face masks and "trauma teddies". These knitted and crocheted cuddly

bears and gnomes wearing face masks were requested by the children's ward at the Royal Surrey Hospital in Guildford to comfort anxious children. Very close to home, we also made tabards and face masks for Eastwick and Oakfield Schools, as well as scrubs and masks for the Queen Elizabeth Foundation.

In total, almost 2,500 separate items (and counting!) have been made by a very generous group of amazing people from across the local community. The massive "making" operation was co-ordinated by Bookham Butterflies from the Fetcham Scout Hut, who very kindly gave us the use of their building.

Bookham Butterflies have been holding monthly meetings on Zoom while we are unable to meet up in person. We are delighted that almost 50 members joined us for each of our two virtual meetings so far, along with a couple of wonderful speakers In May. We heard from Adrienne Dines who talked about "The Art of Storytelling". In June our speaker was Tracy Harwood, owner of the "Fetch'em from the Cupboard" shops in Fetcham and Ashtead, who spoke about her mission to live life without plastic.

We have further speakers and activities planned for virtual monthly meetings in the near future and our two book groups are also continuing to meet online.

A place for all, time for all

As this article is being written we are coming out of the lockdown for covid-19. During the lockdown we have been keeping in touch with those we have

been regularly supporting. We are now looking at ways with social distancing we may be able to open our Coffee Shop again particularly on Saturday for our regulars who we have been in touch with us by phone.

The Language Hub has been running classes on Zoom which helps their students but would like to start up their regular face to face classes again. Hearing loss, lipreading classes and hearing aid assistance are looking at new ways of meeting but the lip-reading teaching has been doing some short videos and advice on line for our class. All of this has had its challenges!

However the Community Fridge has been growing week by week as we seek to help those who because of isolation, loss of jobs and poverty have valued the regular food bags they are receiving. All the food we distribute is helping to prevent food going to landfill. Besides this we had a wonderful donation of food from the Islamic Group in Leatherhead which has given more variety in

what we have been able to offer.

Many volunteers have come forward to enable all of this to happen for which we are so grateful and they come and pack or deliver regularly. As things built up most weeks over 150 bags have been going out on different days. Over and above this we are asked sometimes for emergency bags to go out to people who have no food until their next normal delivery. Some people say they no longer need support but then we get more



people coming on the list. It may be some while yet before these deliveries end but when we are able to allow people to come to the Baptist Church and look at and receive food the Community Fridge will be there available to everyone.

The Old Barn Hall Field, The Garstons and Mead Crescent

The field lies behind the Old Barn Hall, is owned by Mole Valley District Council and has been used as the venue for Bookham Village Day since, at least, 1948.

At the lower end the field opens out to The Garstons via a triangle of land left as an open space by the developers of the estate in 1956. On the North side there is access to Mead Crescent via a small plot of land also left by the developer.

These areas were adopted by Surrey County Council as Highways Land together with the roads, pathways and verges and have been maintained by them since that time. The Old Barn Hall is within the ownership of Bookham Community Association (a Registered Charity), and the field behind is in the freehold ownership of Mole Valley District Council.


The field is designated in the approved Local Plan as an open space, and this designation is expected to be maintained in an emerging review of the Local Plan which is due over the next few years.

When the freehold of the two separate parcels was offered for sale at auction recently it was hoped locally that bids would be modest and


purchase by local benefactors or even the local community might be possible via crowd funding. The fact that they formed part of the adopted public highway it was hoped would limit interest. Sadly, this was not to be. After an initial sale of the whole parcel at a price in excess of £60,000, the land was subdivided into two triangular parcels in The Garstons, and the separate plot in Mead Crescent.

The two Garstons plots sold at even higher figures and the Mead Crescent land was sold at auction last week for £66,000. In the meantime one the two subdivided areas in The Garstons was the subject of a planning application for a single house (subsequently withdrawn following over 80 local objections).

A group of local residents together with the BCA, the BRA and supported by local Councillors, are looking at ways to preserve these open spaces for the community. energy, and skills to our organization. You are and continue to be a member because of



Leatherhead Youth Project



Whilst finding new ways to do Youth Work during social distancing, we have also

celebrated 15 years since LYP started our first project in Leatherhead.

Youth Work Online

At LYP we have moved our projects online,

whilst we cannot meet, this has included posting interactive and informative social media posts every day of the week for our young people. We've also filmed weekly team challenges and hosted live online quizzes. All of these activities have kept up communications between our team and young people.

We have also been able to run some targeted small group work online, including a weekly Zoom call with a small group for games and discussions. Plus, a weekly game of Minecraft (an online video game), where our team and young people work together to build a village and survive on an island. So far, the Minecraft village includes five houses, a food shop and a beach with sun beds.

Our Counselling and Emotional Wellbeing

Team (previously named the One-to-One Team) have been able to keep up with many of their meetings with individual young people, through video calling and phone calls. Alongside this, our youth workers have weekly phone calls with some of the young people who regularly attend our projects, to stay in touch whilst we can't meet.

Offline, our team are finding more ways to serve the wider community and three of our team are volunteering with the local Community Fridge teams.

We are passionate about supporting local young people, we know this is such a difficult time for them, so we will continue to be available as much as possible and look to provide as many alternative ways of support as possible.

Bookham Library

Well, it certainly has been a strange few months. Public libraries in Surrey, in common with libraries throughout the country, have been closed but are now starting to emerge. They won't be quite as we remember them there will be no public computers or printing, no bus pass or blue badge applications, no newspapers and no seating, at least initially. As I write on 6th July, the following libraries are opening their doors for the first time in three months to offer a limited service - Camberley, Dorking, Egham, Epsom, Farnham, Godalming, Guildford, Horley, Oxted, Redhill, Staines,

Weybridge and Woking. Remember, your library card is valid in any public library in Surrey but don't forget to take it with you.

More libraries will reopen in the future but, in the meantime, do not worry about any books or DVDs that you may have on loan. All loans have been extended until at least 4th September so there is no need for you to take any action and no extra rental will be charged.

Surrey Libraries' online offer is continuing. If you haven't yet discovered the joy of walking miles whilst listening on headphones to

someone reading you a story then there is a treat in store for you! There are ebooks and eaudiobooks to suit all tastes and ages on the RBDigital and Borrowbox apps and Rhymetime and Storytime sessions continue online as well. Further information is available from the Surrey Libraries' webpage or phone 0300 200 1008 (Monday to Friday 9 to 5 and Saturday 10 to 12).

We look forward to welcoming you back into Bookham Library as soon as we possibly can.

Eastwick Road Church – United Reformed Church



Although all the church buildings in the village have been closed during the lockdown the Church has been open and active.

At Eastwick Road Church weekly 'In Touch' Newsletters are being produced with a message, hymns and prayers. The Newsletter gives contacts details of those who could help with shopping, prescription collecting etc.

St Nicolas Church and Bookham Baptist Church have used youtube to to live stream services thanks to the technical ability of some of its members! Many people have tuned into these.

Eastwick Road Church using a local shop and The Grange delivered a Cream Tea to those who were more socially isolated within the church community.

The Golden Years Team, from all the churches, has also been working with the staff at Keswick, leaving prayer and activity cards, and arranged to have some plants delivered from The Vineries for residents to plant up.

The Bookham Youth Project, currently based at St Nicolas Pastoral Centre, has been keeping in touch with the young people using all the

range of IT available, offering support and encouragement.

Many have never heard of Zoom before March but this has been a very valuable way of keeping in touch.

As from July 4th churches can hold services so all are carefully working out if they open for Sunday Service how they can operate safely with all the restrictions.

For everyone this has been a unique opportunity to look at how we'do' church, and serve the local community not just during the pandemic but in the future.



VICTORIA COTTAGES, HOME TO THE AMEYS AND OTHERS

Bookham U3A Social History Group researched two of the village's oldest surviving cottages during the 2020 lockdown. Familiar today as the pink premises of the dental practice England's House, the cottages at 28 and 30 High Street date back at least to 1548 when occupied by a Dame Elizabeth Durden.

They were known as Victoria Cottages from the 19th century. No 28 was called simply Victoria Cottage while its neighbour retained the earlier name England's. They were modified in the 17th century and have been separately occupied ever since. The dental practice arrived at No 30 in 1992 and now shares the freehold with a private owner of No 28. Originally covering two acres, the timber-framed cottages once had a hole in the roof for smoke release. An original wood staircase survives inside as well as ancient first floor windows.

For centuries a well in front of the cottages provided water and was still used by the tenant of No 28 until she died in 1990. Her name was Kate Amey and she had been born in Victoria Cottage in May 1899. Her parents, William and Emily, had married in 1890 and moved there in 1891. Their first child, George, died of tuberculosis in 1893 aged two. His sister Florence was a few months old. Two further daughters were born, Alice in 1895, and Kate in 1899. Four months later William himself succumbed to TB at 39. Emily remained for the rest of her life.

The 1901 census shows the widow Emily, 37, earning her living as a laundress, living with her daughters. Their neighbours in England's were bricklayer John and Amelia Atkins who

had lived there for at least 20 years before that. John died in 1906 and Amelia in 1910. In 1906 Emily Amey started working at the Barn Hall as caretaker and cleaner and did similar work at St Nicolas Church. She remained at both until retiring aged 85 and dying in 1959 aged 95. To the end she scrubbed floors and trudged along the High Street in all weathers, washing the church robes using water from her cottage well.


From 1939 onwards Kate shared both her mother's home and work, taking over the tenancy alone 20 years later. The rent had been fixed since the turn of the century and she refused any review so the cottage was never modernised with running water or electricity. She died in 1990 and was buried at the church. Victoria Cottage increased in value dramatically after her death and the property was sold with a share of freehold in 1999 for £162,000. In 2016 it fetched £350,000.

No 30 had a different history. A series of families lived there - some for decades - including the Crockfords before the Atkinses and from 1917 the Scotts. Some were gardeners. Local solicitor Stephen Fortescue owned both cottages from the mid-1950s onwards and installed a modern water system in England's as well as upgrading the garden. He lived there himself for a while but No 30 was then occupied on and off for many years, sometimes as commercial premises until 1992.

During what should have been a year of triumphant celebrations marking their 40th anniversary, no-one could have imagined that the whole series of events would have to be cancelled, along with all the group walks.

Despite this crushing blow our group was quick to evolve to the challenges of the new

order. We rapidly responded to the situation by setting up weekly Zoom meetings so members could stay in contact and support one another. An online monthly magazine quickly followed, making its first appearance in April with articles and contributions from within our own ranks. Telephone calls to those particularly isolated were undertaken by our Chairman to keep them connected.

The website was regularly amended to reflect the ever changing situation and finally our popular MVR Social Facebook Group page gave members a chance to share their experiences during lockdown. They included photos along with accounts of their individual walks, glimpses into their beautiful gardens, advice on what might be good to watch or listen to and even regular musical contributions from one particularly talented person.

Over the years great friendships have been forged within the group and clearly these

strong bonds have remained intact during these difficult times. The group is looking forward to the time when the restrictions have been lifted and group walks are able to recommence

In the meantime we were aware that many people were attempting to walk alone or in small groups of family and friends and could benefit with an update to enhance their navigation skills to safely and confidently enjoy the countryside.

As a result, Mole Valley, East Surrey and Woking Ramblers collaborated to launch an innovative online workshop giving members of other Surrey Ramblers Groups an opportunity to improve their use of map and compass along with an introduction to using digital aids.

We all know that walking is good for your physical and mental health but what is often overlooked is that being part of a group is equally beneficial in its own right.

Firstly, I would like to thank the local community for all your support and heartfelt messages, we are so grateful to you and hope everyone is keeping safe.

Along with everyone else, this pandemic has had an unprecedented effect on The Grange. We support over 125 people a week who either live on our main site in Bookham, off site in flats owned by The Grange or at home with relatives. In a normal week the people we support access a full programme of sessions to teach them new skills and enrich their daily lives. They include cooking, gardening, woodwork, creative arts, our social enterprises: books beyond words, fudge making, creating mugs, plus running our cafes: Simply Scones, Cuppa and Cake and The Dorking Café.

We also have two shops; The Grange at No 5 in

Bookham and Inspirations in Dorking, currently still closed. We provide numerous social activities, including sports, bike rides and lots of evening clubs. Many of our people have regular work-experience placements and are missing that social interaction with the businesses, schools, nurseries and shops who so generously welcome them each week.

As soon as the Coronavirus hit restrictions on visitors to our main site in Bookham were put in place, and our shops, cafes and all off-site activities stopped. All immediate fundraising activities were postponed or cancelled which will have a long-lasting impact on our income. And our regular visiting corporate teams, who not only help around our site but often fundraise for us too, can no longer visit.

With our usual sessions stopped more one-toone activities have been implemented instead, for example going for a walk around our lovely grounds, taking part in different arts and crafts, plus tending our fabulous walled garden. Activity packs have been posted to those no longer visiting or living on our site, providing a welcome distraction and keeping their skills going!

For a person with a learning disability any change in their usual routine has a big impact on them. Our amazing staff are doing everything possible to keep in touch with and support not only the disabled adults who attend our services, but our team of 120 volunteers, parent carers and other stakeholders.
