#### PROGRAMME NEWS

Friday, April 22nd	Lecture at the Red Cross Hall at b p.m. "Through Ireland by water and some lost towns", by Mr.L.A.Edwards, one of our Ashtead members. Mr. Edwards is well known for his connections with the Inland Waterways Association, for his famous guide book to the waterways and to our members for his beautiful slides of canal and river scenery.
Saturday, May 14th	Visit at 2.30 p.m. to Betchworth House by courtesy of Major-General E.n.Goulbourne. Numbers are limited to 30 and thus we can only admit members.
Saturday, June 11th	Visit by coach to Stratford upon Avon, leaving Leatherhead at 8.00 a.m. Cost per seat is £3.25. There will be the usual additional picking up points at Great Bookham, Fetcham and Ashtead.
Saturday, July 2nd	A walk through the village of Shere. Our guide will be a member of the Shere and Gomshall Local History Society. The meeting place will be in the car park of the Shere Village Hall, near the recreation ground, at 2.30 p.m.
Saturday, July 23rd	Annual General Meeting of Surrey Local History Council at the Literary Institute, Egham High Street, Egham, at 2.00 p.m. After the A.G.M., a visit to the local museum, tea, a walk round Egham Church and visit to Holloway College Art Gallery. Finish 5 p.m. Some of our members have been to these meetings in previous years and as a result we have no hesitation in recommending that a strong contingent from our Society should be present.
August and September	We are hoping to arrange a walk through Guildford and a visit to Pains Hill, Cobham. Details will be given in the next Newsletter.

Friday October 14th The Dallaway lecture at 8 p.m. in the hall of the City of London Freemen's School, Ashtead Park. The lecture will be on some aspects of the history of gardening in England and will be illustrated. This is to be given by Dr. John Harvey, FSA, FRSL, FSG., Consultant Architect to Winchester College and a member of our Society.

November Lecture at the Red Cross Hall to be arranged.

Saturday 26th November Symposium at Dorking Halls, subject 'Brewing and Inns in Surrey'. Here is a subject of interest to all, as it takes us back in history as far as you can wish to go. In respect of the local visits the Society has incurred expenses in previous years which will not be any less in the current year. As no charge is usually made for a local visit and because the Society's funds are not increasing, it is proposed to make an administration charge of 10 pence per member per local visit. This will be collected from participating members at the time of the visit but no charge will be made for children.

#### SUBSCRIPTION 1977

In the last Newsletter 1 promised to remind you that to be a practising member of our Society it is necessary to pay the subscription of £2. to Mrs. C. Barrett, The Glen, Guildford Road, Great Bookham, Surrey. At the last check Mrs. Barrett informed me that she was disappointed that only about half our membership had paid the renewal subscription. This does happen every year, and so 1 wish to make a special plea for intending members to renew their subscription immediately because the annual Proceedings is now in print, and apart from this, there is a lot of excitement awaiting participating members in the shape of things to do in the locality. Whatever you do please make it clear that you are renewing at £2. per head and not at the old rate of £1.25 of over a year ago. We have had problems in deciding whether members tendering 75 pence to make up the subscription are offering it for last year or for this! Please, therefore, renew your subscription promptly while it is still reasonably clear that it is this year you intend to remain a member.

You will hear more about the museum/local history centre at the A.G.M. but in case you feel out of touch, a great deal of work has been carried out recently to clear away refuse so that when planning permission is obtained, the builders may take over the site without difficulty. Some restoration will have to be undertaken by builders because voluntary work would take too long, being so dependent on precious spare time. However, once major repairs have been carried out we shall be calling for volunteers to clean and decorate the interior, and possibly some of the exterior and this will be announced in due course.

#### ARCHAEOLOGY

A small exploratory trench has been started inside Hampton Cottage. Space is limited but volunteers to work in relays will be welcome.

Work will probably start early in April to excavate a section through Stane Street, Leatherhead, where it is intersected by the proposed line of the M.25.

He joined the Society at our Dallaway lecture in 1976 and he was well known in several waterway societies as a catalyst who generated much enthusiasm for the movement. <u>Membership</u>. At 31st December 1976 the membership of the Society was made up of 263 ordinary members (there were 246 in 1975) and 11 Honorary members. The subscription was £2. per annum. It is regretted that 30 members have only paid £1.25 being the amount of the subscription for the previous year.

Programme. The Dallaway Lecture was given by Mr. John Hampton F.S.A. on "Aerial Photography and Archaeology" at the City of London Freemen's School by kind permission of the Headmaster Mr. M.J.Kemp; one of our members, and nearly 300 persons attended. The summer visits to Lacock, Wilts; Ashwell, Herts, and to Dorset, and particularly the two visits to West Horsley, were popular. The lectures on "Transport" by our Vice-President, "Getting to the Roots of the Family Tree" by Miss E.M.Tillman, "Local History" by Mr. Norman Nail of the Nonsuch Antiquarian Society, and on the Society's Records by Mr. David Bruce, were exceptionally well attended and particularly the Leatherhead Miscellany when members celebrated the Society's 30th Birthday.

<u>Publications</u>. The series of Town Leaflets continued with the publication of that on Fetcham. There is a small stock of Ashtead and Fetcham leaflets in hand. The Leatherhead Leaflet is out of stock. The Society's Occasional Paper No. 1 on "Discovering Leatherhead" by Mr. John Blair was issued free to members and the balance of the printing was sold out almost as soon as it was on the market. The Proceedings Vol. 3 No. 9 comprised 56 pages, twice the normal number, contained the second part of the original work of Mr. John Blair on the Early Manorial Records of Leatherhead. The "Ashtead History" Sub-committee, under the Chairmanship of Mr. R.A.Lever has nearly completed the compilation of the whole volume and it is now in the hands of Mr. A.A.C. Jackson for editing. It is hoped to publish by the end of 1977.

Excavations. Further work was carried out at the "Ice-house", Lower Road, Great Bookham, but unfortunately the specialist team working within the well were unable to complete the excavation and negotiations were opened for a team organised by Dr. Crocker of Surrey University to continue the work in 1977. It has since been ascertained that it is not an ice-house but a well of unusual size. A training dig was carried out in the Autumn at Egham on a mixed archaeological site and several members gained valuable experience. A preliminary survey was made of a section of Stane Street, Leatherhead, with a view to a trial excavation being done in 1977.

Exhibition. The Exhibition and Records Sub-committee attended the symposium on Surrey Gardens at Lorking Halls with a display of photographs of historical and fine trees of the District, and a small section was devoted to the Bookham and Fetcham Garden Society to commemorate its centenary.

<u>Photographs</u>. The Society has continued to increase its collection and in particular is indebted to Messrs. Osenton Lamden & Co. and Messrs. Porter & Smart who have given numerous photographs of local buildings and a very valuable collection is being made.

Your Committee has for many years considered Local History Centre/Museum. the desirability of having somewhere to store, process and exhibit the accessions of the Society and when Hampton Cottage, Church Street, Leatherhead, an early 17th Century building, came onto the market it seemed an opportunity not to be lost. Your Committee after much consideration as to the financial implications formed a sub-committee to explore the possibility of raising money for the purchase and restoration of the building and its conversion to a Local History Centre/Museum. A generous resident of Leatherhead loaned the Society £7,500 interest free for twenty years and the initial appeal for money produced over  $\pm$ 4,000 by the end of the year. The property was purchased for £7,600, and the sum of £960 was set aside as a sinking fund which, with interest, will repay the loan in twenty years time. Mr. W.E.Larkin, ARIBA, was appointed architect and he is preparing plans for the restoration and conversion. As the Society does not have the power to hold property the Leatherhead Museum Trust was formed for this purpose and Mr. Bruce, Mr. Hayward and Mr. Bull have been appointed Trustees, but answerable to the Society. Working parties have been investigating the structure, under the direction of the Architect, and have cleared the building and garden ready for the builders to commence.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>. A Statement of Income and Expenditure for 1976 is attached. It is regretted that the Mole Valley District Council has intimated that a grant will not be given in 1977, and it may be necessary to raise the subscription next year to cover the loss of the grant and the increased cost of printing.

# MINUTES of the 29th ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE LEATHERHEAD & DISTRICT LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY, held on 26th March 1976, in the Council Offices, Bull Hill, Leatherhead

#### Seventy members attended.

Mr. J.G.W.Lewarne took the chair as Vice-President of the Society and the meeting began at 8.15 p.m. Apologies were received from the Chairman of the Local Council, L.F.I.Wolters, Mrs. M.Salaman and Miss Dutnall. Mr. H.Thompson was introduced as Secretary of the Society of Antiquaries and, after giving a short description of the Society and its Charter, he said he had come to our meeting with great pleasure to confer the honour of F.S.A. on our Editor, Mr. F.B.Benger. Mr. Benger's qualifications had been described to members of the Society of Antiquaries at a special meeting during which he was elected. Following the applause, Mr. Lewarne mentioned that members could obtain various publications, including "Surrey History", after the meeting.

The notice concerning the Annual General Meeting was then read, followed by the Minutes of the previous A.G.M. held on 21st March 1975.

A proposal was made by Mr. R.Snow, seconded by Mr. J.Blair, that the Minutes be accepted as a true record of that meeting, this being agreed unanimously. The Chairman then signed the Minutes.

<u>Matters Arising</u>. A query was raised as to the significance of the title acting Honorary Treasurer and Nr. J.R.Bull explained that he had volunteered to fill the gap caused by the departure of the previous Honorary Treasurer, but only until a person could be found to fill the position more permanently. Mr. bull added that he is heavily committed both with family matters and also with other Associations

Executive Committee's Report. Mr. Fortescue thanked the Committee for their work during 1975 and mentioned that the Report had already been circularised to members. He referred to Mrs. Barrett as a new member of the Committee who deserved praise for her efficient handling of the programme of events.

The publications side had been very busy and had included "Discovering Early Leatherhead" which was then on sale to non-members at 45 pence. Mrs.

B. Haynes was looking after the sales, and Mr. D.Bruce had created much interest with his team on the exhibition side. The lectures had been of a good standard.

Mr. Fortescue referred to the distinguished visitors, Lady Hanworth and Mr. H.Thompson, who had made the journey to Leatherhead to address us, and also Dr. Moss, one of our members from Reigate, who was also to talk to us on the subject of the chalk downland on the line of the future motorway. The Society's future activities should alant more towards archaeology because there were now innumerable tasks for us in this direction.

Mr. Fortescue continued by mentioning the excellent library in the care of Mr. J.Gilbert, and also the fact that the subscription had increased to £2. because of higher costs, mainly printing.

Mr. D.F.Renn referred to John Blair's monograph and its programme of investigation and excavation. He thought that a committee should be set up to plan the action necessary. Mr. Fortescue said that he hoped that the new Executive Committee would see the formation of an Excavations Sub-committee.

Mr. T.E.C.Walker moved that the Executive Committee's Report be accepted. This was seconded by Mr. S.R.C.Poulter and passed unanimously.

The Accounts. These were again presented by Mr. J.R.Bull who said that finances were strained badly in 1975 and expenses had exceeded income. The cost of printing the Proceedings escalated by 25% to 2648. He hoped that the subscription would not have to rise continuously. He thanked the monorary Auditor for his excellent work on the accounts.

The adoption of the accounts was proposed by Alderman Farmer and seconded by Mr. D.F.Renn and the motion was passed unanimously.

buring the year Mr. T.Hume, the Programme Secretary, had moved away and Mrs. C.Barrett had offered to serve in his place. In addition, Mrs. B.Haynes had returned to the Committee to act as Hon. Sales Secretary. With these two changes, the Executive Committee of the previous year were otherwise willing to continue to serve the Society. Mrs. Quinnell then proposed and Mr. Martin King seconded the motion that the Executive Committee be re-elected with the inclusion of the new Committee members, Mrs.C.Barrett and Mrs.B.Haynes. Mr. Lewarne wished to thank all the hard working Committee members. Before the talks began he reminded members that the Leatherhead Society were staging an exhibition in the old National Provincial bank building on the new Leatherhead Leisure Centre, and this was to be held on Saturday, 27th March.

Lady Hanworth then gave a talk about Surrey Archaeological Society's scheme called Mole Valley and Downland Scheme. The background to this was the formation in 1971 of a motorway group for rescue archaeology. Mr. Hugh Thompson championed a re-think about the idea because otherwise all the available energy would be directed into motorway archaeology whereas the spending of available money should be planned. The appointment of David Bird as County Archaeological Officer was a great step forward. Nork was being carried out by Scott McCracken, David Longley and Martin O'Connell in concert with a survey of historic towns including Leatherhead and Dorking. The Department of the Environment is very strict over the disbursement of money for excavation so great reliance must be placed on local societies and the use of amateurs. Research is to be centered on downs and villages in our neighbourhead because it is conveniently reached by all members of Surrey archaeological Society.

<u>Dr. Moss, from Reigate</u> then referred to the background work done by J. Blair and the saving in time resulting from this research. He mentioned that the chalklands were fairly heavily populated and thus the motorway would restrict future research because it would occupy part of the open downland space remaining. It is important for survey work to cover the motorway approach roads as well. The dry summer of 1975 had made the aerial survey work very effective but the time had now come to carry out excavation with the hope of locating prehistoric and early settlement patterns. The signs of field systems in the area are beginning to disappear and we should be concerned with recording all the evidence carefully - not just reporting things verbally. The line of the Roman Road (Stane Street) has been found to be not completely as shown on the map.

The area of research for us to explore is very much up to us. He suggests as a southern boundary the North Downs, the Leatherhead Downs on the west, Mickleham and the motorway in the centre and the A217 on the east. Headley and Walton-on-the-Hill need studying badly. All periods of archaeology are to be included. The priorities are: up-dating of survey maps, field work, hedge dating (motorways destroy hedges as well as farmers). Juniper Hall Field Centre might take over field work to a limited extent.

After the talks there were a number of comments and questions by members, such as the location of Thirty Acre Barn. Mr. Gillies suggested sixth formers taking geography could be trained in field work. He also wished to know the scale of the aerial photographs taken by John Hampton's team.

Lady hanworth said that Juniper Hall had been contacted re use of school children for field work and they were interested. John blair suggested that our area of search should include the fringes and not just the spring line. He would welcome comments and criticism in connection with his monograph "Discovering Early Leatherhead." Mr. Lewarne referred to the need for an excavation sub-committee and volunteers of all ages. Mr. Elmore mentioned that members of the W.E.A. are very keen on field work. Lady Hanworth said that in Dorking H. Thompson and Martin O'Connell would welcome volunteers for archaeological work, and Mr. Lewarne referred to the cause of our Society's diminished activities in excavations, i.e. the lack of a leader in Archae-Lady Hanworth said that David Longley in Dorking might be useful to ology. us for assistance in leadership. Mr. Thompson mentioned the need to record antiquities and old boundaries. Mr. Read referred to the Ty 15 map which at 62 pence he says is well worth buying. Mr. T.E.C. Walker said that the road (pony track) which goes gently up to the summit of Box Hill needs recording and protecting as it might be Roman. A query was raised as to whether this trail might have been built in connection with the fortifications on Box Hill but Lady Hanworth mentioned a picture which clearly shows the track as in existence before the fortifications.

There being no other discussion, the Chairman closed the meeting at 9.45 p.m., with thanks for the excellent attendance and interesting talks.

Mr. S.A.D. Fortescue then thanked the Chairman for conducting the meeting so ably.
