Keeping in Touch

Carnegie United Kingdom Trust

These are intended to cover expenditure incurred in carrying out original work in local history and the terms have been widened recently to include the cost of work done on documents as a preliminary to outdoor work.

The Proceedings, Vol.3 No.8

This number, now in the printer's hands, will contain considerably more pages than recent issues have done. This is due in large measure to a continuation of the process of printing with translation the early manorial records of Leatherhead which was begun in Vol.2 No.6 (1962), when the earliest known Court Roll (dated 1319) was edited by Mr. John Harvey, F.S.A. Mr.W.J. Blair has now undertaken the task of continuing the series, and the forthcoming issue of the Proceedings will contain three 14th century Rental Rolls of the manor of Pachenesham Parva translated and edited by him. It is hoped to continue this series as a regular feature and so provide the materials for a study of mediaeval Leatherhead. There will be much else of interest in the forthcoming issue, and though it will undoubtedly strain the financial resources of the Society, it will be carrying out the prime purpose for which it exists.

University of Surrey

Details are with your Secretary of a course on Mediaeval Archaeology which began in October. The lectures are on Thursday evenings at 7.30 in Lecture Theatre "E", University of Surrey, Guildford; the last one is the 12th December. We apologise for the fact that due to the lack of a Newsletter at the right time many of these courses have already begun, but this stems from our lack of an official called a Newsletter Editor - a volunteer would receive a warm welcome!

Recent additions to the Society's Records

The most noteworthy addition came about as a result of the generous gift by member John Clark of xerox copies of the 1871 census of Great and Little Bookham (56 pages, 1335 names). This prompted the Executive Committee to purchase those for Leatherhead and Ashtead. The Leatherhead census contains 102 pages of 2,455 names whilst Ashtead has 38 pages of 906 names. Mr.J.G.#.Lewarne is obtaining Fetcham's returns for his own use but with access by the Society. There is enough material (names, ages, occupation and birth place) for half a dozen projects. It has been suggested that simple indexes consisting of just surnames and page numbers would be of great assistance to future researchers. Any volunteers? Mr. Clark also gave the Society copies of the relevant pages of various Directories dated 1798,1826,1832,1839,1851,1862 and 1870 and copies of twelve pages and a map from "Magna Britannia" of 1730. In addition he gave copies of pages from newspapers dealing with a highway robbery at Gibbons (sic) Grove in 1827 and a murder on Leatherhead Common in 1834.

Young Mr. Blair has augmented the Records in several ways with a copy of the will of Robert Russell, vicar of Leatherhead in 1557; five wig curlers dug up in the garden of Wakefields; a Fulham-ware potsherd c.1720 with part of the Royal Arms, possibly made for the King's Arms Inn, (now Porter a Smart) Gt. Bookham, and sketches and plans and elevations of the demolished buildings 25/27 Bridge Street, Leatherhead.

Mrs.Broid of Gt. Bookham gave the Society a small Goss-type vase bearing the "unofficial" Leatherhead coat of arms in the arms of Merton College, Oxford.

Mr. Wear, also of Bookham, handed in a pair of pince-nez glasses in a case marked "T.Beech, Ophthalmic Optician, 9 High Street, Leatherhead.

Bookham Village Day in June 1974 included an exhibition on the local history of Bookham, and the Society assisted with the loan of photographs, maps and information. In return we were given a considerable number of original and copy photographs.

The above are some of the articles we have received this year and future Newsletters will continue to give details. Have you anything of interest to give the Society? If so Mr. David Bruce would be happy to receive them on behalf of the Society.
