

Community Heroes



When you think about teenage cancer, you never think that it could happen to you. But the fact of the matter is that cancer will touch nearly everyone at some stage in their life; whether becoming affected by it personally, or knowing someone who has been affected by it, cancer will affect us all.

Last year, for Louise Sutherland, local resident,

SENCO (Special Educational Needs Coordinator) at Peter Pan Playschool, and mother of two, teenage cancer became a very stark reality. After a lengthy and challenging battle, Louise's teenage daughter, Katie had to say goodbye to her boyfriend Tom Bromley, a Howard of Effingham sixth form student, who had succumbed to his illness in November. Louise says it is "just incredibly sad," and from one mother to another, I cannot begin to imagine how they are coping as well as they are.

But the family is trying to stay positive, and for Louise, this means getting involved and taking action. This year, she is taking on several challenges to raise money for the Teenage Cancer Trust, the charity who had supported Tom whilst he was undergoing treatment. As Louise often says to people who ask about her running, "of course it doesn't make it better. But it feels like I'm doing something, and if that something can help another teenager like Tom, then I'll keep running!" She is truly an inspiration in her own right.

Her year of challenges began this February, with the Cancer Research London Winter Run 10K, along with the Hampton Court Half Marathon. This was followed by the Lidl Breakfast 16 mile Run in Kingston on Mother's Day. Louise has the Vitality London 10000 in May, a 5K Obstacle Course in June, and The Great Newham 10K run at the Olympic Park in July. In September, she will run the Nuts Challenge, and the Barnes Green Half

Marathon. Louise is hoping to finish the year with a fun 5K Santa Dash, and depending on how 'creaky' she is, will try and run again in October to keep her going!

As many of you may well know, Louise's Father-in-law is Captain of Effingham Golf Club this year, and he has selected the Teenage Cancer Trust as his charity to benefit from the many fundraising events that they hold throughout the year. In addition, her husband, Jamie, has been in contact with the wider golfing community to source some fantastic items to auction and raffle, and has received signed items from Tiger Woods, Justin Rose, "Beef", and many others! Together, they are hoping to raise as much money as they possibly can to support this wonderful charity. Louise says, "it's been just amazing to see how supportive and generous the Effingham Golf Club members have been, as well as family, friends, and the whole community."



Bookham Youth & Community Centre

The Bookhams Youth Project is now under way, and proving a great success thanks to all of the hard work of Oli Bell and his team. The Monday and Friday sessions are already well attended by a mix of young people.

Other Youth organisations continue to use the large amount of space available, together with the much improved supplementary facilities. This allows the groups whom are using the facilities, a large degree of flexibility in the amount and variety of activities within a spacious environment. It is used by other youth and young adult groups such as Disability Challengers, Barnardos and St. Nicolas Church. Each of these groups run clubs in the evenings, and Disability Challengers use the centre during holiday as well. Other groups use the facilities on an ad hoc basis.

Discussions continue to be held with Surrey County Council and Mole Valley District

Council to replace the existing building, which does have a limited life span. Whilst a new community building would be helpful, it would take us beyond the current lease, which expires in 2019. So, the debate carries on.

Last half term, we ran a number of courses including Paediatric Emergency First Aid for Parents and Grandparents, the Talking Teens course, and the Growing Together course all of which were very popular courses. We have also provided outreach support to particular families in our community and can signpost to other organisations, such as Family Support Team, Homestart, CAP debt help, and Foodbank who can provide further support if needed.

This summer, we are running the Talking Teens course again on Thursdays 8th, 15th, 22nd, and 29th June 2017 from 9:30am until 11:30am. This is a 4-week workshop for parents of 10-17 year olds and costs just £20, because we all know the teenage years can be challenging!

We are also running the Growing Together course on Mondays 12th, 19th, 26th of June, and 3rd of July 2017, from 9:30am until 11:30am. This is a course for parents of 0-8s and offers useful approaches for engaging with toddlers and children to help them learn and develop, while providing strategies for setting boundaries and dealing with tricky behavior. There are also a range of useful evening workshops for parents, run by early years trainer, Rachael Underwood. These include topics such as Building Your Child's Self Esteem, and Supporting Your Child When Emotions Run Hot. For more information, please visit www.RachaelUnderwood.com

Bookham Stamp Club

In January, Bookham Stamp Club had their annual Members Day which was attended by 58 members and hosted a variety of wonderful topics.

Richard Stock gave us a fascinating afternoon with the stamps and postal history of Sudan in February. The first section of the display featured early mail to and from merchants, and administrators explorers. cancellations used at Egyptian territorial post offices were shown together with Interpostal seals and consular mail. Items with letters which refer to postal services, particularly the Sandbach correspondence, emphasised the importance of mail to soldiers on active service. The Second half of the presentation opened with the famous "Camel Postman" stamps, and the display concluded with material from the De la Rue archives. It was a wonderful and entertaining afternoon, and we thank Richard for taking the time to visit us.

Our March meeting brought us Dr. Patrick Reid (pictured) who entertained us with the Postal History, stamps and stationery of Hobart. He opened the first half of his display with Postal History, which included items such as an 1828

newspaper showing the Duty Stamp, to the first handstamp. Patrick displayed the One Penny value stamp, and gave us an in-depth explanation of the 'volcano flaw'. The next section was a comprehensive coverage of the Platypus issue, used for both Postage and Revenue purposes. Some of his items on display included original sketches, die proofs, specimens, as well as the issued stamps both mint and used. Richard then went into stationery, beginning with a set of twelve illustrated envelopes, mint and used, the latter believed to be the only complete set in existence! These were followed by the US Fleet Card of 1908 and a set of postcards telling the story of the Port Arthur Penal Colony, from settlement to tourist attraction. Patrick finished with a very unusual item which he brought back from Tasmania: a complete wooden Shell Oil crate, complete with Parcel Stamps. A wonderful and enlightening afternoon indeed!

Bookham Stamp Club meets on the fourth Tuesday of the month (excluding December) at the Old Barn Hall and our very popular Trading Tables open at 1:30pm, with displays commencing at 2:15pm. Our programme



includes visits from an impressive list of speakers, members' displays, and auctions that are held three times a year. We also have a packet exchange, through which members can buy and sell stamps. Bookham Recorded Music Club

Our meeting on the 9th of February was presented by David Bishop, who devoted the evening to the composer Elgar. David chose his works in chronological order, informing us of his life as a composer and musician. At the age of 10, Elgar composed music for a play which forty years later, he orchestrated the works "The Wand of Youth 2nd Suite", and from which David selected 'March', and 'Butterflies'. Elgar is best known for his five "Pomp and Circumstance" marches, which composed between 1901 and 1930; David selected his second march. We listened to 'In Haven', and 'Sabbath Morning' from "Sea Pictures". Elgar's remaining work, the "Cello Concerto" did not achieve wide popularity until the 1960s, when it was recorded by Jacqueline Dupres. David ended his programme with the 2nd movement from "Symphony No. 3".

On the 23rd February, Michael Crimmen presented "A Through to M". "Candide

Overture" by Bernstein, is an operetta based on a novella by Voltaire. Bach's "Oboe Concerto", was followed by "Symphony No. 3" by Roy Harris, who was strongly influenced by his home state of Oklahoma. Albinoni's "Adagio for Strings", was followed by the fourth movement from "Symphony No. 8" by Dvorak. The magnificent trumpet introduction gives over to sweeping strings. Dennis Brain, who was tragically killed in 1957, played the "Horn Concerto No. 3" by Mozart. Duke Ellington composed "Melancholia" in 1953, and "Sonnet for Caesar" in 1957, the latter of which is played by the Duke Ellington Orchestra. "On Hearing the First Cuckoo in Spring" by Delius, was edited by Sir Thomas Beecham. The final movement of "Symphony No. 1" by Brahms, has comparisons with Beethoven's choral symphony. However, it is a masterful work and concluded Michael's programme with works from "A to M".

As in all past programmes, Martin Le Ray's "My

Choice for You Part XI" began with an overture - "The Mountain Sylph" by Barnett. Elgar composed "The Young Flirt" - Five Quadrilles. Martin selected the fourth movement from the "Symphony in C Sharp Minor" by Kraus, and the 3rd movement from the "Sonata for Violin & Piano" by Hummel. "From Foreign Lands" by Moszkowski, Martin selected three movements - Russian, Italian, and German. Mendelssohn's "Concerto for Violin, Piano & Strings" was followed by Korsakov. The penultimate work was the 'Tarantella-P' resto' from Liszt's "Venezia e Napoli", and finally, the "Concerto in D Major for Flute and Orchestra" by Mercadante.



Bookham Wine Club

Following an initial visit in April 2014, the club was delighted to welcome back Carla Bertellotti, from Wines of Uruguay UK, in February to present a new selection of wines from her home country. Although small in size, Uruguay is emerging as one of the most exciting wine producing countries and is also breaking new ground. We learned that by 2018, it will be the first country in the World to have 100% trace data on its wine production, also known as georeferencing. Carla had chosen some interesting wines for us to taste, including a Chardonnay produced using a temperamental Italian grape originating in Piedmont, called Arneis. In fact, it turns out that the producer of the wine is the only one in Uruguay brave enough to do so!

One of our popular presenters and qualified wine educator, Richard Bost, visited again in March to share his knowledge of Asian wines. What an enlightening evening it proved to be. With his inimitable style assisted by an excellent slide show, Richard provided us with 6 very different wines to taste and an informative overview of wine production in Japan, Thailand, India, and China. Somewhat surprisingly, we learnt that there is evidence of grape growing in India as far back as 1,500 BC. However, it wasn't until 1982 that wine

production really took off. It's a similar story in China, but now the country boasts the world's second largest (after Spain) vinyard area, and was the eighth largest wine-producing country in 2014, with more than 450 wineries. Despite being relative newcomers to the table, members were pleasantly surprised by the quality of all the wines tasted.

In April, we will welcome back Angela Bawtree with whom we will spend the evening exploring wines from some of the lesser known wine producing areas in Spain. This should be a real treat as Angela is a leading wine educator, and has provided us with a number of excellent presentations in the past. Our May meeting also promises to be entertaining and informative as Keith Grainger, wine tutor and presenter, will take a look at the process involved in today's wine production in a presentation entitled "Vine to Bottle".

Rainbow Playgroup



All preschool settings need to meet the statutory requirements laid out in the document 'The Early Years Foundation Stage' or EYFS. The EYFS states that, during their preschool years, children should have the opportunity to develop the characteristics of effective learning. In other words, it is not just important that children learn, it is important that they learn how to learn. This requires that adults working with young children have a sound understanding of their role in supporting children's early development.

The staff at Rainbow Playgroup are committed to enabling children to develop positive attitudes towards learning, which will equip them well as they start the more formal phase of their education. They will carry this attitude with them throughout the entire adult lives.

When education experts have looked closely at the characteristics of effective learners, they have found that effective learners explore and find things out, they are willing to 'have a go' and are not afraid of making mistakes. Effective learners have their own ideas, and can make choices about how they will do things. Effective learners concentrate, show a high levels of involvement in their chosen activity, and are able to persevere and enjoy the feeling of achievement when they have done what they set out to do.

The staff at Rainbow Playgroup know how to support children to solve the problems that they encounter in their play. They know how to interact with children and give feedback in such a way that children become intrinsically motivated. During Rainbow's Ofsted inspection last year, the inspector noted that 'children are exceptionally well prepared for school' and that they become 'highly confident, independent and capable learners.'



Future meetings are going to be interesting. With one entitled 'Madajazz', and the other 'Naughty but Nice', we are sure to be in for a treat!



National Trust Bookham Commons



The people of Great and Little Bookham have enabled us to make a brilliant start to our Friends of Bookham Commons 'Life on the Edge' Project, making great progress with our enhancement of the shady woodland margins from the station to Hundred Pound Bridge, on the way to Downside. Thanks to your fundraising efforts, we've been able to push these overgrown edges back, enhancing the landscape for visitors and providing the dense scrub and diverse plant life that is essential for the great range of insects found on Bookham Commons. This, in turn, attracts the birds that delight us with their song, including increasingly rare migrants such as the nightingale.

Many of the features that heighten a visit to the commons (information panels, leaflets, benches, waymarkers, or the bird hide) have been provided by the Friends of Bookham Commons. In recent years, we've done a great deal for people, and it is very satisfying to return to our roots and help the wildlife that our visitors take delight in seeing.

On first glance, these new clearings may look

a bit stark and bare, however, a closer look reveals new seedlings of grasses and wildflowers that had been dormant in the soil for years before finally being released to the sunlight. No seeding is allowed on the commons as it remains a Site of Special Scientific Interest, so everything that is growing there has been there all along! Our fantastic volunteer team have laid the scrub to provide predator-proof nesting sites, and one or two of the open-grown, well formed young oaks retained as successors to older wood pasture trees. The next few years will see the wildlife thrive in these areas, making lovely scenery for all to savour.

Your donations and membership have made

this project possible. The Friends Committee have worked hard to raise the funds, along with a generous grant from the Surrey Community Foundation which will help us complete this three-year undertaking. My thanks (and a big cheer from all at the National Trust) to all of you, for your generosity and vision in helping us to provide a wonderful and diverse landscape for future generations to enjoy. 

How many village markets can boast of a garden stall where advice is freely available from not one, but two qualified garden designers? One of these is Angela Baker. When her daughter was born, Angela and Ian moved to Bookham and soon became involved with village life. Having helped to dig the pond at St. Lawrence School, they joined a group of parents who had dug the pond at Bookham First School. This group is still very active to this day with pub lunches, country walks, an annual weekend jaunt, and an annual New Year's Eve get together. In 1989, Angela embarked on a one year Garden Design Course at Burnt Stub Mansion in Chessington, which led to many projects in and around Bookham. Anyone who has visited Angela's garden on Bookham Open Gardens Day can appreciate her skill in design and planting. It is a delightful fragrant mix of both



common and unusual plants growing exuberantly along the length of a quite narrow plot.

Designing a garden for the Chelsea Flower Show must be every designer's dream and Angela did just that for The Hardy Plant Society, when Largely Leaves won a silver award. Angela is on the committee of the Southern Counties Group of the HPS and currently responsible for organising the garden visits which take place throughout the summer months.

Through the HPS and Bookham and Fetcham Garden Society, I met up with Angela again and persuaded her to come to Bookham Country Market, where she regularly helps set up the Garden Stall every Friday morning in The Old Barn Hall and provides a variety of plants for sale. She sees the market as a great service to the community, providing an opportunity for local producers to sell their wares, for residents to purchase handcrafted and home baked and grown goods, and for all to enjoy friendship in the Coffee Shop. Apart from the garden, painting is a much loved hobby. Angela belongs to an art group, and



naturally, tends to paint from nature, using the garden or photos as inspiration. She regularly walks with a group formed from Therfield School parents (where her two children attended), was a member of a book club for many years, trained and worked for the CAB in Leatherhead, is on the committee of the BCA, listens to children read at St. Lawrence School, and once a year entertains a group of elderly people who live alone (Contact the Elderly) with afternoon tea. Angela is definitely a people person, creative, artistic, and caring.



National Trust Polesden Lacey

The house conservation team at Polesden Lacey have successfully completed the mammoth task of conducting an in-depth review into the condition of every single book in the library, a total of 1787 historic books!

The books are cleaned every year by a dedicated team of book volunteers, who use specialist tools. This painstaking task is spread out over the course of the year. This year, for the first time, the house team has carefully examined each book, looking for signs of damage and deterioration in order to create a permanent record and condition report. This condition report marks a significant achievement for the house team, whose duties range from cleaning literally every inch of the historic rooms, to developing new exhibitions to showcase Mrs. Greville's world-renowned collection.

The new report will enable the team to track deterioration more effectively and to focus on specific trouble areas, such as books with torn spines or, in the case of one particular shelf, recurring mould. The shelf in question, which holds both the memoirs of Sheridan and the works of Alexander Pope, was found to have sprouted a fuzz of white mould. This sort of mould is a result of changes in humidity, a



prevalent problem in old houses, and while white mould can be quickly dispatched using only a pony hair brush and a specialist hoover, white mould that turns an insidious green colour can indicate that lasting damage has already occurred.

Luckily, the house team's timely actions stopped the mould in time and the new condition report will ensure that green mould never has time to flourish.

Mould is just one of the signs of deterioration

the house team have looked for when creating the condition report. The library is also at risk from light damage, environmental factors, and a variety of creepy crawlies. When conditions are poor, museum pests thrive. Culprits include furniture beetles, carpet beetles, and even moths, all of whom like to graze on the cloth bindings on books, leaving behind the paper and cardboard of a naked spine.

But what about bookworms? Conservation Assistant, Charlotte Burford explains: "bookworm is a common misconception. Bookworms are actually just other pests like the death watch and furniture beetles. They prefer wood, but they'll happily bore through some books on their way to the wooden furniture beyond. But there's no such thing as a 'bookworm."

With 37 local young people engaging regularly we are really excited to be with them, support them where they are at in life and provide exciting opportunities to help them grow and thrive. We have a fantastic team of 7 local volunteers who are helping BYouth happen. Without them and their skills we couldn't run the great sessions we do.

Leatherhead & District Local History Society



It is 20 years since the death of the remarkable Elsie Green (1904-1997), founder/director of the Polesden Lacey Open Air Theatre for 36 years and an inspiration to many budding performers. Interviewed in 1993, her story appeared in the November 2016 Newsletter of the Leatherhead & District Local History Society.

Born in her parents' pub in Marylebone, London, Elsie Green was introduced to the theatre by play bills for the Coliseum and the Met in Edgware Road. Her father took her to see early 20th century performers including Marie Lloyd, George Robey, and Dan Leno. At the Coliseum, she also saw Diaghilev's Russian ballet and the great dancer, Nijinsky. She attended ballet school, but was let down by varicose veins. Instead, she developed a passion for the theatre, going to the Old Vic every Saturday and seeing the young John Gielgud and Michael Redgrave playing opposite Edith Evans. Desperate to become an actress, she studied at the Guildhall but only passed her final with distinction after a threeweek speech training course. Her real talent for directing productions only emerged by chance. A lucky break led to a job as director of plays at the Tavistock Little Theatre, an amateur group of experienced actors working under professional directors. They performed a different play each week at very low prices.

During WWII, Elsie and her young son were evacuated to Epsom where she formed a drama group from the Land Army, which performed in churches throughout Surrey. In 1951 at Polesden Lacey, a performance of Merry England was given as part of the Festival of Britain. The next year, the Bookham Community Association was seeking a more permanent director, Elsie was asked to direct Shakespeare's As You Like It at the first official Polesden Lacey Open Air Theatre in the summer of 1953.

There was a space for 2000 people and though without lighting, amplification was installed. By the end of that first production, it was dusk and the surrounding meadows lit up with masses of glow worms. This was just the

beginning of Elsie's magical 36 years of Shakespearean summer at Polesden Lacey.

For the first 21 years, no play was ever repeated. Her audience numbered 1500, but by the time she retired in 1988, the numbers had reached 20,000. It had become an annual festival with Gilbert & Sullivan operetta, ballet, old time music hall, and top concerts as well as Shakespeare.

Elsie loved putting on plays in the open air, always taking the discomfort of rain, midges, and other inconveniences in her stride. Her actors had to use larger and simpler gestures than on a conventional stage, projecting their voices more to compensate for the lack of acoustics. She relished everything, always giving casts the time needed to ensure performances that reflected the glorious surroundings of Polesden Lacey. Several of her proteges went on to successful careers on stage and TV.

Shakespeare's plays were perfect for open air performances, she thought, because that was how the bard intended them. On retiring from Polesden, she founded Evergreen Productions and presented Murder in the Cathedral, St. Joan, and Othello at various venues throughout Surrey. A keen backer of the fund to restore Shakespeare's Globe Theatre on Bankside, her name is now engraved in the foyer there. Plaques commemorate her memory at the site of the original open air stage at Polesden Lacey.

Students were invited to write a story or poem, ficton or nonfiction, entitled 'Reflection'. This competition was the first stage in an annual national writing competition, Rotary Young Writer, with winning entries progressing through to regional competitions, to a national final in May. In addition, several students from Manor House School also performed extremely well in our local Youth Speaks debating competition in February.

Chloe had been selected to volunteer overseas with Raleigh International on an International Citizen Service placement programme. This programme works directly with communities who specifically request their help whilst also striving to inspire young people in the UK and overseas to become active global citizens. With a generous donation on behalf of the Leatherhead Lions, it was a pleasure to see Chloe achieve her goal to make a lasting



difference in a disadvantaged community.

After an eleven week expedition to Tanzania, that began September 2016, Chloe gave the Leatherhead Lions a wonderful presentation, giving members a keen insight into her travels. We discovered that she worked in the remote village of Mbeya in Western Tanzania, a startling twenty-four hours travel by bus from the capital Dar es Salaam. Chloe says, "it was no picnic. No running water or sanitation, no electricity, and I had a rat living under my bed who I named Patrick!"

The purpose of the trip was to educate the community on how to create a sustainable agricultural enterprise. In addition, the women were taught good medical practice to help the community become more self-sufficient in the future. Despite difficult living conditions, Chloe received a warm welcome and came home with many fond memories of her time there. "The children were delightful. So willing to learn and so happy even if they had so little," says Chloe. "It was an experience I shall never forget."

During the presentation, we unexpectedly came across a photo of a little boy wearing a Lion's High Viz Jacket and the group were astounded! As Chloe couldn't have provided it, it must have been a Lions member who had



travelled to a similar location beforehand. In any case, this strange occurrence is still a mystery.

The Leatherhead & District Lions Club always welcome new members. We are a group of like-minded, friendly people who enjoy helping others. 
