EDITORIAL

Village Day is always an anxious time for the organising committee. Will it be dry? Will all those carefully prepared plans work out? This year the weather couldn't have been better. Umbrellas were used as sun shades, not for keeping the rain off. It all went well and the children's procession was surely the best ever. The theme 'Transport in the 20th Century' was a challenge superbly met by young and old. Village Week also went well. The Barn Hall Quiz Night, with all present taking part, was a great success, and will be the way it is done in future.

The 49th Season of the Polesden Lacey Open Air Theatre opened with concerts in warm and dry weather, with the best yet firework displays (rocket bursts were visible this year!), but it didn't last. The Guys and Dolls Musical and A Mid Summer Night's Dream Shakespeare were performed in chilly and sometimes wet weather. However, the final night - 'Sounds of the Sixties' was a huge success on a dry evening and an audience of about 3000.

We are very concerned about the future of the Youth Centre and an article about the problems is included. All young people's organisations are finding it more and more difficult to get volunteers to help, but the departure of David Coombs and some of the paid helpers means that voluntary help is essential if the Centre is to be kept open after September. With a weekly attendance of over 400 youngsters aged between 8 and 18, we must have adequate adult help. Mums, Dads and parents whose children have used the Youth Centre in the past, please consider giving some of your time to help either on a regular or rota basis. The post of a permanent leader has been advertised, and when one is appointed the situation will become easier, but until then we must have your co-operation.

Thank you for sending me your contributions. Please keep sending them in. If any associated club has not had an article for some time, do think of letting me know what you are doing.



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


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CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Once again we were blessed with exceptionally hot and sunny weather for Village Day which makes life a little easier for the organisers The usual procession of many children were led through the village by several cars from various periods of the twentieth century and immediately in front of the Surbiton Royal British Legion Youth Marching Band, was a 1929 yellow Austin 7.As usual the many parents and schools supported the entries in the procession with many creative ideas on the theme of 20th Century Travel and presented the judges Angela and Jim Smith with a headache or two in trying to decide the eventual winner. They finally chose the South Bookham Playschool and congratulations to them for holding the Peter Hancock Cup for this year. Thanks go also to all those who participated and it does appear that the procession seems to get larger and larger each year. Brenda de Bruin, Chairman of the Bookham Residents Association, opened the day for us and had the task of judging the best dressed stall and awarded the cup to the Bookham & District W.I.Market stall. In addition she presented the prizes to the winner of the design of the cover of the Village Week programme, Clare Mayhew and the runner up Natasha Maddison, both children from the Eastwick Junior School. As in previous years the forty two stallholders gave us great support in their attempts to raise money on the day and we are extremely grateful for their efforts. We were a little unfortunate as far as the children were concerned as we had a late cancellation from the organisers of the steam railway which is always a popular attraction for children and adults alike, but we hope we shall be able to reinstate this next year. During the following week we had many of the regular events starting with the Open Air Service at St Nicolas Churchyard followed by Gardeners Questions, Barn Hall Quiz Night in its new format which was very well supported, The Craft Club Open Morning, The Creative Writing Group, Bingo Special, The Village Week Dance by

The Reverend Canon Andrew C Warner Retires

uring the 10.00am service on Sunday the 24th September the St Nicolas congregation will say goodbye to Andrew and Dell Warner after 20 Years as Rector of the Parish Church of St Nicolas Gt. Bookham

I was there at his induction on the 18th June 1980; here are my favourite recollections. First and foremost, his knowledge of and ability to teach scripture and his deep faith in the life, death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. His sermons are succinct, germane, direct, instructive and humorous when appropriate and yet understandable to anyone prepared to listen. In an emergency I have heard Andrew preach without preparation or notes. Such is his awareness of the presence and love of God.

Six or more curates including two women, which demonstrates his acceptance of change, have benefited from Andrew's skill as a teacher and guide. In every case the parish has benefited by their service and contribution to parish worship and life.

Milestones in Andrew's incumbency include his preparation courses for marriage and confirmation; also, the brilliant confirmation refresher course, to be kept and re-read.

When caring for a 1000 year old building large repair bills are inevitable. Every incumbent must dread the day the Fabric Committee report that there is a problem with the roof, windows, or damage by vandals and more recently with the tower. Andrew has a knack of finding the right person for the task and the money was raised. Andrew doing his bit, not for the first time, by spending a cold wet day on station at the lychgate to receive offerings. His biggest fund-raising challenge however came in 1994, to raise £150,000 to build a new Pastoral Centre. The extra space needed for the religious teaching of young people and for pastoral, educational and evangelical activities.

We will not forget Andrew's colourful not-so-priestly public roles, as a competent conjuror and escapologist. It is not unknown during a sermon for objects to apparently appear and disappear at will. Andrew owns a straitjacket but I haven't seen it recently. I wonder why?

Before moving to Bookham in 1980, he and Dell spent time in Addlestone, Ash Vale and Hinchley Wood. As Andrew's

seniority and respect within the diocese increased he was appointed Rural Dean of Leatherhead for 5 years, with the oversight of 12 parishes. Then to everyone's delight in December 1998 he was installed as a Canon of Guildford Cathedral.

However we are losing not one but two good friends. Dell has been a strong support to Andrew, playing a major part in parish life, which has extended far beyond answering the Rectory telephone. Shopping in the High Street must take her twice as long as necessary, such is her large circle of friends. She will also be remembered for her fine singing voice, which has added to the pleasure of major musical events such as the Bookham Scenes. Many school children will also miss being able to take advantage of her maths coaching up to A Level standard.

So ends an era, but where are they moving to? Rumour has it that there is a home in Andover, Hants ready and waiting. Will those shelves of books begin to gather dust? Will the key to the cabinet containing long ago delivered sermons be hung up for ever? I doubt it, with so many good sermons yet to be preached and no administrative responsibilities to distract; Andover how fortunate you are. We shall miss the 'Caped Crusader' walking down Church Road wearing the latest in male headgear.

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
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MEALS ON WHEELS

We've all heard of Meals on Wheels, but do you know how the scheme started, how meals are provided, and who delivers them here in Bookham? I spoke to long-time Bookham resident, Doris Mitchell, to find out.

Doris told me she's been involved in the Women's Royal Voluntary Service (WRVS) for 28 years and 'only' for 10 with Meals on Wheels. She used to be the



organiser for our area – the north of Mole Valley. There are no local organisers now but Mrs Sally Edmonds is responsible for the Meals on Wheels service. Doris still works as a volunteer at the office in Leatherhead's Day Centre, next to Sainsbury's in Leatherhead. 'We send out 25,000 meals a year from there,' she told me. 'It's quite a job to ensure we have enough distributors to cover every day. We have to keep track of special diets required and of when recipients are away or in hospital, or perhaps have extra problems which need referring to their GPs or to social services.'

It used to be the responsibility of local authorities to make sure everyone had a hot meal. Today, they are provided as part of a package from Care in the Community, but Meals on Wheels still works in collaboration with the local authority. In Surrey each area does things differently. For example Epsom pays people to deliver meals by van, while Mole Valley relies entirely upon volunteers – car drivers receive expenses of 35p a mile. These days all volunteers have to join the WRVS (men too!) and wear their badges when on duty.

'So how does it work?' I asked Doris.

'Frozen meals bought from a big caterer are reheated by kitchen staff in the Day Centre and packed into polystyrene boxes – all labelled and divided into our six rounds which cover Leatherhead, Bookham, Fetcham and Ashtead. The volunteers arrive at 11.30 – twelve in all, a driver and a helper for each round. Bookham's one of the biggest rounds, accounting for perhaps thirty out of the hundred or so meals we provide each day. Volunteers return by 1.00 – meals won't keep hot for much longer.'

'Do they have time to stop and chat?' I asked.

'Well yes – and that's where our system gains over a commercial one. Our volunteers may be the only people meal recipients see from one day to another. "How are you?" they'll ask, and maybe do little jobs like changing a light-bulb or posting a letter. Many recipients are elderly and confused and volunteers are able to report if they are not looking too well or if they need extra help with cleaning.'

'So who receives meals, exactly?'

'You have to be referred – by a GP, hospital or social services, for example – as not capable of making yourself a hot meal. I'm sure many more people need help but don't ask. Meals cost $\pounds 2.50$ but this is reviewed every April. Many

people don't order meals every day.

'In recent years the service has been provided at weekends for those who couldn't manage otherwise and who have no family living near. Our volunteers still deliver at weekends, though the Leatherhead office is closed. Over Christmas last year they shut us down for ten days and I wondered how on earth some people would

manage. They gave out frozen meals, which was all very well for those who had freezers and were capable of heating their own meals. I told my church (Bookham URC) about the problem and fourteen people volunteered to deliver 46 meals over two days to the most desperate Bookham residents. Community Services gave us the addresses plus the frozen meals, which we heated in the church's kitchen.'

I asked how the Meals on Wheels service started.

'The WRVS was formed in 1938 after the Home Secretary asked Lady Reading to form a voluntary organisation of women who would help should we become involved in war. We believe in 'simply caring' and we celebrated our Diamond Jubilee two years ago - I represented the Leatherhead area at the Royal Garden Party - where it belted with rain. WRVS is the largest voluntary organisation in the country - one in every 200 people belongs to it! In Leatherhead alone we do all kinds of things like manning the tea bar in the Day Centre and Victoria House on certain days and providing "books on wheels". I belong to an emergency team which can be called out by the blue light services at any time. Last year we were asked to provide tea and sandwiches for fireman working long hours at two big local fires - one opposite the Howard of Effingham school. Leatherhead Meals on Wheels, started 40 years ago, operating just two days a week.'

I wondered what people thought of the food.

Doris laughed. 'Some love it, some don't. We try to take account of preferences, though medical diets have to be our first consideration – low salt, low fat, high protein, diabetic, whatever. We provide balanced and varied meals – a hot main course and a dessert.'

'And who are your volunteers?'

'These days, with more and more people out at work, most are the active retired. Men are often happy to do extra days because they tend to have less responsibilities than the women, but most people choose to give a couple of hours once a fortnight. We need about 70 volunteers a week. Once they start most stay with us for years because they enjoy it, but inevitably some become ill or move away so we're always interested in hearing from others willing to join us. Phone 377523 on weekdays between 9.45-14.30 and ask for Sally Edmonds, or follow the signpost just to the right of Sainsbury's and come to see us at Leatherhead Day Centre. You would be most welcome.

The Lower Mole Countryside Management Project

Who?

The Lower Mole Countryside Management Project covers an area of 143km² of land in the north Surrey and Kingston areas. It was set up in 1983 to carry out practical countryside work for the benefit of wildlife and the local community.

We have a small core of staff but most of the practical work is carried out by volunteers. The current Project Manager is Nick Owen, the other permanent staff are Helen Cocker, Senior Project Officer and Conor Morrow, Project Officer. We are currently based in West Ew due to move to Horton Country Park in June 2000.

The Project is funded by Surrey County Council, Elmbridge Borough Council, Epsom and Ewell Borough Council, Mole Valley District Council, the Royal Borough of Kingston upon Thames and the Corporation of London. This funding mainly pays for the staff and vehicles, for each practical project we undertake we have to raise extra funds.

Why?

Most of the area that the Project covers is Green Belt. This is land where the town meets the countryside. This land is often under pressure from development and increasing recreational use. Many areas appear neglected and suffer from rubbish dumping and vandalism. Features like woods, hedgerows and ponds are often unmanaged.

The aims of the Project are to:

- Improve public access to the countryside for informal recreation.
- Conserve landscape features and enhance the natural beauty of the countryside.
- Increase public knowledge and understanding of the countryside.
- Encourage greater community involvement in the countryside.

What?

Our volunteers carry out a wide variety of practical work, on publicly and privately owned land, including:

Woodland management

Erection of stiles and signposts on footpaths

Surfacing muddy bridleways

Restoring neglected ponds

Clearing scrub to restore heathland

We organise volunteer task days 4 days a week - Tuesday to Thursday and Sunday.

YOGA THERAPY

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Volunteers are the lifeblood of our work, without them far less would be achieved. Over a year our volunteers achieve about 1700 days of work.

As well as the practical work we also produce leaflets and information boards for self-guided walks. We lead guided walks, write management plans and give advice on conservation projects and grants.

How Can You Help Us?

You can:

Take part in a practical project. We provide instruction, supervision, tools, first aid and insurance cover, as well as free tea, coffee and biscuits!

Offer us your specialist skills to help our work, for example wildlife surveying or drawing illustrations.

Give financial sponsorship towards practical projects or publications.

Donate materials or equipment to help with our work.

Tell us about sites where you would like to see some practical improvements.

Let us know if any of our work is vandalised or if there are any problems with it.

Work in the Bookham area

Bookham is at the southern edge of our project area. Work we have carried out close by includes scrub clearance to restore wet grassland habitat on Bookham Common, chalk grassland restoration and coppicing at Norbury Park (which we visit for one week every quarter), plus surfacing sections of the Riverside Walk through Leatherhead to allow access for wheelchairs. We have also worked with the Fetcham Residents Association on tree and hedge planting schemes and improved rights of way across farmland in the area by installing signposts, stiles and dog gates

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
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ROTARY CLUB OF BOOKHAM & HORSLEY

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BOOKHAM'S FAVOURITE POEM

Well done Bookham! A simple evening in the library to choose our favourite poem turned out to be one of the most successful events of Mole Valley's Festival of Literature and Media! About 40 people came along, aged anything from early teens to late eighties. 34 brought poems and about half of those read them out themselves – and did so beautifully. The rest were spoken by our capable team of readers – Edwina Vardey, Bay White, Eric Leat and Dorian Trout. Mole Valley's Poet Laureate came along and was delighted to find that people in Bookham enjoyed poetry so much.

Edwina Vardey and I organised the evening, assisted by Anne Ray, our wonderful 'Can do!' library manager, and by Sheila Warner and her helpers who sorted out the poems as people arrived. The two hours sped by because of the variety of poems chosen - sad or funny ones, some written for children, some contemporary and others literary classics, some well known but some unfamiliar to all of us apart from the person who had brought them along. One such was voted 'Bookham's Favourite Poem', winning first its heat and then the 'final' - Sheila Foote chose 'Which shall it be?' a narrative poem by Ethelinda Beers. Equal second (only one vote behind) were 'The glory of the garden' by Rudyard Kipling, chosen by Anne Ray and 'He wishes for the cloths of heaven' by WB Yeats, chosen by Lorna Dowell - Mole Valley's newly appointed Poet Laureate. Others short-listed included two funny poems 'Old Mrs Lorris' by Barbara Giles, chosen by Alex Rendell and 'What for?' by Noel Petty, chosen by Dorian Trout, plus a more serious poem, 'The road not taken' by Robert Frost, chosen by Penny Clark.

If anyone is interested in writing (not just poetry) I will be leading a 'Writing from Life' course in the library on ten Thursday evenings from late September. 

ST NICOLAS' MILLENNIUM KNEELER PROJECT

Nearly two years ago the stitchers of Bookham took up the challenge to make new kneelers for the Parish Church. The objective was to create a set of kneelers that enhance the beauty of the church and give a picture of life in Bookham at the turn of the century. Fifty kneelers have been finished, another eighty or so are under construction and the aim is to have around 200 completed by the end of 2001.


Each kneeler is worked on 12-point canvas with 6ply wool in cross-stitch – a sturdy structure designed to last at least 150 years. The backgrounds are in a uniform dark and light blue, but each stitcher can use her (or his) creative skills on a design in the centre of each kneeler. Many local clubs, societies and associations have sponsored kneelers, and those for U3A, Townswomen's Guild, Bookham Sequence

Dance Club, Scouts, Lions, The Wine Club and many more are already in use in the church. Other people have chosen to stitch designs significant to their own lives or those of their families. Golden Wedding anniversaries, grandchildren, pets, hobbies and family histories are all recorded.

What makes this project particularly exciting is the Kneeler Compendium that is being produced. Each person creating a kneeler is being interviewed and her/his kneeler photographed. So each kneeler has it's own story - what the design means, why it was chosen and, particularly, who created it. This permanent record gives us a rich history of life in our village in the late 20th century and a priceless legacy for our descendants.

Would you like to become involved? Or do you know someone who enjoys craftwork and might like to make a kneeler? There is lots of practical support available. The basic canvas is marked out for you and the two Project organisers - Angela Stevens and Angela Smith - supply the wools needed. If you have an idea for a centre design but can't draw, don't worry. There are very talented people available who will gladly create your ideas in a stitchable form.

Do go into St Nicolas Church and look at the kneelers already in service (the church is open 10.00 am to 12 noon on weekdays as well as for the normal Sunday services). If they fire you with enthusiasm to have a go yourself, then contact Angela Stevens on 456713 to find out more.



Angela Stevens and Angela Smith with the latest batch of kneelers to be blessed and put into service.

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

POLESDEN LACEY OPEN AIR THEATRE

A Tribute to Elsie Green

E lsie Green, who died in 1997 at the age of 93, was Director of the Polesden Lacey Open Air Theatre from 1952 to 1988. As many of you will know, the theatre was set up by the Bookham Community Association and has just finished its 49th season.

For thirty six years she presented Shakespeare, persevering during those years when the 'bard' was not popular and did not have the Globe Theatre to stimulate interest. For the first 18 years from 1951 Shakespeare was the only production but when the season was expanded with musicals and other plays, Shakespeare was still performed. She inspired countless young actors some of whom went on to theatrical or film careers and she gave to Bookham residents the opportunity to see very professional productions and helped to publicize the newly acquired National Trust Property.

After her last production in 1988 she continued to attend the Shakespeare productions directed by her successors. The style of the Shakespeare performances has been adapted to meet modern trends. Elsie's first production in 1951 was 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' and those of you who saw the play performed this year saw quite a different production, which was much praised. Would Elsie have approved? We think she would have.

The Theatre Committee, with the co-operation of the National Trust, has presented a hardwood seat, which was installed in the presence of many of her friends and actors, overlooking the theatre site where Elsie spent so much time dedicated to her productions.

We hope that her friends, her actors and all lovers of Shakespeare will sit in this seat and be filled with the spirit of that indomitable lady.

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

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
