## Editorial

### Want of Thought

In a side street of Clerkenwell a child, barely of school age, was seen to bang on a street door and presently somebody leaned out of the second-floor window to see who it was. The child stepped back a pace or two and stared up expectantly when down came the front door key and hit him full in the face!

How often are injury and pain caused by sheer lack of thought. There is no intention to do any harm, but just a moment's pause to think what the consequences might be would often save many a simple accident. Had the child's mother hesitated before throwing the key down, to make sure that it would fall clear of the child, no harm would have been done. All that was needed was a little care and thought. There are many more accidents in the home than on the roads and a little foresight, anticipation of possible consequences, and commonsense will prevent the great majority of them.

Want of thought is often the cause of much pain which arises from so called harmless gossip. A thoughtless remark, uttered

originally without malice, is often repeated and added to as it circulates like a snowball until the poor unfortunate victim has completely lost his reputation.

Want of thought is often the cause of much unnecessary grumbling and grouching. No doubt, nowadays, there are many just reasons for our complaints but how often when we examine more fully the cause of our complaints we find that in the circumstances we are lucky to have what we get.

## A 418 Easter Egg

The General Purposes Committee of the Leatherhead Council reported at the October meeting that "as the result of a Conference held on the site between representatives of the Council, the Ministry of Transport (Metropolitan Traffic Area), the London Transport Executive and the Surrey County Council, relative to the Council's representations for the transfer of the route 418 bus terminus to Bookham Station, the following conclusion had been reached:—

(a) The 418 bus terminus should be continued at Preston Crossroads as a temporary measure only pending arrangements for its transfer to the station site.

(b) The siting of the temporary bus stops termini at Preston Crossroads should be altered. The stop on the inbound route to be sited outside the workshop owned by Messrs. Hamshar, where the Council should be requested to provide a footpath of a width of approximately 2ft. 6ins. to enable passengers to alight, and at the present outbound terminus bus stop the buses should be parked immediately beyond the 'stop' sign.

(c) That the question of the provision of bays, to enable the road outside Bookham Station to be used as a terminus, be investigated by the Metropolitan Traffic Commissioners and the London Transport Executive."

## Bookham Recreation Ground

Both the Bookham Cricket and Football Clubs were very disappointed to hear that the Leatherhead Council were unable to accede to their request for the provision of a new pavilion at the Bookham Recreation Ground at the present time, but that the matter would be further considered in conjunction with the scheme for the improvement of recreation grounds in the whole of the district.

It appears that permission had been given to the Cricket Club to carry out works of repairs, at their own expense, to the pavilion. This improvement of the existing pavilion however did not meet the needs of the Football Club and as a result of a meeting of representatives from both Clubs, a joint request was sent to the Leatherhead Council for the provision of a new pavilion, which they were willing to erect with their own labour under any supervision approved by the Council, together with the provision of water, electricity and gas supplies. Both Clubs felt that temporary repairs to the existing structure would be both a waste of materials and money.

In his report to the Council the Engineer and Surveyor said that exclusive use of the pavilions on the Recreation Grounds under the control of the Council had never been granted to any particular Clubs. Further, that football and cricket clubs enjoyed the facilities

at the Council's Recreation Grounds free of charge. The Committee concurred in the opinion that any improvements to the grounds necessitating capital expenditure would have to be recouped from users of the grounds.

The Engineer and Surveyor further reported that the scheme, approved by the Council in 1939, for reconstruction & improvement of the Recreation Grounds was deferred at the outbreak of war and that fresh plans were being prepared.

We hope the Clubs will not be content to let matters remain as they are without further strenuous efforts. We know they have been inspired by the example of Leatherhead Football Club and no doubt by the time this is in print further moves will have been made. We heartily wish them every success.

The contractors on the Oakenwood Estate are making good progress and at the October meeting of the Council it was reported that 44 Orlit houses were roofed, 7 of which were plastered; 46 traditional houses have been roofed, of which 20 are plastered; 12 more are at eaves level and four two-roomed traditional type houses would be completed by the end of October. The Council have also decided to hold a ceremonial opening of the last house to be completed on this estate, to which a Minister of the Crown be invited

## Joint Residents' Association

We are glad to see from Council reports that the Ashted, Leatherhead, Bookham and Fetcham Residents' Association is functioning once again and as a result of a communication from the association, road signs indicating routes to London and Leatherhead Railway Station are to be fixed on the traffic island opposite the Gas Company's showrooms in Leatherhead. The Association also enquired about the use of Red House, Leatherhead, requesting provision of accommodation for Health Centre and Ante-Natal Clinic, tennis facilities and a public garden. ## Bookham Band

At the September meeting of the Leatherhead Council the Clerk reported that he had traced a number of band instruments alleged to belong to the former Bookham Band. The instruments, which were exhibited, have been placed in store until such time as ownership is proved by any claimant.

## The Crown Cross Roads

It would appear that the Police regard traffic lights as a means of controlling traffic and not necessarily to improve conditions of safety. Further, when lights show green, the tendency is to encourage motorists to drive over the crossroads too fast. With regard to this particular corner, the Police said there appeared to be no nervousness on the part of pedestrians, who stray across the crossroads both with and without perambulators and vehicles, children and dogs, as and when they wish!

## Boys will be Boys

The following is taken from a report by the Engineer & Surveyor to the G.P. Committee of the Leatherhead Council:—

“I should mention that it was found that the son of one of the Council house tenants at the Cleeve Road Housing Estate had fallen whilst climbing the standard of the above Lamp No. 280, and pulled the bracket down with him. It appears that children are in the habit of climbing the standards in this neighbourhood.”

From our own observation lamp climbing is a universal occupation of all children allowed to play in the streets, no matter where they are. We always remind any children seen climbing lamp-posts, of something our school-teacher told us many years ago, that cast-iron is very brittle and treacherous and it was unwise to swing on lamp-posts.

This also reminds us of an incident in the Dorking Road last winter, where boys are also very fond of climbing lamp-posts. The wall at Bookham Grove was being used as a grand-stand by several boys watching football on the recreation ground when the village constable came by and ordered them down. The next minute, the nets not yet having been extended, the ball was kicked over the wall. Without a moment's hesitation the same constable had given one of the boys a “bunk up” to retrieve the ball.

## Bookham Bowling Club

The Club launched out this year and held a Club Dinner at the Hotel Victoria on Wednesday, October 20th. It was followed by a presentation of prizes to the season's winners, and altogether a very pleasant evening was spent. It is hoped to make this an annual event.

The Club is well-known for its sociability and general good fellowship—a point which visiting teams always admire.

May we again emphasise that new members will be heartily welcomed.

May we suggest that pedestrians in the High Street walk on the pavement and **not** on the side where there is no path. Many very near accidents have occurred through this want of thought. In the interests of everybody—and particularly of yourself—study
