
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

The first, the Afternoon Institute, also started in the Little Bookham Hall, moved into the Croft, then to the Barn Hall, and finally to Church House, where it still meets.

The Bookham Evening W.I. started as an offshoot from the Afternoon W.I. when this became too large. It met at the Congregational Hall but soon outgrew this Hall. Consequently it is now meeting at the Barn Hall on the first Tuesday in the month. As it is essential to W.I.s to retain a friendly, village atmosphere it was felt by members of the Evening W.I. that this was the moment to consider the formation of a further Institute and with the support of all members in Bookham, as well as the County Executive, this was done. As a result there has been a further expansion of the W.I. Movement in Bookham.

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needlework is well known to Bookham people. The object of the training is to enable them to earn a living in their own homes. Some, however, are so seriously disabled that they cannot subsist in the outside world, and the School supplies Sheltered Workshops for some of these.

This year the annual Fete, which is organised by the Leatherhead Rotary Club in conjunction with the Inner Wheel and the Fetcham British Legion. has been arranged for Saturday, June 25th, from 2.30 p.m. It takes place in the grounds of the School of Stitchery so that the girls in residence may enjoy and participate in it. It is hoped that many local people will patronise it and so help to swell the special fund from which can be purchased items of equipment for which there would otherwise be no money.

at the end of April was a great success. There were three performances, all well attended. Bookham audiences seem to have a preference for comedies, and this play, produced for the laughs, got plenty of them.


The Society is still open for new members, especially males.

The Open-Air Theatre at Polesden Lacey will be the setting for Shakespeare's "The Taming of the Shrew" from the 13th to the 16th of July. This is an important event in the local calendar and a massive piece of volunteer organisation in which so many of us are proud to participate. There is seating for 2,000 at each performance, and on some evenings the auditorium can be completely booked up. There is therefore need for much help. Those interested in booking tickets will like to know that Box Office, run by Mrs. B. Oldershaw (Bookham 2241), opens on May 1st.

The Flower Arrangement Group continues to grow in numbers and expertise. It is now participating in county events and has been asked to contribute an arrangement to the festival in Guildford Cathedral organised by the County Executive. Rapid promotion is taking place in the monthly competitions and there it now an Intermediate as well as a Novices' Section. The new Chairman for 1966 is Mrs. M. Camp. The original chairman, Mrs. E. Harrison, has been made first President of the Group. Mrs. S. McLeod, whose enfficiency as Secretary has contributed so much to the success of the Group,

The Group (which is a club of the Community Association) meets on the first Monday of the month at 2.30 p.m. in the Barn Hall. In June Mrs. M. There will be a welcome for any of our readers who would carc to come along to a monthly meeting.

The Cross Daggers, which is a friendly and rather small club meeting on the Lower Road Recreation Ground is also looking for new members who can be assured of a warm welcome if they turn up at the field when matches are being played at the week-end. Members like to meet each other socially between seasons and shortly before the beginning of the summer opening they enjoyed a theatre coach trip to see "Boeing-Boeing".

The Scottish Dancers do not meet as a club in the summer but members remain active during this period. They are in great demand for fetes and other occasions. Donations made to them in appreciation of their services are always paid into Community Association funds. Over and above this they recently gave the Association £21, a much appreciated contribution to the Building Fund. On Village Day they provide the White Elephant Stall, and have done so for a number of years. They also organise the Village Day raffle. Both of these are great money spinners.

Our good wishes go with them to the Slough Arts Festival. Much of the organisation of this widely known event springs from the Community Centre at Slough. Last year the Bookham Scottish Dancers were pipped by only one point from first place. This year they hope to carry off the first award.

## **BOOKHAM RIFLE CLUB**

The following short history of the Bookham Rifle Club, which is winning awards in National and County Competitions, is contributed by Mr. D. F. Rattenbury and will be of interest to Bookham residents who do not remember its early days.

The Club was originally formed by members of the Home Guard in 1943 and the original name was kept. Many of the founder-members are still with the Club and include Mr. Donald G. Cook, J.P., who is the President; Mr. G. W. Brion, a Vice-President and still holding a place in "A" Team; Mr. T. M. Smith, Club Captain; and Mr. N. S. Dyer, who is Statistical Officer.


In the beginning shooting took place on a small 25 yards range at Bookham Grove and membership never exceeded 20. It was hoped that this could be the centre of a permanent club, but when the Council started their housing development at the Grove in 1951 this was found to be impossible and the U.D.C. offered a new site at Thorncroft, available also to the Leatherhead Rifle Club. In the course of negotiations the Leatherhead Club dropped out and Mr. O. J. Rattenbury again took over the reins as Hon. Secretary a position which he now holds and has held continuously. The membership is now 100 and reflects the devoted work rendered by the Secretary. A fitting recognition of this was the presentation of a long-service medal to Mr. Rattenbury by the Secretary of the National Small-Bore Rifle Association, Mr. A. J. Palmer.

Negotiations for "Thorncroft" were only completed in 1953 and the Club's officials, together with Mr. A. W. Attwater, who had just joined, set to work to build new ranges. Thanks to their efforts in money-raising and hard physical labour, together with the help of a growing number of members, the Rifle Club now has one of the finest ranges in the country. There are 20 covered firing points at 25 vards, 12 at 50 yards, 9 at 100 yards, and there is a 20 yards pistol range. The latest acquisition is a fine club house and this, too, has been built by members.


The result of all this hard work can be seen in the fine shooting successes achieved this year. "A" Team won Division III of the National League (100 yards and 50 yards) and were awarded the I.C.I. Marksmanship Trophy. They also received the Lord Pirrie Cup (County Trophy) for their success in Division I of the Surrey Short Range League.

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The National Short Range Three Positional Championship was won by J. W. Proctor, who is also a member of the Surrey team for standing and kneeling shooting, together with two other members of the Club, J. Cleaver and I. Law. The feminine side is catered for; Margaret McQue and Brenda Smith shoot in the Surrey Ladies' Team.

The latest outstanding achievement is the score of "A" Team in a recent round of the National Standing and Kneeling League Division I (where they hold top place) which establishes a national record.

These are only a few of the many triumphs scored by teams and members which have put Bookham right in the centre of the shooting world.

#### JOTTINGS

An Exciting 12-Week Tour by air of South America and Trinidad has just been completed by Mr. A. E. W. Cross, of Orchard Grange. We are sure that the old people and the young people of Bookham, in whom he takes great interest, will be eager to hear and see the record of his travels.

**Dramatic Honours** go to Mrs. Olive Stemp who tied for first place for the best individual performance at the recent Betchworth Drama Festival. She took the part of Cynthia, one of three old sisters engaged in the forging of masterpieces, in the one-act play "Even Less than Legal". As well as being a triumph for Mrs. Stemp this is also an achievement

for the Afternoon W.I., under its Producer Mrs. E. White, and is their first in this category.

Naval Award. Congratulations to Mr. A. E. Baker on the award of the Volunteer Reserve Decoration for officer service in the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve and Royal Naval Reserve. He joined the R.N.V.R. in 1929 and was awarded the Long-Service Medal in 1941. Mr. Baker has resided in Bookham for fourteen years and is Secretary of the B.C.A. Gramophone Club.

**Enterprise Neptune.** In our autumn issue we made reference to the work done by the Bookham Commons Committee of the National Trust and stressed the need for Bookham people to give them the assistance they need in preserving the beauty of an open space which is on their very doorsteps.

We do not apologise for bringing to the attention of our readers another venture of the National Trust, namely, "Enterprise Neptune" which is a campaign to save for the people of Britain such beautiful sections of the coast which still remain unspoilt. A 1966 National Appeal to raise £2,000,000 has been launched and the Government has already given support.

The Trust is proceeding on a County and Local Authority basis. Mr. A. J. C. Read of Beaumont, School Lane, Fetcham (Leatherhead 4676) has accepted the post of Hon. District Supervisor for the Leatherhead Urban

District area. The task is to raise locally £7,000. The area has been divided into 78 wards— 17 of which are in Bookham each comprising some 150 to 175 residences. Already Bookham has supplied its quota of wardens.

A letter from the warden and suitable literature will go to all homes and it is hoped that a generous response will be made to enable Bookham to reach its target of £1,600. A stall has been allocated to Enterprise Neptune for Village Day.

A Link with the Past Severed. The closing down of the Stemp Shoe Repair and Saddlers Business in the High Street will be generally regretted, the more so as it has been caused by the ill health of Mr. A. Stemp. Mr. Stemp followed his father into the business and, like him, took a great interest in the Bookham Cricket and Football Clubs.

The shop has not changed much since the early days more than 80 years ago when it was started by the grandfather. The founder of the firm was a fine old man and quite a character. Even in his advanced old age he took pride in the business and was full of reminiscences of old Bookham. He remembered well Mrs. Christie who was a benefactor of the Victorian school. She was a great worker for the cause of temperance. She built two Temperance Hotels, the old Victoria, now the headquarters of Rayheat, and the one at the Station, now occupied by Wildts. Besides

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Recreation Ground to the village she also established the small hall which is the tin hut standing behind the High Street, off East Street, Here the old Mr. Stemp taught woodwork, and the tools he used along with some of the work he produced were on display in one of our early Village Days.

A Community Association Pioneer Dies. We were sorry to hear of the death in Devonport, Tasmania, of Mr. Charles V. Bravne, C.M.G., at the age of 87. He was a Vice-President of the Bookham Community Association, a position he held in recognition of his work in pioneering the establishment of a Community Centre in Bookham.

Mr. Bravne devoted himself to youth work in Bookham but he also served with distinction for many years as a Bookham representative on the Leatherhead Council.

Ave atoue Vale. We are glad to welcome back to the district and to the Community Association Dr. and Mrs. Knight. Dr. Knight has returned from Aden to the R.A.F. Rehabilitation Centre at Headley Court, where he was previously stationed. They are enthusiastic members of the Scottish Dancing Group, and, while they lived in Barn Meadow Lane, were very active in all the events put on to help the Building Fund of the Barn Hall. Since their return their participation in B.C.A. affairs indicates they have not lost any of their former energy and zeal.

It is also a great pleasure to extend the same warm welcome back to Mr. and Mrs. S. Hall. Mr. Hall has been posted back from Edinburgh to London. It is our good fortune that, after much searching, they have found a site for their future home in Keswick Park. They have many friends in Bookham who are delighted to have them back. Mr. S. Hall was a former Chairman of the Community Association and he and his wife were active in support of it. Mrs. Una Hall was a keen member of the Afternoon W.I. and played a leading part in their drama.

Saunders is a great loss to Bookham. He and his wife will be much missed in many local organisations. Mr. Saunders was always most conscientious in service to the community. There can be few organisations which have not had his assistance-he has acted in many capacities, from auditor to chairman-at some time or other. The Garden Society, of which he was Treasurer for many years, are sorry to see him go. The Community Association owes a deep debt of gratitude. As Treasurer of the Association for twelve years he has had considerable work in watching the financial interests of a body which has been constantly growing in activities and responsibilities.

It was always his wish to retire to his boyhood home in Norfolk, and he and his wife have now moved to the lovely home built

in West Runton according to their own ideas by Mr. W. E. Larkin.

Some months have passed since Mr. and Mrs. J. F. Cawte, old Bookham residents, left the village. Both of them were always ready to give a hand in local activities. Mrs. Cawte was especially active and popular in the Afternoon W.I. where she was for some years Chairman of the Produce Group, also serving on the County Sub-Committee dealing with this side of Institute activities. They have moved to Uplyme in Dorset, near Lyme Regis, and we are not surprised The retirement of Mr. R. to hear that Mrs. Cawte has already joined the W.I. there. Their house in Seaview Road has a garden of two acres and the maintenance and improvement of this is occupying most of their leisure time. We wish them both happiness in their new home.

> Another couple who will be missed are Mr. and Mrs. D. Mc-Cormack. Although not so long resident in Bookham as the others mentioned here they have made roots in the village, especially in the Catholic community in which they have both been very active. Mrs. McCormack represented the Catholic Women's League on the Council of the B.C.A. and served on its Social Sub-committee, helping among other things with the Thursday Coffee Mornings.

They are sailing on May 16th, with their younger son and daughter, to Perth, Western Australia. A happy coincidence their elder daughter has just arrived there.
