Editorial

The Howard of Effingham School

The time—a sunny afternoon towards the end of July, 1950; the place—the hall of the Howard of Effingham School, with french windows open to the old walled garden, and the scent of the flowers in great bowls on the window ledges; the occasion, the School's first public speech day and prize giving.

After opening remarks by the Chairman of the Governors (Rev. J. W. Reynolds) and an impressive report by the Head Master (Mr. P. J. Hewitt) on the past year's achievements in class work and athletics, comes an able address by the Chief Education Officer for Surrey, Mr. R. Beloe.

Mr. Beloe, who was formerly a master at Eton, speaks with authority and with occasional flashes of humour which the boys and girls in the body of the hall are not slow to appreciate. But it is perhaps because he speaks as the father of three children that his remarks deserve the special attention of Bookham parents. He asks that in matters of education we should guard against being parochial—that is, that we should realize the benefit our children would derive from rubbing

shoulders with those from other parishes, who might have a different outlook and upbringing.

The Howard of Effingham School gives secondary education not to the children of the Bookhams only but also to those of Effingham and the Horsleys, and it has the advantage over smaller local schools (which formerly catered for children of ages 5 to 14) that it can furnish a staff of specialist teachers. At the Howard of Effingham School general education suited to the abilities and aptitudes of the pupils is provided up to the age of 13, and from 13 to 15 they take more specialised courses with a bias towards the type of vocation for which each pupil is fitted. At Effingham there are two such courses—(1) domestic and (2) agricultural. Any 13 year old pupil showing a special aptitude in another direction—say, art, commercial or technical—can be transferred to a secondary modern school elsewhere (at Epsom, Dorking or Leatherhead) that has the necessary specialist teachers. Furthermore, a pupil who at 13 years is found to be fitted for a grammar school course can be transferred to the grammar school course at the Leatherhead Secondary School.

Since the Howard of Effingham

School opened in 1940, 7½% of its pupils have in fact been transferred to special courses at other schools. Many parents, and even that august body the Leatherhead Urban District Council, appear to be unaware of these provisions under the Education Act of 1944.

Howard of Effingham School, opened soon after the outbreak of World War II. and beset by the problems of the evacuation, has had to overcome many difficulties. It is satisfactory to record Mr. Beloe's assurance, at the prize giving this year, that "Whatever uninformed people may have said elsewhere, this school is going along on the right lines.—W.T.C.

The Bookham Choral Society

The Bookham Choral Society is one of the oldest social organisations in Bookham. It was in the autumn of 1927 that a few ardent choral singers who had been members of the then recently defunct Fetcham Choral Society decided to form a Choral Society in Great and Little Bookham, with the idea of being affiliated to the Leith Hill Musical Festival.

The inaugurators of Bookham Choral Society were lucky in having the support of Mrs. Bazelgette, who had been the conductor of the Fetcham Society and has recently moved from Fetcham to Little Bookham. Others assisting in the formation were Mrs. Mooney of Effingham, Mrs. Spurgeon of

Fetcham and Mr. & Mrs. Trevor Newman of Great Bookham.

The young Society proceeded to give a good account of itself at the Leith Hill Festival competitions, both under the conductorship of Mrs. Bazelgette and later of Mrs. Shanks. The war put a stop to the competitions at Dorking for six years, but the Society kept going all through the war period, practising the works set by the Leith Hill Committee and taking part in performances of musical works of a religious nature under the conductorship of Dr. Vaughan Williams at churches at Dorking and Epsom.

When competitions were resumed after the war it became necessary for the Society to find a new conductor, and the choice fell on Mr. Langmead Robinson. Under Mr. Robinson's guidance the Society has achieved very considerable success at the Festival competitions, and in 1949 was transferred from being top of the First Division Villages to competing with the towns (i.e. Dorking, Leatherhead, Epsom, etc.) and in 1950 the Society was first in two of the competitions.

The Society can still accept a few more singers (particularly tenors), preferably able to read music. Practices are held on Tuesday evenings from 8 to 9.30 in the Congregational Church Hall, Eastwick Road, commencing this year on the 19th September. Anyone interested should apply to L.R. Notes on the History of The Old Barn Hall

The Old Barn Hall is the name given to the barn of Sole Farm after its transformation into a hall in 1906, when it was separated from the farm property and conveyed to Trustees.

As a barn, it was the chief out-building of Sole Farm, and was doubtless used for the storage of the farm's produce: corn, straw and hay. In the centre of the barn was probably a threshing floor upon which the corn crops were threshed out with flails. Crops which had been perforce reaped while damp were spread out to dry in the shelter of barns, and a large barn was essential to the working of a mediæval farm.

The timber framing, which is in part original is probably of sixteenth century date. Though not exceptionally large, this barn was one of the largest in the parish, except for the rectorial and vicarial tithe-barns, which have long been destroyed. The building is shown accurately on plan on a survey of Great Bookham made in 1797-98, and is probably represented by a conventional sketch on the plan of Great Bookham Manor made in 1614-16 by Thomas Clay. Clay's survey-book describes the farm as "a Custumarie Tenement with a Barne Stable."

Considered as a part of Sole Farm, the history of the barn or

at least of its site can be traced to early times: the name Sole goes back to the Old English word "sol" meaning a muddy pool; which pool existed immediately to the north of the Barn Hall entrance on the west side of the road well into the twentieth century. The Old English language was used until the early twelfth century, and the property known later as "atte Sole" probably existed at the time of the Norman Conquest if not earlier.

The first documentary reference is to Thomas atte Sole; this is dated 1294. John atte Sole in 1337 surrendered the customary or copyhold messuage & half-virgate of land called "atte Sole" to his son Thomas, who died in 1342 leaving it to his son John, a boy of sixteen, left in the guardianship of his mother Alice. Later the property passed through the hands of John Stevens, Adam Smyth and Edward Glassyng, from whom it was acquired in 1524 by Walter Roger or Rogers. Its descent in the Rogers family can be traced down to the early eighteenth century, when the family died out in Bookham, and the farm came into the hands of the Earls of Effingham, Lords of the Manor of Great Bookham. During the period of the Rogers, the annual rent was 26s. 8d. and one fat pig, while in 1627 the house was referred to as "Robert Rogers' Mansion called Zole in Great Bookham." In 1822 at the Enclosure of Great Bookham open fields, the farm lands finally lost their ancient character, and

became entirely composed of consolidated blocks of hedged fields such as we know today.

The "half-virgate" of land which went with the house in 1337 was probably equivalent to about 15 acres, together with rights in the common waste for pasturing animals on what are now Bookham and Ranmore Commons. Until it fell to the Lord of the Manor in the eighteenth century, Sole was always a copyhold: that is to say, it passed by inheritance, but subject to the custom of the Manor and not according to the law of the land.

The opening ceremony at 3 p.m. at the Barn Hall on Saturday, 16th Sept., will be performed by Miss Barbara Everest, the celebrated actress who has been playing the part of Mrs. Bennett in the B.B.C. Sunday performances of "Pride & Prejudice," and whose role as Queen Anne in "Viceroy Sarah" will be long remembered.

The exhibits will include manuscripts, antiques, photographs, programmes, etc., bearing on the history and development of Bookham; many have already been lent, but the Organizing Committee would be glad of further offers from residents or former residents. Other sections of the exhibition will feature antiques of general interest, and objects having a curiosity value. Finally, there will be a display of hobbies, arts and crafts, and the like, offers of which will be welcomed.

Dramatic performances by the members of the Drama Group and Women's Institute, displays of folk

dancing, ballet dancing, etc., a P.T. display by Howard of Effingham School and, for the children, a paddler's pool provided by the Brownies, are among the attractions to be put on in the grounds behind the Barn Hall and in nearby marquees. Admission will be by programme, price 1s., children 6d.

In connection with the Village Day celebrations, the notes (to be found on another page) on the history of the Barn Hall are of special interest.

The Day will close with a procession in fancy dress to the Church House, where from 8.30 p.m. there will be a Carnival Dance under the auspices of the Old Time Dance Club.

Under the heading "The Great Elm of Bookham" the *News Chronicle* of the 28th July carried the following story:—

"In 1627 churchwarden Ralph Hilder planted an elm tree in a corner of Great Bookham (Surrey) churchyard. The tree grew. It grew so big that Leatherhead Urban Council decided it made the corner dangerous for motorists and ordered the Rector, Canon A. M. Hughes, to have the tree felled. Thus began a fight between the Council and the Rector, who was supported by the villagers. The fight lasted two years and ended yesterday.

Then the Council announced they had been told by Counsel that the Act of Parliament under which they made their order did not apply to consecrated ground. Though they have withdrawn their order for the removal of the tree, the Council have told the Rector that he must be held 'morally responsible for any accident which takes place as a result of the presence of the tree.' "

Perhaps the most happy sequel would be the installation of traffic lights alongside the Hilder elm, a measure which has more than once been recommended to minimize the danger to children passing to and from Great Bookham Primary School. The danger is equally great at the junction of High St. with the Guildford Rd. Pending

completion of the projected roundabout at this point, traffic lights are urgently needed here also, in the interests of public safety.

On Saturday, 8th July, members of the Bookham Community Association were entertained to tea at "Birchwood," by invitation of the President (Dr. N. E. Waterfield) and Mrs. Waterfield. Sunday, 2nd July. The performance was by members of the Chamber Ensemble of the London Symphony Orchestra, who opened with Mozart's *Eine Kleine Nachtmusik*. There followed George Stratton's Quintet for Oboe and Strings, and, finally, Mozart's String Quintet.

The lovely background of Polesden's lawns and gently rustling leaves, the calm beauty of a perfect summer evening and the sympathy of the audience matched by the orchestra's sensitive interpretation, were deeply satisfying. The concert was arranged by the National Trust in conjunction with the London Symphony Orchestra Club, and many of their members attended.

At the July meeting of the Leatherhead U.D.C. sanction was given to a number of permanent works in commemoration of the Festival of Britain, and it was agreed that a contribution of £150 be made towards the cost of the scheme for laying-out an open-air theatre at Polesden Lacey. Attention was drawn to the fact that this provision would benefit the district as a whole, and it was agreed to consider the inclusion in the Festival programme of some further item of improvement in the Bookham Ward in the event of the scheme for the improvement of the Bookham Recreation Ground not being approved by the Ministry of Health.

The National Trust, into whose ownership Polesden Lacey passed under the will of the Hon. Mrs. Greville, is independent of the State and relies on voluntary benefactions and support. Anyone can be enrolled as a member of the National Trust on payment of an annual membership subscription of 10/- (minimum). Members enter all N.T. properties (of which there are 1,000) free, and in addition receive a list of properties and periodical reports. Mr. Robin Romilly Fedden, of Polesden Lacey, is the Regional Representative for the South-Eastern Counties. Application for membership may be made either to Mr. Fedden or to the Headquarters of the National Trust at 42 Queen Anne's Gate, London, S.W.1.
