Bookham flies on another great Village Day



Children in the parade and stallholders came up with some amazing outfits interpreting this year's theme 'Bookham Takes Flight'.

All kinds of insects, birds and lots of bees and even aircraft made their way down the High Street. Dawnay School took first prize in the schools group with their plane with folding wings, accompanied by children as pilots, crew and ground staff. Polesden Lacey Infant School's butterflies, dragonflies and ladybirds were runners-up.

From the pre-school groups Smarty Pants Pre-School were the winners and Rainbow Playgroup runners-up. A St Lawrence School pupil made an eye-catching outsize bumble bee in the parade. The excellent costumes of all 13 groups made judging a very hard task.

The colourful parade led by Jason Wright's vintage Austin 7 with Brian White's Jazz Band behind made its way to the Old Barn Hall field in Church Road. The Steelonium Steel Band also provided music all the way.

On the field judging was also difficult with so many attractively decorated stalls. Bookham WIs swept the board with Great Bookham Belles aviation stall and Bookham Bees' bees, flowers and hive stall chosen joint winners for best dressed stalls.

In the busy main hall Bookham Butterflies WI took first prize for their refreshment area beautifully decorated with butterflies, insects and flowers, and tables were also decorated. Their big band of volunteers provided a nonstop refreshment service including many mouth-watering cakes. Runners-up were Bookham Camera Club with a wonderful display of wildlife photos.

Following prize presentations and displays by schools in the main arena events were kept swinging along by MC David Evans in his trademark Union Jack jacket. Henfold Birds of Prey supported by Elio's barbers and Di Carlo's hair salon, treated the crowds to two thrilling displays. They included a hawk and a falcon,

the windy afternoon and overflying crows causing a few interruptions but made for more excitement. Other birds including tawny, barn and wood owls were also on show in the static display.

Refreshments, including burgers and hot dogs and lunches and teas in the hall, did a roaring trade, as did the open-air bar where a selection of local real ales were served. The many attractions on the field included a climbing wall, provided by Churches Together of Bookham, which attracted lots of youngsters.

Action Theatre performed, and the wide range of music included singer Natalie Goodacre and her trio, Band from the Pub and Brian White's Magna Jazz Band. Steel band groups played in the Calypso Corner.

The Vineries Garden Centre were the main sponsors of the day, which raises funds for Bookham Community Association to keep the Old Barn Hall running and produce the quarterly Bookham Bulletins.

This was another great community day for Bookham, bringing together so many people from the village. We have to thank the many local organisations, businesses and individuals for supporting us and making the event such a success.

A total of over £21,195 A wonderful result thank you all.


A BIG THANK YOU TO ALL OUR SUPPORTERS



Pests & Diseases

How do your Alliums Grow? Here at Eastwick Allotments (where we have our shop open to all gardeners every Sunday morning) over the last few growing seasons, allotment holders have been plagued with problems with alliums – principally with leeks, and to a lesser extent with onions. Other alliums can also be affected including shallots, garlic, and chives. There are two main pests, leek moth and allium leaf miner.

Main symptoms of leek moth are white patches on the leaves, with young plants rotting and eventually dying. The adult leek moth is a very small, inconspicuous brown moth (5-6mm long), whilst the leek moth caterpillars are 11mm long, creamy white with brown heads and small legs. Leek moth has two generations during the Summer with the larvae/caterpillars doing the damage. The first generation occurs in May, June with the second generation - the latter more numerous and damaging. Initially the caterpillars mine the foliage, but the older larvae bore into the stems and bulbs. When fully fed, they come out of the plant and pupate within silk like cocoons. Adult moths emerge in the autumn and overwinter in sheltered spaces.

Chemical control of Leek Moth is difficult (but

not impossible), as none of the pesticides available to home gardeners will give effective control. There is hope at hand with the development of leek moth pheromone traps, like those for apples and plums. The trap uses the scent of the female moth to lure and trap the male moth. As soon as the male moths appear in the trap, a suitable pesticide may be used to control the female moths.

Of course, not everyone turns to chemicals and the female moths can be prevented from laying eggs by covering the young plants with insect proof Enviromesh, which is one of the popular items we have available on the roll at the Allotment Huts every Sunday morning. Additionally, crop rotation should also be practiced to prevent local build-up of moth populations. Look for the white silk like cocoons on the foliage and squash them.

Now to that other pest, the allium leaf miner. Symptoms are lines of white spots on the leaves. This is caused by the maggots of the leaf miner, leading to secondary fungal and bacterial infections causing rotting of the plants. The adult fly is tiny, just 3mm long and grey/black brown in colour. The maggots are pale yellow and about 6mm long. The leaf miner has two generations per year. The fly overwinters as pupae within the plant tissue, with the adult fly emerging in spring, the

timing of emergence seems to be temperature dependant. Mating occurs within 48 hours. The adult female then lays eggs, inserting them into the leaves so when the eggs hatch, the maggots tunnel into the plant, heading down towards the root. Once fully grown, they pupate at the base of the hole they have eaten into, the flies emerge towards the end of August and they cycle starts over again.

Chemical control is almost impossible, as none of the pesticides available to the home gardener is likely to give adequate control. However, again plants can be protected by covering with an insect-proof ultra fine Enviromesh. Crop rotation must be used to prevent local build-up of the fly population.

The trouble is that these insect-based problems are not the only difficulties for alliums. There are a number of fungal based diseases that also affect alliums, such as Leek Rust and Onion Neck Rot. For these fungal problems, there is no chemical control approved for the home gardener. Ornamental Alliums suffer from the same pests and diseases as culinary onions, but they do tend to be trouble-free in the flower border. However, it is best to avoid planting where onion crops have been grown.

Bookham Traders

Bookham Celebrates the Living History of its Independent Retailers. The programme of events will contain a host of

activities for children, including card making, colouring competitions, chocolate truffle making, a treasure hunt, Christmas decoration making, and face painting. There will be tastings and quizzes for the grownups, together with food demonstrations and recipe advice. Musical interludes provided by our local steel band, line dancers, and choirs

will add to the festival atmosphere.

Come along and discover the knowledge and passion of our local shopkeepers about their products and services. Pink balloons will be displayed outside the shops taking part. The programme of events will be displayed in advance around the village centre.

Bookham Youth & Community Centre

Bookham Youth & Community Centre, situated opposite the Anchor pub on Lower Road, has been a valued and important part of the village for many years. It is run by trustees and other volunteers and incorporated into a charity, Bookham Youth & Community Association Ltd (BYCA). As reported over the years it has a finite life due to its ageing condition and the lease from Surrey County Council (SCC) expires in August 2019. SCC will be reviewing the possibility of an extension at the year end.

Concerning a possible replacement facility, we were advised in June by Cllr Tim Oliver, the Cabinet Member responsible :

"I think you can be confident that we are very near to being able to finally moving this project forward to the point where we have a clear game plan and a deliverable timetable."

There are no guarantees involved and it is important that pressure is kept on SCC so the project is not shelved.

Mole Valley Indoor Bowling Club

The finals at MVIBC this year were played with Bookham represented in eight of the twelve finals, quite a strong element challenging for a place on the honours board! After two days of intensive play, Bookham members were part of the team for five of the available trophies, well done Bookham!

As our summer weather peaks and we move towards autumn, many outdoor bowlers return to play indoors at MVIBC maintaining their interest in the game with challenges for new competitions on the indoor green through the dull winter days.

However, we are also keen to capture the interest of locals who have never visited a bowling green or have no idea of how the game is played. For this purpose, a brief description of the game follows.

Bowling truly is the sport for all regardless of age, gender, or physical ability. It is a sport that is quick to learn and enjoy, but can take a long bowling career to master. The object of the

sport is simple to grasp. It is played on a square area known as 'the green', which is subdivided into further playing areas called 'rinks'. There are markers around the edge of the green indicating the corners and centerlines of each rink, which is surrounded by a small ditch to catch bowls that stray. At MVIBC we have four rinks, larger clubs having up to eight. Players take turns to cast their bowls from a mat at one end of the rink, towards a small white ball referred to as 'the jack' - at the other end. The bowls are shaped to take a curved path towards the jack. To be successful, the bowl must be delivered with the correct weight, along the correct line. The object is to get one or more of your bowls closer to the jack than those of your opponents. The nearest bowls to the jack score one point for each counting bowl. There are many different formats of the game, but all will be readily explained by our coaches and other club members at whatever pace and interest suits you.

Feel free to come along to our free open





sessions every Saturday morning in September 2018, from 10:00am - 1:00pm. Park in the rear car park of the Leatherhead Leisure Centre, the entrance is nearby and will be clearly marked. If Saturday mornings are not convenient, please contact us for an alternative time. Our team will provide a welcome introduction to the game and club facilities. Casual shoes with a smooth base will be required for our Open Days, members must own the correct shoes. For bowls, training sets are available, and coaches will help you choose your most suitable size and weight before purchase. The initial membership dress code is white top and grey slacks.

Polesden Lacey Infant School

It may surprise you to learn that earlier this year, it was revealed that 'plastic' is the 2018 Children's Word of the Year. Oxford University Press found the use of the word in children's creative writing had increased by 100% since 2017, as the 'Blue Planet II' effect continues to raise awareness of plastic pollution. The news is no surprise to the planet-friendly pupils of Polesden Lacey Infant School, many of whom have been learning about the problem with plastic for several years and are brimming with ideas for tackling it.

Never more so than during the school's annual Waste Week, where single-use plastic was the hot topic. The children brought in their family's packaging waste from a weekend's worth of meals to make a 'waste mountain', which shocked children and staff alike and sparked a great discussion on unnecessary packaging. Year 2 pupils wrote letters to Michael Gove MP (Secretary of State for the Environment, Food and Rural Affairs) and local supermarket chains to share their concerns about excessive packaging and to ask what they are doing to fix the problem - a fantastic opportunity to practice their persuasive writing skills. Turning to science, pupils made their own vinegarbased cleaning products - tested to great effect on the school's now sparking windows. They also looked at the results of their waste decomposition investigation to see what had happened to the materials they buried last year – needless to say the plastic was exactly the same, albeit a bit dirty. Through these creative and immersive experiences, the children are able to see problems firsthand and are empowered to be part of the solution and that they have the power to be changemakers!

And to top off an illuminating week, the school won the Surrey Wastebusters Home Recycling Challenge for the second year running, raising £500 for the school and proving that the pupils of Polesden Lacey Infant School really are waste-busting beacons.

From busting waste to busting moves, the children absolutely love the energetic 'wake and shake' dance sessions run by the teachers three mornings a week. So imagine their excitement when a local ballroom dancing champion and teacher Terri Flett ran a series of weekly dance lessons for every class. Pupils learned to dance the cha-cha-cha, waltz, and jive working in pairs and individually – and possibly inspiring the next Anton Du Beke and Erin Boag? The school offers unique opportunities for the children to try something

new, while meeting the rigorous demands of the national curriculum, and shows them the many fun ways to keep active.

In the run up to Village Day, the school was a hive of creativity as the children enjoyed decorating their costumes for the Parade at our summer making morning. On the big day, pupils transformed into dazzling dragonflies, lovely ladybirds, and beautiful butterflies, and we all watched on with pride as they whizzed and fluttered along the route. It's heartwarming to see how much the children love taking part in this event – one child said, 'Village Day is the best day of the year – it's like Christmas!' Needless to say they were delighted to be awarded the runner-up trophy for the best costumes.

Last, but by no means least, was the extremely popular Marvellous Math morning, where parents and carers are invited back to school to enjoy a maths lesson with their children. It's astounding to see how much has changed since we were at school, how effortlessly the teachers support and stretch the children and how the children revel in rising to the 'tricky challenges'. Onwards and upwards!


yet at affordable prices and with flexibility on the disciplines taken.

Bus Stop Pre-School



It has been another fabulous term at Bus Stop, and we can't believe the school year is nearly over! The summer term started with the exciting topic of 'Where we live'. The children enjoyed creating giant road maps using large pieces of paper and drawing the roads to their homes, their houses, and thought about the places we each have in our villages. This activity supported the children's writing skills as they made marks on the paper, and supported their understanding of places in their own worlds, and their communication and language skills as they shared their own knowledge. This theme has given the children the opportunity to look more closely at where they live and notice features that make their homes and streets different from others,



noticing both similarities and differences.

Following on from this, the children really enjoyed creating a natural village, using big logs for the roads, and sticks, moss, and leaves to create the houses and buildings. After the children had created the village it was lovely to watch them play with it. To bring the whole theme to life, the Bus Stop Preschool spent a day in Bookham! The children enjoyed exploring Bookham Common, and walking around the ponds, waving at the train drivers from the bridge at the train station, then sat beautifully on the bus ride into the village where they were given a clipboard to help them spot all the different landmarks and shops in the village.

Another theme for this term was 'Woodland Animal Homes', which included searching for clues and signs of animal homes, creating animal homes and making good use of the binoculars. At one session, the children found a badger sett underneath a beautiful Rhododendron bush, and at another they tracked rabbit droppings from the front lawn of the Polesden Lacey House, along to the Roman Bath lawn and then into the Sunken Garden area. Very conveniently a blackbird set up her nest in the outdoor coat area at Bus Stop, so the children had to be very quiet and careful when walking past to not disturb her and her eggs. The teachers were able to set up a birdcam which gave everyone a wonderful and fascinating insight into the blackbird's activities.

Bus Stop took part in Village Day on the 16th June 2018, which was a fantastic day for the



children, parents, and staff. The day started with a parade down the high street, which then ends at the Old Barn Hall.

As part of the the 'Healthy Eating' theme, Bus Stop turned the mud kitchen into a greengrocer's shop. The children collected natural materials from around the garden to display as their different fruits and vegetables. They found lots of tiny apples that had fallen off the tree, large chunks of bark for potatoes, and different size sticks for cucumbers, carrots and bananas. There has been some great mark making happening in the outdoor creative area, as the children made labels and signs for their shop and have been taking turns as shopkeepers and customers.

The last few weeks of the term have been spent preparing the older children for school, so there has been lots of role playing, school visits, and talking about how children are feeling using books and the feeling puppets. The last day of term was Sports Day, which saw lots of practising in preparation by children AND parents alike!

The Arts Society Bookham





Across the world members have been celebrating the golden jubilee of the National Association of Decorative & Fine Arts, the highlight being a Service of Celebration at Westminster Abbey on Wednesday 16th May 2018, attended by many of the greats from the creative arts. However, it was in May 1968 that the inaugural meeting took place in the Grand Lecture Theatre of the V&A Museum in London. The embryonic organization flourished on the premise of the thirst for knowledge by those non-academics wishing to understand and expand their appreciation of the Arts. Patricia Fay was the founder and first Chairman of NADFAS, and it was from her 'Chiltern Antiques Group' that Chiltern DFAS, the first branch of the Society was created.

Our own Bookham DFAS started in 2001 and became No. 329. Now, there are branches throughout the world with well over 90,000



members. Nationally, the Society continues to actively engage in promoting the Arts through Young Arts, Heritage Projects, and Church Recording in which Bookham can be rightly proud of the part it has played locally.

We celebrated with our own Jubilee Lunch in the Old Barn Hall on Wednesday 13th June 2018. Seventy eight places were set for a typical celebratory meal from the 1960s, which would have been very familiar to all NADFAS members of the time. To complement the nostalgic theme background 'musac' was provided by the Top 20 pop records from June 1968. Following lunch, our guest lecturer Linda Smith, gave a superb talk encapsulating the development of modern British art from post WW2 to the present. Was it as grand as the Abbey? Perhaps not. But we really did celebrate!

In April, we visited the Weald and Downland Museum in the picturesque Lavant Valley in West Sussex. The Museum is home to fifty buildings spanning more than 600 years, which have been transported from their original sites across southern England, and reerected in this rural setting. Of particular interest was the dairy from the Eastwick Park estate. Local people will remember the dairy as the dilapidated 'Ice house' at the top of Eastwick Drive. Our guide took us inside the dairy, and explained the painstaking restoration process, which is almost complete. After lunch we travelled to Uppark, sited high on the South Downs. In 1989 the original house was reduced to a ruin by fire, but the National Trust faithfully recreated the original 17th century mansion, and today the interiors illustrate the comfort of life 'upstairs' in



contrast with the 'downstairs' world of the servants.

Angela Stevens as the Heritage Representative for East Surrey is exploring the possibility of recording the library at West Horsley Place. There are in excess of 10,000 books left on the shelves following 7,000 going to Trinity College. All of these need to be recorded and training for the task will be provided by the



Arts Society. If you are interested do please contact her through the Society.

Deeply moved by the stories of those affected by the disaster – in particular that of the Hashim family, all 5 of whom died in the blaze – Year 9 students Ellie Humberstone and Henry Moodie resolved to do something to help.

Both gifted singers, Ellie and Henry decided to host a benefit concert and set about organising the event, which took place on Friday 6 July 2018 at East Horsley Village Hall. Aided by friends from The Howard – Louie Heaton engineering light and sound; Thomas Walker and Oliver Gibson collaborated musically – Ellie and Henry entertained an audience of about 100 (including many Howard students and parents), performing

alongside The Majority (the Major brothers: Isaac, Sam and younger brother from St Lawrence, Luke, plus vocalist Sophie Storey), and another friend from a different school.

Between ticket sales and donations collected on the night, the concert raised an incredible £1965.83 for the Hashim Family Legacy. This charity was set up to help make children's dreams come true by Solidarity Sports, a West London organisation that helps children from disadvantaged backgrounds through educational visits, mentorship programmes, holidays and activities ranging from sports to art to cookery. The three Hashim family children were all involved in the initiative.

Ellie and Henry were invited to a picnic which took place on Saturday 14 July 2018 in London, where Solidarity Sport offered the chance for those impacted by the tragedy to get together and support each other, play games and share food so that no child or parent is left alone when trying to come to terms with the fire. Ellie and Henry felt very moved to meet those who attended and proud to have supported the charity doing so much great work.




Butterfly Corner


