

Editorial

It is unnecessary to relate the events which led to the present hostilities, and this publication is not concerned with such historical facts which have been published in the Government Blue Book. It is for us to carry on the "Bookhams Bulletin" under the direction of the Social Service Bureau, and thanks to our local traders we are able to carry on. It shall endeavour to continue to provide our village community with such information and advice on matters which affect them under present conditions.

In another column will be found details of the Citizens Advice Bureau. This in no way detracts from the work of the Social Service Bureau, on the contrary it is an extension of service to the general public.

It has been our policy to bring forward from time to time items of national importance to the notice of our readers, and we feel that there is a greater necessity for this now. Apart from the Military Service and Civil Defence Acts, the two most important Acts of Parliament are the Rent Restrictions and the Courts Emergency Powers Acts. In view of the limited space at our disposal a full survey cannot be given, but a resume of the Rent Act is given in the next column.

Rent & Mortgate Interest Restrictions Act, 1939

During the war a landlord cannot levy distress for rent, turn tenant out, or enforce any other remedy against a tenant without leave of the County Court, which has power to refuse leave or reduce payments in the case of need. This applies to numerous soldiers and sailors wives who have applied to the Citizens Advice Bureau asking what the position is owing to inability to pay full rent out of Army allowances. In such cases the tenant should make the best offer they can to the landlord and, if he takes proceedings, should fully explain the position to the Court and ask for relief. It should be noted that this Act only applies to dwelling-houses the rateable value of which does not exceed $\pounds 75$, or $\pounds 100$ in the case of the Metropolitan Area.



Citizens Advice Bureau

Soon after hostilities broke out a new organisation known as the Citizens Advice Bureau came into being and it was thought necessary to form a Committee in the Bookham Ward. The purpose is to advise and give information upon matters affecting those in doubt during the war, and although this Committee has only been in operation for under three months, much valuable work has been done, particularly regarding cases of distress directly due to war. So far the two most important matters with which they have had to deal have been questions of Allotments for the wives and dependents of men in the armed services, and the passing on of cases of distress to the appropriate authority. In these matters the Bureau has been very successful. A mass of information on most subjects is available for all, and it can safely be said that the Bookham Citizens Advice Bureau can give practical advice on nearly all subjects.

As examples the following may be quoted : the procuring of financial assistance pending the payment of allowances by the Army authorities; obtaining an evacuees pension under the Widows, Orphans & Old Age Pensions Act; re-habilitation of a blind person from one local authority to another; Registration, Rationing, etc.



Bravo, Bookhams!

As one of the billeting officers it has been my good fortune to get a view of the working of the evacuation scheme locally. This scheme which was fathered by the L.C.C. was an entirely novel experiment, and the anticipation that the reception areas would assist generously in the work has been fully realised, especially in the Bookhams. Evidence of this can be seen in the letters published in the November issue of the Parish Magazine.

I watched the children arrive on September 1st and 2nd, and at once saw that certain fears expressed in the press regarding the children were unfounded. Possibly we are lucky in this respect. Difficulties which arose are gradually being smoothed over, and one vexatious matter was that of parents who held the view that their children could be taken away and returned to the reception area whenever suitable to them, but firm action on the part of the Evacuation Committee has practically cleared this up. Another point was the finding in the reception areas of homes similar to their own; this was impossible and the result is that some of the youngsters are better off whilst others are not so well placed: but to make up for any discrepancy in this respect is the fact that in every case they received a hearty welcome wherever they were situated.

After the evacuation came the question of the Canteen, and here again the Bookhams rose to the occasion. The Women's Voluntary Service soon got the scheme going, and things are working exceedingly well at the Old Barn Hall.

As readers will observe I have only dealt with the school children evacuees as they formed the greatest portion received, but I may possibly deal with the others in a subsequent issue.

In conclusion, I consider that the Bookhams should be proud of themselves for the following reasons:— (1) the speedy manner in which the evacuees were billeted on their arrival; (2) the good work still carried on unostentatiously by the Evacuation Committee in connection with the registration and visiting of the evacuees; (3) the Women's Voluntary Service for the efficient way in which they are working the canteen; and last but by no means least, the women of Bookham who in order to "do their bit" volunteered to take evacuees but found it too much when the children arrived.— R.A:





Stop that Waste.

For some time we have been told to "Save your waste paper, it is valuable." This advice was acted upon by quite a large number of our more thoughtful citizens.

A few days ago I had occasion to travel to Town between 9 and 10 a.m., and entering the train at Epsom I was surprised to find the seats and floor of the compartment simply littered with the morning's newspapers. What a waste I thought, but reflected that these would eventually be collected by a servant of the railway company for disposal by them as waste paper.

I wonder how many men who go to town each day just skim the news and then discard their daily paper before leaving the train, not giving a thought to those at home who would like to read that newspaper more thoroughly and get the host of information each issue contains. The housewife is more particularly concerned with matters of domestic interest such as maximum prices of commodities which often vary from day to day, and when asked to pay a little more for a certain article asks why, whereas if that discarded morning paper had been taken home she would have had that information. I am well aware that most men usually buy an evening paper, but in a large proportion of cases this meets the same fate as the morning editions, or if not, how much time is given to its perusal in the home?

The object of the foregoing is to draw attention to the fact that it was our intention to publish in this issue a list of maximum prices of the various commodities which have already been fixed, but by the time it is in circulation many alterations will have been made so that it would not be up-to-date. Also to remind our men readers who go to town each day that the wife really likes to see the whole of the morning paper sometimes as well as that single sheet of which she gets a glimpse at the breakfast table (if she is lucky!) After all, how much trouble is it to take your newspaper home, and when finished with it can be put aside for future collection as waste, which small effort on the part of us all would materially help to reduce the rates.---B.

Dont wait to be asked to take up these securities, but-DO IT NOW !


Safety First Hints.

The number of persons killed on the roads in the months of September and October this year reached the enormous total of **2058**, being 71 per cent. higher than in 1939.

Pedestrians were the chief sufferers, and it behoves us all in these times of black-out to watch our steps as never before.

Before crossing a road look right *and* left and satisfy yourself that it is safe to cross. Cross the road as directly as possible, and when stepping off the footpath look towards oncoming traffic. Do not make a sudden dash across the road. Always remember that you can see the oncoming vehicle, but with restricted lighting the driver may not be able to see you.

Above all, don't stand about in the road and especially at corners and difficult crossings such as at the Victoria and the Church,


