EDITORIAL

We hope you will approve our effort to give a more festive touch to the cover of this Christmas Number. For the photograph of snow-covered Little Bookham Church we are indebted to Mr. Stephen Fortescue.

Looking forward to the Coronation next June of our much-loved Queen, it is natural to recall those troubled early years of the reign of the First Elizabeth when the Howards of Effingham were so much to the fore. The manor of Effingham, and that part of the manor of Little Bookham taken from the Abbot of Chertsey at the Dissolution of the Monasteries, were in 1550 granted by Edward VI to William Howard. Four years later he received the title of 1st Baron Howard of Effingham

from Queen Mary for his defence of London in Sir Thomas Wyatt's rebellion.

William Howard was related to two of Henry VIII's ill-fated Queens—Anne Boleyn and Catherine Howard—and was with his wife convicted for "misprision of treason" in that they had concealed the scandalous conduct of Queen Catherine with certain gentlemen of the Court. Yet, miraculously, both he and his wife were pardoned. After the accession of Queen Mary he became Lord High Admiral of England and received the Garter, serving as Lord Chamberlain under Queen Elizabeth I from 1558 to 1572.

It was William's son, Charles, 2nd Baron Howard of Effingham, who led the British Fleet against the Armada in 1588. Disturbed at the dangers which threatened England from within and without at that time, he wrote to the Queen: "For the love of Jesus Christ, Madam, awake thoroughly and see the villainous treasons round about you, against your Majesty and your realm, and draw your forces round about you like a mighty prince to defend you. Truly, Madam, if you do so, there is no cause for fear." In spite of being greatly outnumbered in ships and men, and handi-

capped by the Queen's ill-advised economy in naval expenses, Howard of Effingham won the day. The victory was celebrated by a State procession to a great service of thanksgiving at St. Paul's.

For 250 years after the first Elizabethan age there was little change in the English way of life, either in the Bookhams or elsewhere. But the past century, with its great Industrial Revolution, has been a different story. Now, in this second Elizabethan age, the pace of industrial and social change is quickening. Even agriculture, the oldest and most conservative of our great industries, is being mechanized. Who knows what the new era on whose threshold we stand will have in store? Through the lessons of history we may learn to profit by the experience of our forebears and so adapt ourselves to altered conditions.

Meanwhile, Christmas with its message of hope is almost upon us, a reminder that though times may change the spirit of peace and goodwill remains the only lasting cure for the ills of a troubled world. From the President, Officers and Council of the Bookham Community Association we send hearty good wishes for Christmas and the New Year.

LONDON CHILDHOOD

(We conclude the account, which began in our September issue, of recollections of her childhood in London from a member of the Bookham Community Association.)

In winter time we would walk to the "Id. Bazaar" in the Walworth Road, and my sisters and I would perhaps buy a Dutch doll with stiff wooden limbs and painted hair, or a Dolly Dimple complete with cardboard clothes and hats and handbags. The fun we had with our penny toys! Perhaps the happiness they gave to children may have been a slight compensation for the hours of sweated labour that went into the making of them.

If it was wet we went to the "pictures" in Villiers Street, or to Gatti's, perhaps to see Pearl White in "The Clutching Hand", or dear Mary Pickford. The audience, *not* the sound-reel, made the noise in *those* days! The excitement was intense, for we entered wholeheartedly into the action of the film.

My first experience of the theatre was in the 4d. gallery of the Old Vic; I saw many young actors and actresses there, who afterwards became famous in the West End. We were tightly packed on hard wooden benches, and during the interval the attendant would bawl, "Hot cawfee and sausage rolls." How we enjoyed it all!

As we grew older we would walk with our friends after Sunday evening service to the City of London itself. It was very quiet and clean at such times. The long

shadows of the warehouses lay on the hot pavements, and the little old alleys between the offices beckoned to us. We would seek out the places known to history—Bread Street, Pudding Lane, All Hallows, The Tower and St. Paul's Cathedral. There is no place like London, especially in her quieter moods.

We all tend rather to look back longingly on "the good old days," but I realize, of course, that many things are better now than they were. We do not see the drunken men and women about the streets, driven to the public houses by the misery of overcrowded homes.

These are some of my happier recollections, but "the good old days" had their seamy side as well. One is thankful that we no longer see the women, with patient resigned faces, lining up at the pawnshop each Monday morning; or the scores of homeless people on the Embankment and underneath the arches of Waterloo Bridge.

Yes, they were good old days for me, but not for everyone; and although I enjoyed my London childhood, many others unfortunately did not. D.S.

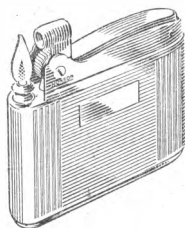
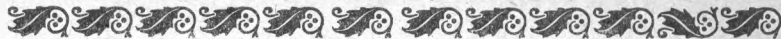

CELEBRATIONS**

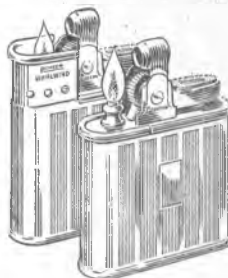
The following report on behalf of the Coronation Celebrations Committee has been received from Mr. L. W. Denning, of 48 Middlemead Road, Great Bookham:—

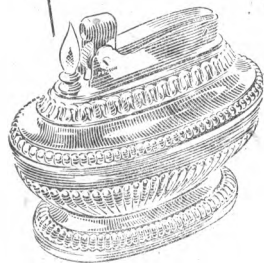

20 was then formed, with Mr. Kille as Chairman and Mrs. Carter as Hon. Secretary. This Committee has since met, and from it an Organizing Committee was formed, which will consider all the suggestions put forward concerning the form of the celebrations. The day appointed for the celebrations is Wednesday, 3rd June, 1953, and the focal point will be "Service". It is to this end that all organizations are asked to participate. The Council are to make a grant (drawn from a special rate) towards the expenses and a sum of £150 has been mentioned. A house-to-house canvass will be made to determine the number of children to be catered for, and it is hoped that all will take the opportunity of making a donation towards the Committee's work. Everyone in Bookham will, it is hoped, render the utmost assistance in making this day one to be remembered."

It is understood that teas are to be provided for all children at the celebrations, and that the old people of Bookham are to be entertained to tea and a film of the Coronation (if this is available in time). Mr. Hewitt has been elected Vice-Chairman of the main Committee, and the following form the Organizing Committee: Mrs. Blair, Miss Hazlett, and Messrs. Denning, Drew, Hewitt, Oldershaw and Smith.

A meeting of the main Committee has been arranged for the 7th November, a report of which, together with the programme arranged for Coronation Day, will appear in the March, 1953, issue of the *Bulletin*.

SPORTS NEWS

Bookham Cricket Club

1953 was only a moderately successful season for the Cricket Club, purely from a playing point of view. Of 36 matches finished, only 12 were won, against 19 losses and 5 draws. The chief trouble was a falling-off in the bowling, combined with fielding that dropped below even the indifferent standard of 1951. The batting, however, was more solid, apart from three shocking collapses, than in either of the two preceding seasons.

The bowling record for the season was dismal, at least after the successes of 1948-51. Jack Fowler topped the averages by a huge margin, but his 22 wickets were taken in only 5 matches. Ted Ayres was again in form with 58 wickets and an average of 7.48, and it is doubtful if he has ever bowled better, but he had little support. This must have been Sid Rollinson's worst-ever season with the ball. The worth to the club of his steady accuracy and stamina is not always to be measured in figures, and his 18 overs for 60 runs on the B.B.C.'s Motspur Park "featherbed" against the West Indians Clarke and Eytley bordered on the heroic, but too often he lacked hostility. Len Saunders began the season promisingly, but Motspur Park seemed to have a damaging effect on his confidence, whilst his father had the opposite experience of increasing success towards the end of the season. Bert Davis made only occasional appearances, but showed when he did play that he can still tease the best batsmen.

Ken Paterson and Lester Hall had little success, though the latter suffered much from ill-luck, and the unexpected success of the season was undoubtedly Len Denning. In match after match he tossed up his slows, inviting the batsmen to hit them—and 33 of them fell through imagining that they could hit this stuff. Only Ted Ayres and Sid Rollinson took more wickets; only Ted and Jack Fowler returned a better average; only Jack came anywhere near his balls-per-wicket average. "Denning's not a bowler," they say. Perhaps: but 33 batsmen retired wondering what kind of a bowler he really is!

The batting shows a much better picture. Rex Lovegrove, Ted Ayres and Bob Stevenson were as successful as ever, and Les Bowdler, Bert Saunders and Ken Bleach were but little behind them. Colin Murrells and Len Saunders both showed a notable advance; unfortunately Len has now begun his National Service. The arrival of Ken Paterson, most powerful of drivers and Bookham's most consistent bat, and the return of Don Durban, were distinct gains. Of the juniors, Alan Smith improved markedly, Bert Holland had a highly successful first season, Paul Mitchell set himself to learn batting with an almost scholarly patience that was clearly producing results, and Brian Longhurst seems likely to add yet another successful name to the roll of Bookham cricketing Longhursts.

Dave Chandler and Les Bowdler saw to it that the wicket-keeping standard remained reas-

onably high, but the rest of the fielding earned few medals. Ken Paterson (before the injury that put him out of cricket in August), Don Durban and Ken Bleach were always reliable, Ted Ayres let little go by him, and Paul Mitchell improved steadily during the season until by its end he could be called one of the club's best—but the number of dropped catches is a miserable story, of which one may hope there will be no repetition in 1953. Your correspondent, when he played, was as bad an offender as any.

A HALLOWEEN CONCERT

Gladys Dover, as Lady Grenville, was the outstanding artiste of an excellent caste which kept the audience quietly chuckling at quips that, if in the true character of the Elizabethan age, were perhaps rather strong meat for a parish church concert! Joan M. Ball is to be congratulated on her production of this amusing "Elizabethan Improbability".
