It had been a while since the Market had been able to display any woodcraft for sale so it was a pleasure to welcome Mike Easton as a new producer back in March. Mike, an engineer by trade, spent his working life designing water pipe, heating, air-conditioning and alarm systems

After retirement he became a volunteer at Norbury Park Sawmill where he produces picnic tables, benches and signposts, mainly from oak, to use around the park, in schools and for the National Trust. Mike's wife is a keen

National Trust and gardens visitor so he thought a home based hobby for himself perhaps based around his love of wood would be a good idea. Mike attended a wood turners' course in Axminster where the required machinery is made and invested in! Bowls of all sizes were created, along with platters, candleholders, rolling pins and dog bones. The latter are made from beech, an especially hard wood, which doesn't splinter. It is a time consuming process, which involves turning, sanding with five grades of sandpaper, sealing and finally polishing with a food safe polish.

His work includes the use of pyrography or pokerwork, which is a method of decoration where the pattern is applied by burning with a soldering iron, useful for plant labels, house signs and adding the type of wood and date to bowls. There were enough bowls for home use so Mike thought it would be a good idea to sell his creations at the Market, donating profits to the RNLI and the Air Ambulance. When last we met he was busy discussing creating a candleholder with a customer who had an interesting piece of wood for processing.



Meet the Makers - Tina Pedrick

Tina began making lace in 1992 with the help of members of Mole Valley Lacemakers who lent her a pillow and bobbins, and a member gave her individual lessons to teach her the basics of lacemaking. This interest was sparked after Tina visited the Stitch Show at Islington Business centre and the 'having a go pillow' on the Lace Guild Stand. Understanding the principles of Torchon lace, Tina began attending twice yearly, two-day workshops at Mole Valley Lacemakers, then in Leatherhead, with lace teachers Kate Riley, Kath King, and many others. It was at this time that Tina had realised her love for Bedfordshire lace and whilst on these workshops, had heard about Bradwell Abbey (Milton Keynes) and began attending those workshops with Kath to extend her Bedfordshire lace, and completed a raised and rolled Lace Collar. She was then tempted to have a go at Honiton lace and during a weekend with Christine Hawkens, Tina discovered a summer school at York - five days of lacemaking, this was heaven!

Over the years of attending the summer school, Tina challenged herself to make a raised and rolled Honiton lace fan, which took 10 years of summer light to complete, whilst doing many other lace projects. Tina fed her appetite for different laces by attending weekend workshops at Battle with Sandra Langworthy (Milanese), one-day workshops with Pat Perryman (Honiton) and Patricia Read (Milanese) at Mayford lace makers, and a twoday workshop with Ingrid de Court at Knuston Hall (Russian). Along the way, she also attended St Ives, Knuston Hall, and Dillington workshops with Patricia Bury, where over 15 years Tina was able to extend her knowledge of the above laces. During that time learning Idrija, Chrysanthemum, and Russian, and finally went on to Flanders and Binche laces.

In the last couple of years, Tina has participated in workshops with Clare Allen for Hinojosa and been lucky to attend workshops with Anne-Marie Verbeke-Billiet of Brugge in Leatherhead and Swindon, further developing her knowledge of Continental laces, in Rosaline Perle, and Duchesse/Withof. Tina is currently working on a mask in Duchesse, with Anne Marie, whilst completing a Russian lace shawl collar and Binche table runner edging of spring flowers. Tina started her teaching experience in a small way by helping others at meetings and giving the odd weekend workshop at Mole Valley lacemakers. Helping beginners to get started in the same manner in which she began making lace, which was to always learn the techniques of each lace type, from the basics. She now has two small groups that she teaches, and a class of twelve at Addlestone, both of which are on a monthly basis.

Tina would now like to spread her wings to help keep the craft alive and give something back to the lace making family by holding more workshops and classes for both experienced that would like to learn more, and anyone thinking about taking up lace as a hobby. Advice from Bookham and Fetcham Gardeners Association

The Association has a shop situated on Eastwick Allotments. The entrance is in Keswick Road. We are always looking for new members who, for a subscription of just £3pa, can purchase most of their everyday garden sundries and seeds at 50% discount on normal catalogue prices. We are open every Sunday morning between 10am and noon. If you have a garden and like to save money then you should definitely come and see us next Sunday!

We also have members who have the experience necessary to give good gardening advice Such as for anyone who hates grubs in their apples and plums:

Plums

Plum moth is to blame. After egg laying in May/June caterpillars hatch and crawl into the fruit via the stalk. They grow up to 12mm in length inside the plum and can be identified easily by their pale pink body and brown head. Cut open an infected fruit and you will find the caterpillar and brown excrement next to the stone where it has been feeding. Infected fruit is unfit to eat. When fully fed they emerge and overwinter inside silk cocoons under loose bark and other concealed places.

Apples

Codling moth is the culprit here. Adult moth emerges and lays eggs near developing fruit. After hatching the small white, brown-headed caterpillar bores into the fruit and feeds in the core region for about 4 weeks. When fully grown it emerges from the fruit and often its exit hole can clearly be seen. It then overwinters in leaf litter or loose bark and pupates in the spring to start a new cycle.

Control

Surprisingly, controlling these pests is similar and starts with a pheromone trap which are open-ended boxes shaped like small houses and a sticky card which fits neatly inside and a pheromone pellet is placed in the middle. It is hung in the middle of the tree and the pellet emits a synthetic pheromone smell like that produced by female moths. The male moths enter the box and are trapped by the sticky substance inside. When there is a heavy infestation spray the tree using Provado Ultra Fruit and Vegetable Bug Killer or Westland Resolva Bug Killer. Spraying should not be later than the third week of June, followed by a second spraying three weeks later.

Other tips

Ensure all windfalls are removed from under the tree as soon as possible and taken off site. Cover the ground under the tree with mypex to stop the caterpillars burrowing into the soil. Remove all leaves and debris, effectively removing all hiding places for overwintering embryos. Use grease bands on the trees to stop crawlers and apply a winter wash application paying particular attention to the main trunk of the tree which will harbour overwintering pests.

Finally

In 2017 I lost 95% of my plums with plum moth as I relied totally on the pheromone traps and did not spray. I estimate that at least 50% of apples had codling moth. This year I followed the advice given above and I have lost less than 5% of the plums and have no codling moth damage in my apples. 

Bookham Rifle Club

Target Shooting: Brain food without the calories!

The sky is the limit for target shooting at Bookham Rifle Club, which is based off Thorncroft Drive in Leatherhead. Target Shooting is an Olympic and a Paralympic discipline - but is also accessible to people with a wide range of abilities. We are very proud of the fact that we have a number of people who shoot for Great Britain. Lina Jones, Britain's Ladies 50m champion took part in the 2018 Commonwealth Games in Australia and James Miller (aged 18) represented GB at the Youth Olympics in Argentina in Air Pistol.

Shooting is the sporting activity in the UK with the second most active participants - after fishing. Club Members participate in a wide range international, national, county and club competitions - many of which are scored by handicap so everyone who enters has a chance of winning. For people who like sport but aren't necessarily interested in being a

member of a team, it's something that can be done as in individual just as much as in team competitions

In recent research carried out by Dr Jean Coleman, a psychologist at Ellesmere College, indicates that shooting, through discipline and concentration, has significant benefits for the brain being comparable to mindfulness practice. Many parents have commented on the way that their children can focus and apply themselves much better due to self-discipline and concentration that is practiced in shooting.

The Club has ranges from 20yrds to 100yrds, and modern indoor air ranges. We welcome visitors to come and see for themselves. To help the complete beginner we provide coaching in shooting technique and safety which is available, free of charge, in all disciplines. Further details of our activities and an application form are available on the Club website - www.bookhamrifleclub.org.uk

Shooting does not need a high level of physical strength, some disciplines are shot from a rest or support, and you can also shoot from a wheelchair. Our facilities are accessible and the Club has been accepted as a member of British Shooting's Disability Hub Club scheme. The Club has worked with the Leatherhead based charity Dyscover, which supports people with the communication disability aphasia, many of whom have suffered strokes. Several Dyscover members now compete in County competitions at the Club

The Club also hosts weekly term time sessions run by the Target Shooting School which provides Air Rifle and Air Pistol shooting for young people aged 7-9 and 10 to 18 - for further details see www.targetshootingschool.co.uk The August Summer Course for juniors is from 5 to 9 August. 
younger WIs in the village.

Orangutan Appeal UK

TIGER'S FOREVER HOME



Sue Sherwood lives in Effingham but regularly travels to Borneo to visit Sepilok Rescue Centre in Sabah as Founder/Chairlady of the Orangutan Appeal UK which has raised over £3million for the Centre over the past 18 years. Here she shares with us the heart-warming tale of Tiger

Tiger was rescued from the banks of the Kinabatangan River after becoming separated from his mother during a skirmish with plantation workers who were trying to stop them eating the palms. The plantation manager realised that such a young infant would die unless he was cared for, so he took him to Sepilok Rescue Centre which was two hours' drive away.

After a couple of years at the centre Tiger was transferred to a local reserve which had a small sanctuary so he could practice his climbing skills in the surrounding forest. Unfortunately his luck was out again when a band of men broke into the reserve one night and stabbed him and his two friends, injuring him badly. The alarm was immediately raised by the guards and Tiger was rushed back to the vets

at Sepilok to be treated. Tiger had been traumatised by this experience and his recovery was very slow and it took nearly two years for him to recover and return to full health

Tiger was approaching his teenage years when he was released into the Kabili forest reserve which surrounds Sepilok Rehabililation Centre. He settled in well but after several months he had a fight with a dominant male who was visiting the reserve looking for a girlfriend. Tiger was no match for the wild male and sustained some painful injuries and again returned to the clinic where he stayed for over a year being closely monitored.

Once recovered, he needed the chance of freedom once more and a joint effort was made by Sabah Wildlife Department and UK Appeal to release him into the Tabin reserve some 4.5 hours drive from Sepilok. All went smoothly and the Team prepared to track Tiger for the next few weeks to ensure he was able to find his own food, make his own nest and travel freely through the canopy. Tiger lived happily in Tabin Reserve for several months and reported sightings confirmed that he had found a lady friend!

Then, much to Sepilok's amazement, a plantation owner contacted the Centre asking the Rangers to come and remove a large male who he had caught trying to steal a worker's motorbike! The team recognised the male as Tiger. The rangers immediately set off to return him to Sepilok where he was found to have a severe chest infection which needed urgent treatment. So once again Tiger was a resident at Sepilok for some months until he fully recovered.

By now Tiger had matured into a fully fledged adult male so it was important to find a home for him far from civilisation where he could breed and contribute to the critically endangered species. Dr Sen Nathan, Sabah Wildlife Department's Chief Vet and Deputy Director discussed the situation with Sue and it was decided to repeat the successful relocations which Dr Sen and Sue had performed by helicopter back in 2004 and fly Tiger to the most remote area of Tabin by the mud volcano. There are no roads to this area, so we knew he was unlikely to have any human contact but the area has a good wild orangutan population and plenty of fruit for him to eat.

In November 2018, Tiger was once again prepared for his journey by road to Tabin and then transferred by helicopter to the mud volcano. The Team stood back to give Tiger as much space as possible and the door to his travelling compartment was opened. Tiger didn't hesitate. He climbed a nearby tree and started to move deeper into the forest only hesitating for a look over his shoulder as if to say "thank you"! After a shaky start, Tiger's confidence began to grow and soon he could be seen moving freely through the forest. He began to make "long calls" which could be heard across the forest for several miles and tells rival males and interested females that he was here to stay in his FOREVER HOME! Enjoy your forever home Tiger. You definitely

Great Bookham Belles WI had a double celebration at their October 2018 meeting; we turned 4 and in doing so welcomed guest speaker Deborah James of @BowelBabe Fame who talked about her journey with bowel cancer.

One could be forgiven for thinking that this would not be a celebratory talk, however not

so with Deborah! A Deputy Headteacher and mother of 2, she was 35 when she first discovered she had bowel cancer and from that moment on her life changed considerably. From regular normality to uncertainty (it took various attempts to get the right diagnosis) to despair, anger and acceptance Deborah explained her rollercoaster journey of 'living it up' with stage 4 bowel cancer.

Deborah spoke of her family and friends, of the new friends she had met through having cancer and of those she had tragically lost to the disease. She explained that with their support she decided to live life to the full and is determined to spread the word in a 'fun way', to men and women, about a subject that no one wants to speak about, but should. She joked to us that, in an unlikely way, this path has led her to experience a variety of undertakings and lead a more varied life to the one she might otherwise had; with her cancer diagnosis came a career as a Sun Columnist

and the birth of her Bowel Babe cartoon, a BBC radio 5 Live Podcast presenter, a fundraiser, a blogger, an interviewee on news programmes and in magazines and an author!

There was not one Belle who was not touched by this inspirational woman who spoke so candidly of her feelings. Her optimism was infectious and gave hope to us all and, especially to those in our audience that have been touched by cancer. Leatherhead and District Local History Society



Considering dates are so important to it, history itself is timeless. One generation's memories simply become records to the next. So it is fitting that the L&DLHS entered its 73rd year with the

Leatherhead Museum - which it owns and operates - about to undergo renewal and the monthly lecture programme at the Letherhead Institute continuing both to entertain and educate those interested in the past.

This spring will hear Emma Corke speaking on Worms, Ashes and Bones: from Darwin to Today at Abinger on Friday, 12 April, a week earlier than usual to avoid clashing with Good Friday.

Our AGM is on Friday 15 March. The short talk

afterwards by our Chairman John Rowley and Pat Jenkins will cover the story behind their new book Memories of Ashtead, based on interviews with surviving residents who recall childhood there during WW2. They included the TV personality Bamber Gascoigne who has written the book's foreword.

In February Colin Jones, a former BBC film editor, chairman of Sanderstead Horticultural Society and a Chelsea Flower Show gold medalist, discussed the Secret Gardens of London, describing the capital as the world's greenest city with hundreds of public parks and gardens, flower markets and the botanic collection at Kew.

In January Tony Matthews told the tale of the two historic families that once owned Cherkely Court outside Leatherhead, the huge country estate that is now the Beaverbrook hotel, golf course and restaurant complex. The contrast



could not have been greater between the greatly loved and philanthropic Dixons and their successors, the widely disliked media magnate Lord Beaverbrook and his family.

In December the Society's Christmas Miscellany included two short talks on Ada Lovelace (1815-1852), the world's first computer programmer who lived at East Horsley and was the daughter of the poet Lord Byron (1788-1824), and Barton's Bookshop in Bridge Street, Leatherhead. The recorded voice of owner Peter Snell, also the town's local Father Christmas, was heard explaining all.

The monthly talks - usually on the third Friday of the month - start at 8pm with coffee served from 7.30pm. Entrance is just £2.The Museum at Hampton Cottage in Church Street reopens this spring after refurbishment. For more information on the L&DLHS go to www.leatherheadhistory.org.






