#### **EDITORIAL**

The new year has come and gone but, as this is our first Bulletin issue in 1972, we take the opportunity to wish all our readers the happiness which comes from good friends, good neighbours, pleasant surroundings and the availability of many interesting activities, classes and clubs.

We live in a district where parents with young families seem to be in the majority and we would wish for them the closest links with schools and teachers to ensure that, in a period of rapidly changing ideas and systems in education, they shall be confident that the maximum potential of their children is realized.

Our wish for our young people is more opportunities for outdoor as well as indoor enjoyment but we would venture to add, at the risk of appearing square, the suggestion that self indulgence may not always bring as much personal satisfaction as giving pleasure to others.

To the growing number of our retired menfolk we express the hope that the vigour and energy they have brought into local activities will keep them healthy and stimulated for many years to come.

Finally, to the old people resident among us we offer our congratulations on the interest they show in the affairs of the neighbourhood and hope that they will continue to feel an important part of a caring community.

1972 may well be a crucial year for all of us. Change is in the air. Local government reorganisation and the reorganisation of the National Health and Hospitals service could radically change the democratic structure to which we have become accustomed. The

argument put forward in high places for the new proposals is that management efficiency and cost-effectiveness should be our main goal. Not all of us, however, are convinced that to be bigger is to be better, or even cheaper. Along with this goes a growing disillusionment, especially among young people, with politics and a consequent proliferation of pressure groups. It would be a brave man who would assert that these last are the answer to the malaise of our times. Most people, however, would admit that a basic of a healthy society is that the individual must feel that he has some share in moulding his environment. Opinions differ as to how this can be achieved, or even whether the majority of people consciously want it.

It is our own personal belief that now. more than ever before, ordinary people must insist that they are the recipients of the public services and they only can judge their quality. It is important, therefore, that we continue to give active support to those organisations which can speak jointly for us-residents associations, community associations, womens institutes, towns-

women's guilds and the like.

Her elder son, Patrick, is married and in Dublin where he holds an executive position with the Electricity Board. Her younger son, Dennis, is teaching in a Junior School in Tower Hamlets. Fortunately he can be home at weekends.

#### BOOKHAM BREVITIES

In Memoriam. Mr. Bowen has donated £25 to the Barn Hall Building Fund in memory of his late wife, Mrs L. Bowen, who gave 46 years of voluntary service to Bookham. She was closely identified with the Barn Hall before it became a community centre. During the War and after she administered it on behalf of the L.U.D.C. Without her care it might well have collapsed. As an officer of the W.V.S. she received there the refugees who came down from London, provided meals for many of the children, and helped to entertain the Canadian soldiers stationed in the village.

Mrs J. Ransom has also contributed in memory of her husband. Before his death they lived next door to Mr and Mrs Oldershaw who stimulated their interest in the Barn Hall. When blindness afflicted Mr Ransom he courageously carried on with his crafts, especially basketry and picture framing, and

exhibited at our early Village Days.

Bookham Fifty Years ago is vividly presented in the excellent pamphlet 'The Gigantic Fete, Bazaar and Country Fair. 1922' written by Mr S. E. D. Fortescue. This is a good buy at the modest sum of 25p. The illustrations alone are worth this price, and the proceeds are to be donated to the fund for the repair of the tower of St. Nicolas Church. It is difficult to believe that the target figure of £1,000 was exceeded by over £133 in a village that was tiny by modern standards. Perhaps the biggest attraction was a visit to the Fair by the Duke of York, then aged 26, who was one of a house party at the home of the Hon. Mrs Greville, at Polesden Lacey.

The account tells how Mr P. G. H. Fender, captain of the victorious Surrey Cricket Eleven, was in charge of the coconut shies and was a great draw. A Bookham resident who meets Mr Fender from time to time reports that he is alive and well and intends to present him with a copy of the pamphlet when he again sees him.

Congratulations to Mr Fortescue on a work well done and worth doing.

Old Bookhamites Leave their home in East St. and move to a caravan near Orpington. They are Mr and Mrs David Pullen, whose father and mother, also, were well known and respected in the village. They will be missed because they have both participated fully in village life. David will continue his work as a night telephone operator. Opportunities will be available to them to carry on their leisure interests. They are both keen naturalists; they are surrounded with open land where they can study not only the flora and fauna but will find new specimens of bird and insect life of which they have an encyclopedic knowledge.

A Musician of Promise Remains in Bookham. We are glad that their son, John Pullen, has decided to remain in Bookham. He and his wife live in Strathcona Avenue. Many of us remember the delightful evening he arranged in the Barn Hall with the Nonsuch Ensemble during our Festival Fortnight; the large audience which packed the Hall for Bookham Choral Society's 1970 Christmas Concert heard him play the Oboe Concerto by Pergolesi, arranged by Barbirolli.



#### FEAT FROM FEET Recollections of The Walk, March 28th, 1971

As this was the first, and will probably be the last of a combined Bookham Walk, we thought our readers would wish us to record it. For the sake of brevity many items must be omitted but not our thanks to all those who walked and those who sponsored.

It was inspired and directed by Councillor S. J. Taylor, Chairman of the L.U.D.C., Sponsor of the Barn Hall Appeal. It raised £1,200. There were 214 walkers. 168 completed the 20 mile course which took a circuitous course over Bookham Common to Effingham Junction, through fields and over some awkward stiles to Bookham Grange, uphill to Ranmore Common and over the Downs to Boxhill and Westhumble, back to Norbury Park Farm, thence to Leatherhead Football Ground, along Cock Lane and other residential roads including The Park, home to the Barn Hall where it all started at 7.30 a.m. and where Ken Barrington was waiting from midday until 6 p.m. to sign the coveted certificates.

The oldest walker was Mrs White, of Fairfield Cottages, who easily made her 6 mile target. The youngest to complete the full course were the Churcher twins, 8 years old Isabel and Sarah, as well as 8 year old Susie Taylor who beat them on timing and

got back at 2.30 p.m.

First to arrive back at the Hall were the sprinters, Roger Goldsmith and Tony Hulme, who finished in 4 hours. Mary Austin, whose sprint was cut short by cramp, arrived a close third which cheered those of us who remembered that she was the youngest founder member many years ago of the Community Association.
