

EDITORIAL

The current issue of The Bulletin contains more appeals than usual. We make no apologies for this. Most people like to think that they live in a neighbourhood which has character. The touchstone of the vitality of a district is the strength of its voluntary organisations; and Bookham has, undoubtedly, a multiplicity of groups catering for different community needs. It has, too, a good cross-section of individuals willing to give public service.

If, however, the situation is analysed more closely, it will be found that the willing horses are pulling too-many loads. Can we spread the burden a little more evenly? If you read through these pages you will surely find a cause, or an activity, which you Addresses of could support. secretaries are in the Directory, and the Editors of the Bulletin will gladly help with information. Everybody has something they can give, whether it be time, money, or interest.

HISTORY OF THE BARN HALL

The history of the site and building now known as the Barn Hall is necessarily for the most part that of Sole Farm, to which it belonged until 1906. The Little Guide to Surrey (1910) mentioned that "a fine old 15th century barn, grandly timbered, has recently been turned into a village hall," while Black's Guide to Surrey (1916) states that in the village "is a grand old barn, now used as a Village Institute."

The name Sole is derived from an Anglo-Saxon word sol meaning a muddy pool, and this pond still existed in front of what is now the Barn Hall until 50 years ago, when it was filled in as part of the alterations then carried out. The first mention of Sole in Bookham occurs in 1294, when Thomas atte Sole was living there. A generation later the manorial tenant was John atte Sole, who surrendered the messuage and half a yardland (about 15 acres) to the use of his son, Thomas, in 1337. In 1342, Thomas died, leaving a widow, Alice, and a son, John, who was under 20 years old: John was still in possession in 1347. After this documents are missing and all we know for certain is that Walter Rogers held the farm in 1548 and surrendered it in 1557 to John Rogers, his younger son.

Sole Farm descended in the Rogers family through the 17th century, but in the 18th was bought by the Earls of Effingham, lords of the Manor, and let to tenants. At the end of the 18th century, it was being farmed by John Bennett, and from 1803 to 1812 by Richard Ellis. The freehold passed with the Manor to James Laurell in 1801 and to G. Holme Sumner in 1812. In 1823 it was sold at auction to a Mr. Bolland, being described in the Sale Particulars as a "substantial Brick and Tiled Farm House in good condition, Garden, large Farm Yard, capital Barns, Stables, Cart Lodges and other Farm Buildings." Before 1836 "the messuage called Sole or Sole Farm" had passed to Joseph Bonsor, Junior, the owner of Polesden, and in 1839 it was being farmed by his tenant, Stephen

Roger at Sole held "a Custumarie Tenemente with a Barne, Stable, Orchard, etc.," while the map shows merely conventional sketches of a house and an outbuilding on the plot. The larger plan made in 1797-98 shows clearly the house and a number of outbuildings, the two largest being one behind the house and the other in the position of the Barn Hall. From the age of the timber-framing, which is probably of the 16th rather than the 15th century, it is reasonably certain that these two buildings are the actual Barn and Stable described in 1614. As to which was which there has been much uncertainty, but it seems probable that the Barn Hall really represents the original Stable, though another old Stable from the farmyard was moved on rollers in 1906 to the site of The Moorings.



Bookham Rifle Club. Shooting is an all the year round sport but, following its Annual General Meeting, the Bookham Rifle Club, with 100 members to its credit, will be entering the summer leagues. The club house is finished and it is now a centre which is the envy of Surrey; there are probably only four or five clubs in the country with better ranges. The club goes back to the old Home Guard days. One of the slowly diminishing "band of brothers" of those days is the President, Mr. Donald G. Cook, who is now in his sixth term of office. Younger members are welcome and the facilities are such that, if they are keen, they can do really well, as is witnessed by the successes of two undertwenties, Miss M. McQue and Mr. R. Gravett.

Eastwick Park Cricket Club. The membership has risen from 166 to 240, of which 67 are playing members. The social side of the Club is lively and there is a continuous programme of dances, parties, etc., which gives good value for the non-playing mem-

They start on serious training for the Leatherhead and District Annual Sports Day in June, when they hope to retain the Relay Trophy they have held for two years. They will, also, enter the Surrey Boys' Club Championships at Motspur Park in June and intend to pass their previous record. They give much time to swimming instruction, and have a small angling group.

They are pleased to have the Co-op Hall as their temporary home and have worked hard to put it in good order and to re-furbish their equipment. At long last they have a roof under which they can play indoor games. It will not be long before

they have a team in the Table Tennis League.

INTERNATIONAL NEWS

International Language School in Leatherhead District. A Language School with a difference is to be held in Leatherhead from July 15th to August 13th. Thirty young French people have been carefully selected from many applicants to come over to study English and, while doing this, learn something of our way of life. They will be accompanied by a graduate leader and two tutors and will have lectures and excursions during the day. Families in the Leatherhead district will be asked to accommodate a boy or girl-they are between the ages of 15 and 18-and provide them with meals. More importantly, it is hoped that they will be received as members of a typical household and that their stay will be made in every way pleasant and instructive so that, when they leave this country, they will carry away with them a lasting impression of the genuineness of British hospitality and the friendship of British youth. A sum of £7 per week will be paid for board and lodging.

As an experiment in international understanding this is worth supporting and it is anticipated that families, especially those with children or neighbours in a similar age group, will respond well. The official closing date for applications is March 30th, but late applicants may still be considered. The secretary of the Community Association will be pleased to give information.

Worldfriends (which has full consultative status at U.N.E.S.C.O.), in association with the British Association for the Advancement of Science, is sponsoring the School. Since its foundation in 1948 Worldfriends has arranged hundreds of international exchange visits on a group basis, and is well known in this area where a group has been in existence for a long time. Language Schools, as such, is a new development which was started four years ago. They have been quite successful in other areas. Leatherhead has been chosen this

year because of its proximity to London and to beauty spots in Surrey. If all goes well the Schools will be repeated annually. At a Public Meeting held at Red House to launch the scheme Mr. H. Sears was elected chairman and Mr. B. Box secretary of the local group.

The Campaign and the W.I.s. Our two local W.I.s have been helping the National Federation of Women's Institutes in their own ambitious campaigns. In less than a year, roughly half the institutes of the country have collected £42,338, which means that the Karamoja project for a Farm Training Institute in Uganda has been completed, and a surplus of £18,338 is available for the second project of a cooperative store at Radisele, Bechuanaland. So generous has been the response that the National Federation feel that they can participate in two other enterprises. They are the Lady Aberdeen Scholarship Fund to train suitable women from underdeveloped countries, chiefly in Asia, in nutrition, dietetics, etc., and the development of a new University Farm at the Faculty of Agriculture, St. Augustine, Trinidad. The Federation has also agreed to donate 5 per cent of its funds from now on to the United Kingdom Committee to assist in its administrative and publicity expenses.

The Freedom from Hunger Campaign reached its climax with the big national effort in March but, in this area, it will continue for a few more months so that the target of £5,000 for the Leatherhead district may be reached. The objective is, as everybody knows, to bring food to the hungry millions in the undeveloped countries by training them and giving them the equipment to help themselves. Apart from joining in projects sponsored by national organisations, many individuals have participated personally in our own local campaign. The week's bring-and-buy sale in Mould's old shop at Leatherhead raised £570. The austerity lunches, helped by the churches of the area, were well supported. The schools, by imaginative appeals, stimulated the generosity of children and parents.

An Entertainment Week is still to come. The Leatherhead Repertory Theatre has made the theatre available to the locality at the end 'of the season, and during the week beginning May 20th a different entertainment will be put on each night. Admission is by programme obtainable from Mr. J. Smith, 112 Barnett Wood Lane, Ashtead, or from the Bookham representative, Mrs. Parker, 30 The Garstons, who will be pleased to hear from anyone who would like to help this worthy cause.

The Campaign and the Bookham Boys' Club. At the special request of its members, the Bookham Boys' Club is helping in the War on Want. They have adopted a 15-years-old boy from Kenya, Samuel Mwanji manyi, "Sammy," as he is affectionately called, and have undertaken to clothe, feed and educate him for a year. Two shillings a day will do this, which means a penny a day for 24 members. The National Association of Boys' Clubs have arranged this through the "Youth helps Youth" Scheme, and many other clubs are participating.

BOOKHAM BREVITIES

A much-photographed Butterfly is the Red Admiral which fluttered out of the curtains of Mr. Wood's living room at 26 Blackthorne Road on the bleakest Sunday morning of the big freeze. Its picture appeared in a number of newspapers and it looked quite happy and lively. It continued to take an interest in its surroundings during the rest of the day, but we do not know if it has survived its untimely debut.

A Collection of Dressed Dolls is the pride of Mrs. Gant, of Barn Meadow Lane. She has 130 of them, mostly 10 to 12in. high, and we hope to show them on Village Day. Some are in national dress, others in historical costume, and she has clothed them all
