Editorial

Three Christmases of war have not produced any material change in the matter of the usual distribution of parcels, coal and money which have been provided over a period of years by a combination of local charities & organisations, and this opportunity is taken to thank all concerned. Furthermore it is hoped that this little extra has been the means of turning what might of been despondency into a little happiness.

A suggestion has been made that some humour should be introduced into our columns. Such an idea is welcomed and contributions from our readers are invited. This does not mean that the material for the Bulletin is running dryon the contrary, there is so much available that the editor finds it difficult to select that which is the most beneficial and informative for its readers. Again it must be emphasised that the issue of the Bulletin during the war is entirely dependent firstly upon the paper supply, and secondly upon the continued support of local traders by their advertising.

In this issue reference is made to the local Domestic Poultry Keepers' Club. The council for this organisation was appointed in 1939 by the Minister of Agriculture, having twelve regional and sub-area organisers to help and advise poultry keepers all over the country; and although so much publicity has been given to the "Dig for Victory" campaign, very little has been given to the other aspects of food production.

Whilst on the subject of agriculture, a regulation allows aliens to be enrolled in the Women's Land Army providing that consent is obtained from the Ministry of Labour with which they are registered.

Since supplies of certain commodities have been cut off from overseas sources, it is now more than ever necessary to save paper, bones, scrap metal and rubber. Get in touch with the Salvage Officer, Council Offices, Leatherhead, for any information.

Citizens Advice Bureau Leatherhead & District

It is now fully recognised by the general public throughout the Leatherhead Urban area that the Citizens Advice Bureau is an asset of intrinsic value, and whilst the government requests Bureaux all over the country to undertake more and more work, there is no official recognition or remuneration.

Among other matters dealt with by the Bureau is that concerning lost clothing cards, and a full survey was given in the last issue of the *Bulletin*. Owing to changed circumstances in the war situation and the needs of certain classes of persons, Board of Trade regulations are introduced week by week.

Concerning 'margarine coupons' in exchange for certain types of clothing, these became invalid on 31st December last, and further application regarding lost clothing cards can only be replaced by the completion of a Board of Trade form having a 1 - stamp affixed, to be signed over the stamp in the presence of a Justice of the Peace.

It appears to be certain that after the end of the present clothes rationing period there is likelihood of a 15 per cent. reduction in the number of coupons, and as the Bureau is always furnished with advance information, further details will be available at the Bureau, through the Press and the Bulletin.

One important branch of the Bureau's work is that concerning the Old Persons Welfare, and help and advice is given regarding the application for old age pensions, supplementary allowances, medical and surgical treatment, provision of a nurse, filling in applications, and many other matters connected with pensions.

The Bureau is the intermediary between the enquirer and the appropriate bodies concerned, and with constant communication and co-operation the Bureau has attained a very high degree of successful results.

Whatever your problem, be it Dependant & Families Allowances Clothes Rationing, Missing Relatives, Old Age, Widows and Orphans Pensions, War Pensions Personal Injuries Allowances, Prisoners of War, and a host of other matters, bring it along to the Citizens Advice Bureau, now at

25 High Street, Leatherhead Phone Leatherhead 3291. Hours Monday to Friday 10—4.30, Saturdays 10—12.30. If your matter is urgent and you cannot attend during the hours mentioned, an appointment can be arranged.

It is now an offence to dispatch food parcels from this country, but the sending of food to British prisoners of war will continue only through the British Red Cross Society.



Red Cross Postal Messages can now be sent to Sweden, and anyone wishing to avail themselves of this service can do so through the Red Cross Postal Message Bureau 25 High Street, Leatherhead. All messages in Swedish must be accompanied by an English translation.

Enquiries concerning relations and friends in the Far East can be accepted by the Citizens Advice Bureau which is in touch with the Foreign Office & Colonial Office, but it must be understood that some delay will ensue owing to present day conditions.

Although the Postmaster General announced last September that in order to speed up communications with the forces in the Middle East East Africa, Malta, H.M. ships in the Eastern Mediterranean, a new airmail postcard service had been introduced, in view of the number of enquiries this announcement is repeated. The cost of this service is 3d. and airmail postcards can be obtained from any Post Office.

Since the introduction of the National Service Bill No. 2, women are being registered for employment upon vital war work, and whilst very many will not be affected owing to children being the first consideration, this does not wholly relieve them from their

obligations. In many parts of the country provision has been made for day nurseries, and whilst no provision has been made in the Leatherhead Urban area, this can only be achieved by informing the local authority. Inform them that you wish to undertake some form of war work and ask them to provide day nursery facilities for your children.

War Service Grants

Application for a War Service Grant should be made on Form W.S.G. 21 (M.S.A.C.21), which should be completed by the service man or his dependant.

Incomplete information requested upon the form is apt to cause delay, and such information is treated with confidence. When this form is filled up it may be taken to the Citizens Advice Bureau who will forward it to the Assistance Board without delay.

A personal call will be made at the applicant's home address by an officer of the Board who will help to answer any further questions if necessary.

Officers' wives and dependants can also apply for a War Service Grant.

Since the inception of the revised War Service Grant the scheme now includes emergency grants for serious illness or death.

Forms, advice and information can be obtained from the Citizens Advice Bureau, 25 High Street, Leatherhead.

An Open Letter

Ladies & Gentlemen,

There appears to be a false impression regarding certain members of the staff of Leatherhead & District Citizens Advice Bureau in that they are paid. Yet, if such be the case, by whom are they paid?

In order to clear up any misunderstanding in view of a rate increase of 1/16th of a penny in the f, this small amount equivalent to £100 is for the purpose of financing the Citizens Advice Bureau by way of rent, lighting, heating, telephone, office expenses including stationery, and cleaning, and whilst the service rendered by the Bureau is accredited by every enquirer to be of the greatest assistance, and further that some members of the staff contribute between 48 and 70 hours of voluntary service, no payment of any kind is made by the Local Authority or any other body.

I would add, however, that representation has been made to the Council for placing certain members of the Bureau upon a salaried basis, but without result. Whilst realising the need for economy in every direction, such financial assistance would not raise the rates more that one-eighth of a penny in the £.
