VILLAGE FESTIVAL AND VILLAGE DAY

We are writing this report the morning after Village Day and in the middle of the Village Festival—all too conscious that, though we are very happy, we may be a little jaded. As our copy must be posted to the printer tonight, we cannot give as full an account as we would like of what has been a great occasion for Bookham.

The attendance on Village Day was magnificent—in the region of 3,000. The takings were approximately £600. So much was done by so many that it is quite impossible to thank every organisation and individual in these columns. Our own members realize that we know of the weeks of hard slogging that they have put in, and are content to work as a team for the good of the Community Association. It is right, however, that we should publicly acknowledge the contribution made by visiting groups.

First the Morris Men and Folk Dancers who came from all over Surrey, so ably organised by Mrs. D. G. Thomas, of the Bookham Club. Complete with accordions, drum and violin, their colourful procession moved down from the Grove to the

Barn Hall, drawing behind them, like the Pied Piper of Hamelin, all the children within hearing distance. The display they gave in the arena was quite excellent. As a finale the onlookers were drawn in for the concluding dances, and it was a delight to watch the small under-fives and over-fives pirouetting round, their faces gay and proud at the same time, hand in hand with the tall, brightly garbed Morris Men.

Dogs of all shapes and sizes gathered for the Show, arranged by Mrs. Evans of the B.U.A.V.S., who is to be congratulated on sorting them out into the eight appropriate classes.

The playing of the Epsom and Ewell Silver Band was appreciated.

The Exhibition, "Ladder to the Top," illustrating the opportunities in further education, was well up to the high standards of former years. We are grateful to the University of Surrey, Ewell Technical College, Guildford Technical College and the Epsom School of Art for the considerable amount of time and trouble they took over their contributions. We were honoured to have with us Heads of Departments, Vice-Principals and Professors to answer questions and discuss problems with the people

EDUCATION AND YOU

The organisation of education, the school curriculum, teaching methods are all in a transitional stage and many parents are bewildered about the future of their children. Surprisingly few people seem to know to whom they can direct their queries—the following notes may be helpful to them:

The South West Divisional Executive is responsible for all the schools in the Leatherhead district and covers the area stretching out to Farnham and Godalming. The Divisional Education Officer is Mr. E. Instone, O.B.E., Education

Office, North St., Guildford.

The Leatherhead Council has the right to elect 3 representatives to the Executive. They are Mr. E. Hardy, of Ashtead, Mrs. C. M. John, of Leatherhead, and Mr. R. Bishop, of Bookham. They are also entitled to one selected representative, who is Mrs. E. Harrison, of Bookham.

The Surrey County Education Committee is the top tier and there is keen competition among county councillors to serve on this committee.

The Chief Education Officer is Mr. A. W. Baird, County Hall, Kingston.

Each Divisional Education Executive is empowered to send one of its members to serve on the County Education Committee and Mrs. E. Harrison, of Bookham, has been unanimously elected to this office for the third year running.

Bookham School Managers are closely involved in the day-to-day running of our four schools. To these will shortly be added the new infant school on the Howard Road site and a further one in the development plan for which a site is being sought.

The Managers are: Chairman, Mrs. E. Harrison, Vice-Chairman, Rev. J. G. Edwards, Councillor Turville Kille, Councillor A. Brackenbury, Mrs. M. Strand and Mrs. A. Sansom.

Howard of Effingham School Governors. Bookham residents serving on this committee are Councillor A. Brackenbury, Mr. W. E. Larkin, Councillor A. Blundell and Mrs. E. Harrison (Vice-Chairman).

which he had to contend. Shortages of teachers meant that he had to take a number of class subjects himself—and he was a good teacher. The club has been fortunate in enrolling recently a number of ladies who are county demonstrators and most helpful in encouraging the

novices.

"father of the Council" he is respected for his long experience. He is specially interested in the needs of the elderly and represents the L.U.D.C. on the District Old People's Welfare Committee.
