On 2 January 1996 - Miss Winifred Underhay. She moved to Bath several years ago and continued her membership from there. She was also a Life Member of the Friends.

Our sympathy goes to the families and friends of all three members.

New member - Welcome to Mrs Susan Humphreys of Great Bookham. She has also become a Life Member of the Friends of Leatherhead Museum.

1996 SUBSCRIPTIONS

NEWS FROM THE RECORD SECRETARY

Following the death last year of John Lewarne, we received from his daughter, Dr Gillian Sheehan, a large quantity of papers and effects which her father had accumulated over the years. The process of incorporating them into our records continues. Some artefacts have gone to the Museum; a set of SAS Reports is now held under Library auspices; some papers have gone to Ashtead or to Bookham. Much has gone to Leatherhead already, but much remains to be classified. The bulk is held by the Fetcham Archivist, John Mettam.

Septimus Welling - We have previously reported receipt of interesting information and photographs about Septimus Wellings from his Granddaughter, Joan Stedman.

A lively correspondence with Miss Stedman has ensued. The first 20 years of her life were spent in Leatherhead, and she has sent us many old photographs from her album which are being copied or incorporated into the records.

Miss Stedman achieved fame away from Leatherhead. She was a midwife in London during the war; and later worked for some years in Denmark and Norway. This proved to be a stepping stone to the frozen north of Canada. She joined the Grenfell Association and worked for many years as a nurse in South Labrador. In those years, 1952-1961, she was in charge of the nursing station at Nain, the most northerly inhabited town in Labrador. Medical consultations were by radio, land communications by dog-sled. Her letters home of those days form an important record today of the Archivist in Goose Bay.

She has long since lived in very active retirement in the West Country. She has an excellent memory and has provided useful information on Leatherhead between the wars.

Leatherhead Records - Our thanks to Mrs June Robinson for giving us a consolidated list of certain marriages in Leatherhead Parish between 1851 and 1891. The list has been given accession number LW414.

NEWS FROM THE LIBRARY - By Gwen Hoad

"The River Mole or The Emlyn Stream ".....Now the current sweeps Past you old elm, whose swaying branches bound The Mansion's sloping lawns and glides beneath A bridge of many arches, near to which Lived England's famous Ale-wife, in the days Of bluff King Hal, by poets not disclaimed, When "jolly Skelton wore the laurel crown". Here the speckled trout darts swiftly past the shore, Dotted with trees, where Randall's level meads Their emerald verdure peacefully extend."

So wrote Margaret Elizabeth, the daughter of Colonel John Drinkwater Bethune in 1839 in her long poem published and sold in aid of the Fund for Building National Schools at She lived with her father in Thorncroft Manor Leatherhead. for a number of years. This book, as well as the poems of John Skelton and now, thanks to Jack Stuttard, a life of John Skelton, are all available in the Society's Library.

PROGRAMME

All lectures are given in the Dixon Hall of the Leatherhead Institute, on the third Friday of each month, at 7.30pm for 8pm. Entrance 50p members, £1 non-members, including coffee at 7.30pm.

Friday, March 15 - "The Industrial History of Mole Valley" - by Peter Tarplee. Mole Valley district covers about 100 square miles, stretching from Chessington to Gatwick Airport, and from Abinger Hammer to Leigh, and contains a wide variety of past industrial activities.

Friday, April 19 - The AGM, followed by a talk by Dr Derek Renn, CBE, FSA, on "Old Sarum" - an Iron Age hill fort two miles from Salisbury, which has within its defences, 11th and 12th century additions of a castle, cathedral and palace. (No charge for this evening.)

Friday, 17 May - Juniper Hall and the Field Studies Centre - by John Bebbington, Director of Studies

Mr Bebbington will tell us a little about Juniper Hall, and describe the work of the Field Studies Centre there. Since we visited the hall several years ago, a new research laboratory has been established in one of the outbuildings of the Hall.

Hopefully a visit to Juniper Hall can be arranged after this talk.

Some members may remember the Dallaway Lecture John Bebbington gave to us in October 1987 - the day after the Big Storm, when he had been up most of the night dealing with storm damage. His slides of Box Hill flora and fauna were beautiful, especially those of blissfully drunken bees lying on their backs recovering from an intake of too much pollen.

We asked in the last Newsletter if members would let us know what they wanted in the way of visits etc. Two members only answered, and the Programme Sub-Committee have taken note of their suggestions.

Programme Sub-Committee - Over the years the Secretary has gathered a collection of very mixed duties, and the Executive Committee has agreed that she can shed some of them. She is therefore shortly giving up responsibility for the Programme Sub-Committee, and a replacement is urgently needed. Only two actual meetings at most are necessary each year. If anyone is willing to help there is a vacancy on the Executive Committee for a Programme Secretary if he or she would like to join that Committee as well, but if not, finding speakers and arranging visits can be done just as well by someone not on the main Committee.

MINUTES OF THE 48TH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING HELD IN THE DIXON HALL, LEATHERHEAD INSTITUTE, AT 8PM ON FRIDAY, 21 APRIL 1995

Before the business of the meeting, Mr Fortescue thanked the many members who performed the tasks necessary to make the Society so successful: not many Societies were lucky enough to have so much help from their members. He mentioned Norman West, who had served the Society so well and whose sudden death was a great blow to the Committee; and also Ernest Crossland who had been appointed an Honorary Vice-President of the Surrey Archaeological Society - a rare honour kept for those who had done important work in the archaeological world.

- 1. APOLOGIES FOR ABSENCE Received from J G W Lewarne, Mrs I Butler, Mr & Mrs E Barkway, David Ellis, Chris Latham, Mrs G Mackenzie, Mrs J Goldsmith, Mr & Mrs John Read, Mrs G Taylor
- 2. MINUTES OF THE 47TH ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING Already circulated to members and their acceptance was proposed, seconded and agreed.
- 3. MATTERS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES No matters arising.
- 4. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT FOR 1994 Introduced by Mrs Heath, who first expressed the Committee's sadness at the death of Norman West.

Geoff Hayward had moved to Dorset, and David Bruce was shortly moving near Bristol, but both will keep in close touch.

Parish Archivists - New Bookham and Fetcham archivists had become necessary. Thanks to Brian Godfrey for taking over Bookham; to J D Mettam for taking over Fetcham Documents, and to A E Tims, the Fetcham Maps and Photographs.

 ${\bf Press~Officer~-~D~R~Whittington~had~taken~over~the~duties}$ previously performed by Ron Johnson.

Speakers - Other organisations ask the Society for. There is a desperate shortage of members willing to do this, and more volunteers are needed.

The acceptance of the Executive Committee's report was proposed, seconded and carried.

5.PRESENTATION OF THE SOCIETY'S ACCOUNTS FOR 1994 - In the absence of the Treasurer, Mr J R Clube presented the accounts.

The increase in income was due to increased subscriptions, profit from the Mole Valley Festival events, and a surplus on visits. The Balance Sheet showed £1500 received from Esso as a grant for the Ashtead History. Expenses of £200 referred mostly to the work on Ashtead Parish Church.

Insurance - The premium for the year 1995 will be £450 - compared with £234 for 1994. The Committee had considered excluding theft from the Museum, but had decided that theft must be included.

A member asked whether an agent is being used and whether the Treasurer had "shopped around"; also whether the amount of value could be reduced. In the absence of the Treasurer, the questions were not answered: the Committee would consider them at their next meeting.

The acceptance of the Accounts for 1994 was proposed, seconded and agreed.

6. AUDITOR

Mr B Kirkby was willing to continue; his re-appointment was proposed, seconded and agreed. The President expressed the Society's thanks to Mr Kirkby for all his work.

7. MUSEUM TRUSTEES ACCOUNTS FOR YEAR TO 30 SEPTEMBER 1994 Mr J R Bull reported. The Trust's income had depreciated because of low investments rates and money spent on materials. It might be necessary in the future to raise money by public subscription.

He thanked Geoff Hayward and David Bruce for their help whilst they were Trustees.

8. REVIEW OF SUBSCRIPTION FOR 1996 No increase necessary.

9. ELECTION OF COMMITTEE

The remaining members of the Committee were willing to continue in office until the next AGM. Their re-election was proposed seconded and agreed.

Lecture Secretary - (responsible for finding members to speak to other organisations). Mr D R Whittington was willing to stand; his election was proposed, seconded and agreed.

10. ANY OTHER BUSINESS

10.1. Museum Trustees - The Trustees must be appointed by the Society and following the resignations of D Bruce, G Hayward and J Lamden, three new ones were needed.

Mrs J Goldsmith (Museum Curator), A Gordon and A Tuffery were willing to stand. Their appointment was proposed, seconded and agreed.

- 10.2. Stewards for the Museum More volunteers were needed, particularly on Thursday afternoons.
- 10.3. The Well at Hampton Cottage There was no possibility at present of excavating any deeper than the 30 feet reached. The Friends of the Museum had offered to pay £465 for a handmade iron grill to make the well safe for the public. Meantime, a family of wrens had moved in!

There being no further business to discuss, the President thanked members for attending, and closed the meeting.

At the Society's Annual General Meeting on 21 April 1995, three new Museum Trustees were appointed, among them Anthony Tuffery who was unfortunately leaving the district. Another Trustee had therefore to be appointed.

Mr John M Wall had been proposed. He had been associated with work on Hampton Cottage for many years and was one of the regular "diggers" during the excavation of the well.

The meeting unanimously approved the appointment of John M Wall as a Trustee of the Museum.

Agenda Item 6

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE REPORT ON THE ACTIVITIES OF THE SOCIETY DURING 1995

1. EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

This report is presented by the Executive Committee elected at the 49th AGN held on 21 April 1995. Mr A Tuffery was again coopted by the Committee after the meeting. A full list of committee members is given in the 1995 Proceedings.

2. MEMBERSHIP

Sadly in 1995 several members died, including David Ellis, a former member of the Committee and Chairman of the Friends of the Museum; Frank Kirby, the Society's Librarian; John Lewarne, our Past President; and Lew Vardey, an Honorary Member.

As at 31 December 1995, the membership compared with 1994 was:

3. PROGRAMME

A full list of the year's programme of lectures and events is given in the 1995 Proceedings. The extra lectures in May and September did not bring in the usual size of audience, but they will be continued at least for 1996.

4. PUBLICATIONS

Proceedings - Volume 5, No 7 dated 1994 was published in February 1995.

Ashtead History - The work of producing this book was completed and it went on sale in October 1995, following a "book launch" given by Esso on the Society's behalf. The quality of the book has been widely praised, and the thanks of the Society are given to Jack Stuttard, the Editor, and his team of writers and researchers.

Leatherhead History - "A Town at the Crossroads" - This is now completely out of print: there are no plans to reprint at the moment.

5. SALES

The Ashtead History - The arrival of "A History of Ashtead" in October 1995 produced great sales activity. Over 1,300 copies

of the 3,000 printed, had been sold by the end of the year, giving enough revenue to pay for its production.

Other Society Publications - Sales of these showed a below average turnover.

"The Story of Hampton Cottage" - Reprinted by Dorincourt and continuing to be sold at £1.

6. ARCHAEOLOGY

In July 1995 the Museum was visited by Hedley Swain, the Finds Manager of the Museum of London Archaeology Service, which has been contracted to survey the archaeological collections held in Surrey Museums. He criticised the condition of much of our collection and made recommendations to improve the standard of care and display. In particular the large quantity of artefacts from A W G Lowther's excavations needs to be cleaned, sorted, re-bagged, labelled and catalogued.

Also in July 1995, several members of the Society assisted at the training excavation organised by the Surrey Archaeological Society on a Roman site at Abinger Hammer. Five rooms were identified, one of which had a damaged mosaic floor of 4th century date. Our President, Stephen Fortescue, using dowsing rods, is convinced that the building was quite extensive. It is hoped to continue the work in 1996. A previous excavation in the 1870s was seen by Charles Darwin when he was staying at Abinger Manor, and he drew a section in connection with his theories on the movements of earth worms.

7. THE SOCIETY'S LIBRARY

The Society suffered a severe blow in August with the death of its Librarian, Frank Kirby. Because of his duties in the Institute, he was almost constantly available there for anyone wishing to consult the Society's books. Mrs Gwen Hoad, a qualified Librarian, volunteered to take over, but she cannot be so readily available as Frank Kirby. She has made a completely new and detailed catalogue on card index from which a typed version is being prepared; a copy can be made available to any member wishing to have one. The Society's collection of books has recently been significantly increased by the gift by John Lewarne's daughter, Dr Gillian Sheehan, of an almost complete set of Surrey Archaeological Society Collections, together with much other material.

The Society is grateful to the Institute Trustees for giving the Society space for its Library in the Institute Library room. The Institute Trustees also continued to allow the Society to use the Library room each week-day afternoon for meetings and research. Much use has been made of it.

8. RECORDS

There were changes during 1995 in the posts of Bookham and Fetcham Archivists. David Bruce left Bookham after many years service and Brian Godfrey took over from him. Geoffrey Hayward, after similar long service, moved away from Fetcham and was succeeded by John Mettam. With this move, a subdivision of the Fetcham records was carried out, with Ed Timms holding the photographs and maps.

This change became particularly significant with the death of John Lewarne in July. A Past President of the Society and member from the very earliest days, he had acquired a large collection of papers and artefacts which he left to the Society. We are grateful to his daughter, Dr Gillian Sheehan, for passing them to us. While the bulk concern Fetcham, a great many relate to the other parishes as well as to the Museum.

The work on the History of Ashtead has resulted in a considerable increase in the records of Ashtead, with which Jack Willis is now coping.

Quite apart from the exceptional increase in volume due to the History of Ashtead and the Lewarne bequest, our records have continued to grow. This is, of course, a healthy phenomenon, but it also means that the question of satisfactory storage must always be in our minds.

9. THE MUSEUM

The Curator was supported by the Museum Sub-Committee throughout the year.

The Museum was open from 1 April to 16 December 1995, on Thursday afternoons, Friday mornings and all day Saturday. The number of visitors during that time was 1,950, including 390 children, well up to our usual average of about 2,000 per year.

The Curator, with much help from the Records Secretary and the Parish Archivists, continued to answer many enquiries about the local area and family history.

Throughout the year material was provided for numerous outside events and exhibitions, including the Thorndike Theatre (twice), V E Day at the Institute, Local Schools, Bookham Village Day, Ronson Ex-staff Get-Together, etc. This outside activity took up so much time, that the Curator has reluctantly decided not to participate in any such events during 1996; time is needed to catch up with packaging, cataloguing, labelling etc.

A small team of ladies from the Ashtead Branch of NADFAS has been working at the Museum, packing and documenting all our clothing and textiles, and the Society is extremely grateful for their help.

Stewards - The Museum continues to be manned by our dedicated stewards - some have been there since it opened in 1980. There are quite a number of new ones, but we are always pleased to welcome more: there are never quite enough.

The Society and the Friends of the Museum gave a Christmas Party at the Institute in December 1995 to thank the stewards and other helpers.

The Friends of the Museum

Sales - The Friends continue to make steady profits from their sales at the Museum, with Tea Towels, Notelets, Maps and Bookmarks, with this year's additions of pencil tins and fridge magnets with brightly coloured nostalgic advertisements - very popular with the children as well as adults.

The Hume Fund has been used to finance another three postcards for sale - Leatherhead Church early 19th century, the Swan Hotel c.1912 and Church Street c.1900. All postcards are selling well at the Museum and at Leatherhead Library. More postcards are planned for 1996.

Financial Support - The Friends gave financial support to the Museum by providing a wrought iron grid for the top of the well, a sales rack for the postcards, garden seat covers, a three-piece extension ladder, a "Dustbuster" cordless vacuum cleaner, and a table. They also paid for the cleaning and reframing of the Mickleham Church painting.
