Editorial

Twelve months has passed since the outbreak of hostilities, and during this period many regulations and orders have been introduced by the government as well as many control measures. One such measure is Paper Control as evidenced by the smallness of your daily newspaper, and it will readily be seen that the *Bulletin* has so far maintained its pre-war standard. It may be necessary to curtail this present standard, or even to completely suspend further issues until after the war. Should such an eventuality arise, some other method must be adopted to bring to the notice of the general public important information which may affect them during this period. If such steps have to be taken, we feel sure that our readers will appreciate the position and will realise that the interests of our community is in the hands of the Government.

Since the revision of the Old Age Pensions Act numerous enquiries have been made regarding the supplementary pensions which came into effect on 3rd August, 1940, and it is hoped that the following will be of assistance.

An old age pensioner (contributory or non-contributory scheme) or a widow aged at least 60 in receipt of a widow's pension under the Contributory Pensions Acts, may apply for a supplementary pension in case of need. Blind persons are not eligible as they come under other special schemes. Supplementary pensions will be paid by the Assistance Board, and when making assessments the Board will consider the needs both of the applicant and of the dependent members of his household, and the resources of the household will also be relevant. Certain forms of income are to be wholly or partially disregarded, and will include all those forms which were protected under the Unemployment Assistance Act and, in addition, protection is given to the first 7/6 of any superannuation payment and first 7/6 of a sickness payment payable in certain cases in the place of National Health Insurance benefit. Earnings are treated in much the same way as under the Unemployment Assistance regulations; two changes however

have been made in order to give a certain stability to the assessment, and to save the pensioner from the necessity of reporting minor fluctuations in the earnings of members of his household during the currency of an existing determination.

If there is any doubt regarding the position in respect of the supplementary pension, advice and assistance can be obtained from the Citizens Advice Bureau, and forms can be obtained from any post office.

Volunteers are still urgently needed in connection with the A.R.P. services. Information can be obtained from the Council Offices, Leatherhead. Tel. Leatherhead 2266.

Citizens Advice Bureau

As a result of the increasing number of enquiries, the Leatherhead office is now open from 9.45 a.m. until 4.30 p.m. Mondays to Fridays, and 9.45 to 12 noon on Saturdays.

The name "Citizens Advice Bureau" is now known throughout the country and without a doubt is justifying its existence as a free service of advice and assistance for every citizen. In these days of stress and anxiety the Bureau is of inestimable value in undertaking the problems which confront us. Such matters as mortgages, and hire purchase agreements of those evacuated from the defence areas have been successfully dealt with, as well as enquiries of every possible description.

Complete liaison exists between the various Refugee Committees, the British & International Red Cross in order to ensure prompt accurate information, so whatever your difficulty or problem do not hesitate to bring it to the Bureau where it will be treated in confidence and with a friendly spirit.

Some misapprehension appears to exist that letters for prisoners of war in enemy or enemy-occupied territory should be addressed to the care of the British Red Cross Society, and the Postmaster General desires to remind relatives that letters should be addressed directly to the prisoner and should include service number and rank, initial and surname, British prisoner of war, prisoner of war number, camp number, and place of internment, and country. The name of the sender should be written on the back of the envelope. The word "Kriegsgefangenpost" should be inscribed on the top left hand corner of the envelope in the case of prisoners of war in Germany. An example is as follows:—

Kriegsgefangenpost.
No. 12468 Corporal T. Atkins,
British Prisoner of War No. 450,
Stalig XII. A.
Germany.

Regarding missing relatives in enemy-occupied territory, particulars can be given to the Bureau staff and every effort will be made to trace their whereabouts.

Matters of the Moment

The International Red Cross postal message scheme has now been extended to friends and relations resident in this country who wish to communicate to Italy. The Citizens Advice Bureau can accept such messages which cost 1s.

Subject to certain conditions, letters can now be sent to the following countries: Germany, Austria, Czecho-Slovakia, Poland, Norway, Denmark, Holland, Luxembourg, France and the Channel Islands.

Relatives of serving men in hospital. Notification of proposed visits of relatives should be sent to the county representative of the county in which the hospital to be visited is situated. Recommendation form V.R.7, if they have been received should be sent to the office concerned. A full list of county representatives can be seen at Citizens Advice Bureau head office, Alnwick House, Church Street, Leatherhead.

Luck or Pluck—or both.

Last autumn efforts were made locally to induce people to enjoy a certain amount of social life in spite of the limited accommodation obtainable, and a good number availed themselves of the opportunity of hearing addresses or going to whist drives, etc. The good results obtained certainly justify a renewal if possible during the coming winter, and efforts will no doubt be made during the next few weeks to prepare a programme. During last winter various societies and clubs had to consider the possibilities for the present summer season, and although fears were expressed by a few that nothing was possible, it is much to the credit of Bookham that various sports clubs and the Garden Society dealt boldly with the question, the result being that whilst the former were able to arrange fixtures with other clubs whose hearts were not faint, the latter eventually held a fine show at the usual venue on July 31st. On that day members of other organisations expressed regret that earlier in the year they missed the opportunity to carry on, and a well-known Leatherhead resident congratulated the Bookham people for having done so well. The Show was held on a day when the weather seemed to specially favour it and was a great success, with its high-grade vegetable exhibits, and if there had been prizes for super-firs these would have been won by some of the onions, carrots, etc. which were shown. The "fair" was smaller than usual, but it was well patronised, and the children were well catered for in the sports arranged for them.

In the vegetable show there was one special feature which deservedly attracted attention, that being the exhibits grown by the evacuated East Dulwich schoolboys, who probably had never used a gardening tool previous to their arrival in Bookham, and the writer who had a look at their allotments a few weeks previous to the show found some which would have done credit to a professional gardener. Whilst we all hope for an early termination of the war, yet if these boys are with us next year they should with the knowledge acquired in such a short time be able to again render a good account of themselves. There were many regrets expressed that the local children had been unable to put up similar exhibits, but it is expected that next year this will be remedied, as one or more of the local schools are likely to enter the lists then.—R.A.

Assurance

Since 1st June the editor has been privileged to receive correspondence from the Minister of Information, and with his permission certain of this has been distributed. The following letter is here reproduced:—

Dear Sir,—An article appeared in the most prominent place in one of our most widely-circulated daily newspapers a few days ago which contained the following sentence as a comment on the appointment of the Controller of Overseas Publicity in the Ministry of Information: "What difference" said the writer, "there can be between 'overseas publicity' & 'foreign publicity' must rest secretly in the Ministry, since we are an island." Apparently for the moment the writer had forgotten the existence of the Dominions, India and the Colonial Empire. I feel that if a popular writer can suffer from such a surprising lapse of memory, some ordinary people may possibly suffer in the same way, and therefore that it would be well in these anxious days to remind people what an astounding achievement the British Commonwealth of Nations is.

People in foreign countries have little idea of the great strides in development that the Commonwealth has made even since the last war. They do not know—and some of us at home are not fully aware—that the Dominions of Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa, all of whom are fighting by our side today, are completely self-governing independent powers. They need not have come into the war unless their own governments, freely elected by their own people had decided that they should. Eire, which enjoys the same freedom, has decided not to take part in the war, and no attempt has been made to compel her to take part, however much we may desire it. Each of the Dominions gives allegiance to the King, but each of them makes its own laws through its own Parliament, just as we do here in the United Kingdom.

It may seem to you that I am reminding you unnecessarily of what you already know. I do so for two reasons: first, because there are many people who are not fully aware of these facts, and secondly because to be reminded of them now may give both encouragement for the present and hope for the future—encouragement for the present because it is a grand thought that on the other side of the Atlantic and on the other side of the world, fellow citizens are at this moment training to increase the numbers of those that they have already sent over to Great Britain to defend our common cause; hope for the future

because only the success of this great experiment in international co-operation provides us with the solution to the problems that still face us after the victory. Here is a league of nations that has worked and has succeeded. Hitler is attempting to unite Europe by force by taking away everybody's freedom and compelling them to obey the will of one nation, while that nation obeys the will of one man.

We, when the war is over, must also hope to see some unity in Europe, but a unity based upon the freewill and consent of the various nations who will pool their resources, share their responsibilities, and combine their armed forces while retaining their own liberty, just as nations have done who form today the British Commonwealth.

The Lord Lieutenant's Fund

Most of us are familiar with the above fund's objects which are to provide comforts especially for Surrey men serving with the forces, to provide for the welfare of units quartered in the county, the provision of comforts for prisoners of war belonging to Surrey, and to help dependents of those on active service.

There is one county fund administered by a committee at Kingston, into which £24 collected in Bookham on Emblem Day last April was paid. Connected with this central organisation we have our own local branch. Early in May two committees were formed: an appeals committee to collect money, of which the writer is chairman, and a comforts committee with Mrs. Emuss in the chair, to assist the various working parties, supply them with wool obtained through the central organisation, and co-ordinate their efforts. On the arrival of the Canadians in Bookham an entertainments committee is being formed with Mrs. Jacob as chairman, which committee is getting busy with the welfare of the troops.

The local fund pays for the wool to make the various knitted comforts, which alone runs into nearly £30 a month, and is likely to increase; it also provides comforts for the Bookham Home Guard, and will have to finance anything attempted to entertain the Canadian troops. It is hoped that we may be able to contribute something to the central county fund upon which there are many calls, but our local needs must be met first and nearly all money contributed is earmarked for these in the first instance.

During the first three months efforts to raise

Local History

In 1685 it was estimated that there were forty thousand walnut trees in Norbury Park, and the produce was worth about 4d. per tree, but this fluctuated very much as in good years the fruit sold for over £600 and in poor years there would be "barely a bushel of fruit." In 1772 Norbury Park was owned by a Mr. Chapman who had the whole of his plantation of walnut trees cut down to make gun-stocks for the British Army.

In 1588 when the Spanish invasion was threatened, Queen Elizabeth's Proclamation was posted in Leatherhead and Bookham calling for 400 musqueteers, 400 bowmen, 400 billmen and 400 pikes. This force had to assemble at Dorking.

In 1643 a troop of Parliamentary Horse was quartered in Leatherhead. Many houses in the district were searched for a sum of money that was being collected for the King's cause. The Rector of Fetcham was thrown into prison, and Slyfield Manor, Bookham, was ransacked and Sir George Shiers arrested. On a bright spring morning an old farm labourer, driving a horse and cart loaded with cabbages, met the King's scouts at Esher—it was a golden crop, for most of the heads contained guineas.

Vestry book minutes, Leatherhead, June 17th 1798. Agreed by the inhabitants present that in the case of actual invasion they were to assist the government with wagons, cart and horses and proper persons to conduct the same, to the utmost of what may be found in the said parishes of Leatherhead and Bookham.
