

THE GRANGE CENTRE

celebrates 65 years in Bookham

The Grange Centre for people with disabilities was honoured by His Royal Highness The Duke of Gloucester on Monday 25 November when he came to open the refurbished Gloucester Lodge Residential Care Home. The Duke was also representing his mother HRH Princess Alice, Patron of The Grange Centre.

The work on Gloucester Lodge involved converting the buildings into two residential care bungalows for people with physical and learning disabilities. Each bungalow, named Willow & Maple respectively, has a dining / living room, a kitchen and five bedrooms with en-suite facilities and French windows to the garden. The conversion also includes staff overnight accommodation.

Lady Cubitt, President of the Grange Centre says: 'We are very

grateful to His Royal Highness for sparing the time to visit us for that significant occasion. The refurbishment of Gloucester Lodge is a very important milestone in our Development Plan and we are grateful for the generous support we have received through our 'Growing The Grange' Appeal to make this work possible. Among the many changes over the years one constant feature has been, and still is, the wonderful atmosphere which prevails at The Grange, and which strikes everyone who visits

The Charity originated in 1927 when Miss Julia Sweet, a pioneer in the teaching and training of disabled people, founded the School of Stitchery and Lace in Leicestershire. Miss Sweet's original idea was to provide the setting and facilities to offer people

with a disability the opportunity of vocational and educational training, thereby enabling them to become useful and independent citizens. The School (renamed The Grange Centre in the 70's) moved to Bookham in 1938, so this year is our 65th anniversary in the Village and it will be a special year for us all. We also plan to move on to the next phase of our Development Plan, which will include the refurbishment of the Coach House into a new Training Centre for textiles, crafts and independent living skills. Of course, we first have to raise a lot of funds and this requirement will be supported by a number of events, including a birthday party in July. We hope you will come and visit us.


2002 ended on a high note with a varied display of excellent local talent at Community Entertains on two

Who is the next Editor?



Born and bred in South East London I initially went into teaching Mathematics for several years. The call of the computer industry however

was too much and I went into what was then an industry in its infancy. In those early days of computers a whole set of companies were competing to create a good computing engine. Computers were not seen as they are today - they were just imagined as calculating machines for solving number problems quickly. It was said that the whole of the UK would probably need just FOUR computers to do this work. The vision of computers as tools to organise and run businesses was only seen by a very few.

Computers were beginning to use transistors and were a vast set of huge cabinets filling a large room. Somehow information had to be fed into the machine and the main methods were punched cards or punched paper tape. There were no discs or CDs in those days and if you wanted to store information it had to be done on magnetic tape.



I was mainly on the software side writing programs. We had to create computer languages to translate software into the machine's internal code. My chief interest was what is known as Operating Systems to control the hardware of the machines and to provide facilities to make it more useful and human.

It was soon realised that there was no future in many companies making totally different products. In the USA IBM were doing things in a big way and many other companies were trying to get on the bandwagon. The companies gradually merged. In the UK, English Electric became English Electric Leo Marconi Elliot (a memorable and catchy company name indeed!) and then came International Computers and Tabulators (or ICT). Eventually (but not until around 1970) did the final UK merger come about to form International Computers Limited or ICL who have now disappeared into Fujitsu.

Now I am retired and out of London my project is growing old gracefully. I can enjoy the many benefits of Bookham and its beautiful surroundings. My wife, Jill and I can relax with our dog and help with the family and the latest grandchildren. And now - there's the small matter of the Bookhams Bulletin!



Beech Avenue restored

Visitors to Polesden Lacey can witness conservation work in action this spring, when the National Trust begins an important programme of landscape management to restore the famous Beech Avenue.

The project will involve the removal of 41 lime trees and 3 beech trees to enable the existing beech trees to flourish, thereby returning the Avenue to its full glory.

The Beech Avenue was created by Sir Francis Geary in the 1750s and was originally lined only by beech trees. Over the years the drive has been interplanted with lime trees acting as 'fillers' to allow newly planted beech to grow. The beech trees are now becoming restricted by the inner limes and these will be removed, completing the final phase of the restoration.

Newly Opened Portico Room - a Touching Display

A new and exciting venture has been the development of a 'handling' collection located in the newly opened Portico Room. This has given our visitors to Polesden Lacey House the opportunity to see and handle items that were used

'below stairs' in the Edwardian period. Visitors can compare and contrast the methods of housekeeping used during the times (1906 - 1942) of the last owner Mrs Greville, with those of today. As well as the handling collection, there are interpretation panels which look at the lives of those in service for Mrs Greville with free information and educational leaflets. One of the challenges of this collection is



trying to guess the use of the mystery objects.

For many of our visitors the Portico Room has rekindled memories and a multitude of anecdotes, many hilarious, of a time when they used some of the articles on display. Eastwick Allotments and Gardens Association Report - 2001/2

For those of you who do not know, our subscription year runs from 1 October to 30 September (£2.00 per annum). The EAGA enables members to purchase seeds at substantial discounts (up to 37.5%) and many members enjoy selecting the varieties for the coming season. We can supply tools for the jobs; forks and spades for digging, trowels for bulb planting and transplanting, secateurs and saws for pruning to name a few. We also supply various materials for storage of bulbs, corms and tubers such as vermiculite. For those with plants needing protection we supply fleece, bubble polythene, windbreak fabric and mulching material (bark chips, sand, grits) at competitive prices.

At this year's AGM in November we hoped to keep the business brief and finish the evening with a gentle social wine and cheese tasting in the hope of attracting more active participation. Sadly, this was not to be! On the night in question a power cut that started shortly before the meeting kept many away and those that were there huddled around the emergency lighting in order to conduct the meeting. All things considered it had the air of a spiritualist meeting or seance and was memorable for that alone. We even started the social in the dark but the lights came back on part way through and we saw it as a good omen. Committee member Tony Townend stood down, partly due to ill health, and we were sorry to see him go. He was replaced by David Cooper. David Chapman became the new Hut Manager so we are now up to full strength.

At the moment there are rather more vacant plots than usual, some a little neglected and others recently worked. They are very cheap to rent and do not have to be exclusively used for vegetables. If you want to grow cut flowers for the house or have an area for resting out of season plants (heeling in bulbs from containers) or propagating plants why not rent one. All it takes is a little regular maintenance. A little gentle exercise and fresh air is likely to be of benefit to anyone having a sedentary or indoor job. If you would like to know more, please visit the hut on site one Sunday morning between 10.00am and noon. Remember that even if you do not want or need an allotment you can still join the association and save on your gardening supplies.

The EAGA is a trading organisation and members can purchase a wide range of basic gardening materials at very competitive prices. We trade from huts on the Eastwick Allotments site bounded by Eastwick road and Keswick Road in Bookham. The huts are open for trading between 10am and noon most Sundays of the year and doing a turn in the huts is currently a condition of membership. People are required to record purchases, to handle small items from behind the counter, to weigh out loose materials, and to man the second hut. The main hut is heated in the cold weather and there are stools to sit on if required. We supply an apron to protect clothing and identify you as an official helper. At

half time there is a cup of tea or coffee and a biscuit or two. There is always at least one committee member on duty to organise things and deal with enquiries or problems. Sometimes business is slow, sometimes frenetic, but nearly always fun and there is something satisfying about being able to provide a small service to the community. During the quiet times you can read the magazines donated by members (the Garden from the RHS, Gardening from Which etc.) or chat with fellow enthusiasts.

Our aim is to give as good value for money as possible and our best strategy is to strive to always increase membership our economies come mainly from scale of operations. We are lucky to have a dedicated and stable committee that looks after the day to day business of the Association. Our Honorary Secretary, John Humphreys, has been behind a drive to keep up the repair of the huts and improve facilities. We try to stock a range of the most popular formulations that avoids duplication so if we do not appear to have what you want please ask; we probably have an equivalent product at an even better price!

Bookham, Fetcham and District Garden Society Pips for Non Gardeners

Those who had a go at planting some bulbs as described in the Summer edition of the Bulletin should now be reaping the benefits of a colourful Spring display. The advantage of plants, grown from bulbs, such as daffodils is that they should come up every year and after 2 or 3 years will, hopefully, reproduce and expand to the extent that they can be split up and increase the show at no cost. For the best results don't be too eager to cut down the foliage after the flowers have finished leave it for a few weeks if possible.

An aspect of owning a garden, which can be very satisfying if you have room, is growing your own fruit and/or vegetables - the taste of freshly picked produce is worth the little effort involved. One way to try out this idea on a small scale is to start with some herbs either in pots or in a small plot by the kitchen door. Shrubby and perennial herbs such as Rosemary, Thyme and Sage are good ones to start with as they are reliable and effective garden plants in their own right for their foliage, flowers and scent as well as their culinary uses. The old Cottage Gardeners grew these plants in mixed beds with other flowers and shrubs. If you haven't got a friendly gardening neighbour who can give you some plants, most garden centres have an extensive range of herbs in pots ready to plant out.

Society Activities

The next main event in the Society's calendar is the Spring Show, which this year is on Sunday 6 April in Fetcham Village Hall. The doors are open to visitors at 2:30pm and there are refreshments, plant sales and a raffle. This is well worth a visit to see the displays of Daffodils, Tulips, other spring flowers as well as several classes of floral art. If previous years are anything to go by the Hall will be full of colour and a sight to lift the spirits after the winter months.

This is also an opportunity to find out more about the Society and talk to committee members. The membership year starts at the beginning of May and a modest £2 entitles you to free entry to the three annual shows, entry to the monthly meetings for the cost of a cup of tea and access to the Society's extensive library of books on all aspects of gardens and gardening.

The last evening meeting of the year is on Monday 19 May and will include an illustrated talk on the RHS Garden at Wisley. This is a good example to demonstrate that you don't have to be an expert or the owner of a large garden to be a member. Anyone with an interest in gardens is likely to get some pleasure and derive some benefit from joining the Society. In March 2003, the Bookham Stamp Club will be ten years old. In that time it has been the fastest growing stamp club in the UK and won the prestigious Rowland Hill award for 'New Horizons' in 1996. The Club has a membership in excess of 100 and attendance at monthly meetings is between 50 to 60 or more.

The Bookham Stamp Club was founded when two Bookham collectors, members

of the local Mole Valley stamp clubs at Dorking and Leatherhead, realized that many collectors no longer attended meetings even although they were known to be still active in philately. These two collectors, Rodney Partridge and Professor John Salmon, mulled over this issue and came to the conclusion that the reason so many collectors gave up attending meetings was that they all took place in the evening. Most of those no longer coming to meetings were elderly and had either given up driving or no longer drove in the dark. Others who could travel by bus were unwilling to have to wait for a bus after ten o'clock at night or to walk home in the dark. Coincidentally, a senior member of the Bookham Community Association suggested to Rodney that maybe a stamp club could be started there. Rodney and John talked the idea over with a few people and then sent out letters to about forty people who were known to collect stamps or who might be interested. The positive response that was forthcoming led to an initial meeting in the Old Barn Hall at which it was decided to set up an afternoon club. John Salmon drafted the objectives and rules of the club, Rodney was appointed Chairman and the Bookham Stamp Club was started.

Initially it met in the Waterfield room but within a few months had to move to the Harrison room as membership increased

and finally to the main hall itself. Within a couple of years a trading activity began. The Club buys material at public auction or privately, breaks up the material into suitable lots and sells this to members. Additionally the Club has a source of modern covers from all over the world which are sold in aid of the Save the Children Charity. An eye charity, the Iris Fund, is also supported.

A library of philatelic books and catalogues has been built up and is available for consultation or loan to members.

In 1999 a junior section was started. After a somewhat hesitant start this section is now going well although more members are always made very welcome. It meets on the first Saturday of the month from 10.00 to 12.00 with Peter Sawyer helped by Don French guiding the youngsters. To support them, a Club Committee member attends each meeting on a rota basis.

The Bookham Stamp Club, as part of its celebrations for its 10th anniversary, will be hosting the Federation of Surrey Philatelic Societies Spring Convention on Saturday 22 March 2003 in the Old Barn Hall, Church Road, Great Bookham from 10.30 to 16.30 hrs. This takes the form of a Stamp Fair with more than a dozen stamp dealers attending, most of them coming back following the very successful fairs held by Bookham Stamp Club in 1994, 1996 and 2000. The competition entries for the Federations Annual Competition and Open Competition will be on display together with the entries for the Dawes Cup, an inter-federation competition.

Refreshments will be available and entrance is free.



LEATHERHEAD CRICKET CLUB



Since their first game against local rivals Ripley in 1850, Leatherhead Cricket Club has been providing the stage for the area's good, bad and just plain average cricketers. On any weekend during the summer, a visitor to the picturesque, well appointed Fetcham Grove ground will be rewarded (weather-permitting) with the familiar sound of leather on willow.

Leatherhead run teams to suit all ages and playing standards. The Saturday league teams play in EATHERHEAD the Fullers County League (1st XI) and the Castle Lager Surrey Championship (2nd and 3rd XI's). Indeed the 2nd XI improved on their promotion-winning performance of 2001 by winning the 3rd Division title in 2002. There are also two senior Sunday teams, who play friendlies, and the area's best youth cricket section. The age groups catered for by the youth teams (or 'Colts') range from the under 9's to the under 16's. On any summer weekday evening you will be able to see the Colts being trained by ECB-approved coaches or playing a competitive or friendly fixture against another local team.

We also have a lively social scene, with regular functions at the clubhouse. Quizzes, racenights and barbecues are common. During the 150th Anniversary celebrations Leatherhead put on a Summer Ball at the nearby Leisure Centre, and the annual fund-raising dinner is a great night out.

The club has been touring Devon for twenty years and the revamped tour of 2002 was a major success, the highlights being the fixture at Tavistock, atop Dartmoor where the boundary is marked out by ancient stones, and the Devon County ground at Chagford where the outfield is like a bowling green.

The club has also toured Hong Kong, Singapore and Australia (as part of the 150th anniversary celebrations) and will be visiting Barbados this February to play 6 fixtures.

The annual cricket week commences in the first week of August and encompasses 5 senior fixtures and one colts day.

The cricket club is run by a committee which meets once a month. Unlike most clubs, the committee

is made up of the old and the young with the players' representatives joining the team captains and the more common committee members (chairman, secretary and treasurer, etc). The make-up of this forum ensures that all members can be properly represented. A couple of our objectives this year include the provision of a new 3rd XI league ground at Boxhill School and the refurbishment of the clubhouse. Last year our investment in youth cricket was rewarded by a grant from

SportsMatch that enabled the club to buy two new all-weather outdoor nets.

Our winter practice nets start in March (Tuesday nights at the Guildford Cricket School, bowling machine included) and our outdoor season starts on Sunday, 22 April. The colts registration day is Saturday, 21 April (10.30 - 13.00 at the clubhouse).

Bookham Players Celebrate 40 Years

The first production of (at that time) The Bookham Dramatic Society took place in 1963 at Church House (now flats on the corner of The Garstons). The Society developed out of a few Nativity/Easter plays performed in church by the St Nicolas Young Wives Group, joined by a few husbands. As Keith and I had been involved in London in a theatre group before moving to Bookham we felt it would be a good idea to extend the scope of the plays we were able to do, and so the first Playbill of one-act plays was performed on what was just a platform at Church House. Looking back it amazes me what we were able to perform in such a limited space.

In the early 70's the plan at the Old Barn Hall for a further extension to include a stage was mooted, and we were able to be involved, putting on our first production there in 1972 - "Celebration" - and shortly after that the name was changed

to The Bookham Players. Since then the Players have performed 2 full-length plays annually, or occasionally a Playbill with fish & chip supper (now very popular). At the same time, since 1967, we have entered the Betchworth Festival, winning several awards for Best Play, Best Acting & Supporting performances, and Best Set.

We have seen many members come and go during these years and, with so much dramatic and musical competition in the area, are usually short of younger members. The Players are always pleased to welcome new members, both in an acting and back-stage capacity.
