



Chairman's Report



DIRECTORS' ANNUAL REPORT TO MEMBERS - 2017/18

Over the past year we have invested a substantial amount of money into the halls both in improving the premises and in safety.

Harrison Room kitchen - thanks to a very generous donation from the Wilson family, in memory of Graham, the kitchen is completely refurbished with new units, equipment, worktops and wall cladding.

Waterfield Room Ramp - with the help of a grant from the Thomas Flack Foundation we now have a disabled access ramp into the Waterfield Room. This provides easier access for motorised wheelchairs

Electrics - not so obvious is the upgrading of the electrical system to current standards throughout the buildings. Many requirements have changed over the 70 years that the halls have been converted, extended and revamped and we now have a system meeting all current standards and a much better idea of what is connected to what!

Waterfield Room - we have replaced the ancient and unsightly water heater with an undercounter one providing hot water through the taps thereby improving looks and efficiency in one move.

Main Hall Floor - has been resealed to restore its appearance and cleanability.

Silent Soldier - This is the Centenary Year of the end of the First World War and to mark this we are participating in the British Legion Silent Soldier tribute with a silhouette on our entrance wall. This was paid for privately and is one of three in the

village. It will be removed at the end of the year.

Supporters - our Bulletin and our Membership Fees depend on over 200 volunteers who deliver and collect and, in May, we invited them and other supporters to a Reception in the main hall. I am pleased to say that around 70 came.

Village Week was extremely successful this year with Village Day and Open Gardens attracting record attendances.


Village Day featured Birds of Prey in the arena and a Climbing Wall organised and sponsored by Churches Together of Bookham. Our very grateful thanks to Mike McCann and the Village Day Committee for all their hard work and to our Sponsors, The Vineries Garden Centre, Young's Brewery and Elios/Di Carlos Hairdressing.

Many thanks to the Bookham Open Gardens Committee who again put on a tremendous day with a wonderful selection of gardens with a record profit of £7,268 and to the organisers of our other events in the Week.

I would like to thank all our Management Committee for their work throughout the year and our Manager, Roger, and his assistant, Rob, who do such a great job for us and our hall users

Finances: our overall balance at the end of the year showed a reduction in reserves of nearly £11,000 but as we had spent over £32,500 on major maintenance and improvements this was an excellent result due to grants, donations and fundraising.



Over the two days of competition, other club annual awards were played for and the awards were presented at the prize giving dinner dance at Thatcher's Restaurant in October.



Bookham Youth & Community Centre

Bookham Youth & Community Centre will be closing summer 2019. The centre situated opposite the Anchor pub on Lower Road, has been a valued and important part of the village for many years. It is run by trustees and other volunteers and incorporated into a charity, Bookham Youth & Community Association Ltd (BYCA).

The lease from Surrey County Council (SCC) expires on 31 August 2019 and BYCA has been

advised that it will not be renewed. The building is old and it has been known that it had a finite life hence discussions with SCC to provide a replacement.

Our regular users have been kept informed.

A new community facility on the horizon?

Concerning a possible replacement facility on the site, we were advised in September 2018 by Cllr Colin Kemp, the Cabinet Member responsible, that pre-planning advice was being sought from Mole Valley District Council and that:

"From this would come a firm business case model from which decisions to move forward could be taken. A proposed new building at Bookham would be based upon a "hub model" with office space, residential and community provision."

A meeting was held in October to look at and comment on the outline plans. The Bookham Youth Project (BYP), have been providing youth work from the centre and within the community and it is BYCA's intention for them to be involved in this process. There are no guarantees involved on what are "proposals" and it is important that pressure is kept on SCC so the project does not either slip or be shelved. Hopefully, by the time the next issue of the Bulletin comes out there will be some definitive positive news to report.

Community Heroes

Many of us have been seeing and reading recently about how much plastic there is around us, how it affects wildlife, oceans, rivers, and ourselves. We can all help make a difference and reverse the trend by reducing the amount of plastic we consume, reusing where possible, and recycling what is left (if it can be recycled).

To this end, I have decided to tackle the amount of old pens that get thrown in the bin through an organisation called TerraCycle (https://www.terracycle.co.uk/en-GB/).

TerraCycle is an innovative recycling company that has become a global leader in recycling hard-to-recycle materials. They offer a range of free programmes, as well as recycle solutions available for purchase for almost every form of waste. Pens fall into this category. TerraCycle have collection points/drop-offs for the different materials they collect, and the closest one to Bookham for pens is in Leatherhead

(points are limited to one within a 5-mile radius).

My aim is to have many 'informal' collection points in Bookham as is possible and realistic, to help encourage more people to drop them off. I will then collect them all up and take them to the collection point in Leatherhead, saving many unnecessary car journeys!

Bookham Library is the main drop-off point in Bookham, but I am also working closely with local schools to encourage them to collect pens in each classroom, and for children to bring them in from home. Before the next Bulletin, I will endeavour to weigh all of the pens I collect to measure how we are doing.

New on-line Booking System for the Old Barn Hall - Hallmaster

We have a new on-line booking system which makes it easy for anyone to check availability in any of our three halls or to find the date of a particular booking. Just visit our website bookhamcommunityassociation.org and click on the link on the Home page.

You can check hall availability, or an existing booking, without registering but if you wish to make or change a booking you will need to register. This is very easy, and the form will come up when you click on the + sign on your chosen date. The booking you make will show as provisional. Roger, our Halls Manager, will then confirm the provisional booking or let you know why he is unable to.

A provisional booking will show on the web site but without details of who made the booking. Once the booking is approved it will normally show the organisation or person organising the event if it is open to members or to the public. If not, it will show as a 'Private Event'

Where an organisation has a regular time every week or every month Roger will create provisional bookings into the distant future. If anyone wished to use one of those times, then Roger would only override the provisional booking after discussion with the regular user. This is already done with our paper system.

We hope that this will make it easier both to book the halls and to see which hall an event is using if you are unsure. Roger will still be happy to take bookings at the office or by telephone.

Bookham, Fetcham and Effingham Christmas Charity Post



Last year £1500 was given through the Disasters Emergency Committee to provide temporary shelter, emergerncy healthcare, food, clean water and sanitation services to the Myanmar Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh; £1000 to Medecine Sans Frontiere for their work in Yemen; and finally £1000 to Practical Action for water projects in East Africa.



At last, there is some good news regarding the ongoing flooding problems, particularly around the area of the squareabout at the bottom of East Street and the High Street. During the last 18 months, several attempts have been made to locate the cause of the problem without success, due to possible serious damage to underground pipes, which cannot cope with the volume of water during sustained rainfall. This led to various meetings with the water authorities, the local council and drainage specialists, culminating in the conclusion that the area in question needs underground research using the most advanced scanning equipment so that a





reliable and long lasting solution could be found.

In order to achieve this, the BRA organised a petition asking Surrey County Council for sufficient funding to carry out the necessary investigation. The petition was accepted by the SCC Local Committee and formal notification has recently confirmed that £30,000 has been allocated for the project, which will commence within this financial year. There is no commitment at the moment to the resolution stage, but this is a step in the right direction to identify the underlying causes of the flooding.

The War Memorial in St Nicolas churchyard was erected after WW1 and now being 100 years old, has become rather dilapidated. Peter Seaward (BRA Chairman), and Arthur Field (BRA Projects Manager) took on the task of identifying suitable restoration companies, dealing with the Church Authorities and MVDC to have the memorial restored to its former glory. Following the initial clean, using techniques specifically for old stone work, the second stage of the restoration, the repainting of the engraving, has been completed. In addition to the restoration work at St Nicolas, the memorial at All Saints, Little Bookham has



also been cleaned. There are four names on the memorial, and church records show that another seven individuals should be commemorated. Discussions are taking place on how this may resolved. The high quality of the work is due to the skills of the restoration company, Stonewest. Next time you are in the village, take a moment to have a look at the memorial and remember those from this village who gave their lives for this country 100 years ago.

Eastwick Road Church



Eastwick Road Church in Bookham recently welcomed a new minister. The Reverend Ted Bellingham was ordained and inducted at a special service conducted at the church and led by the Synod Moderator, Reverend Nicola Furley-Smith. Among those present to welcome Ted into his new role were representatives from the other two churches in the village, and members of his home church in Dorking and members of his new congregation at Eastwick Road. In welcoming Ted and his wife, Jane, the Secretary of the church, Sue Ferguson said: 'We warmly welcome them both in this new chapter in the life of this church. We look forward to all God has for this Fellowship in the future'. Ted and Jane live locally in Westhumble and travel up Bagden Hill to Bookham to get to the church. In doing so they retrace the very steps taken by the founder of the church, Willian Ansell, who in the late nineteenth century was instrumental in founding the Congregational Mission in the village. Ted trained as a lay preacher before being accepted as a candidate for ordination and then spent two years at Westminster College, Cambridge. Before ministry Ted worked with the Christian charity, 'Send a Cow', where he was the volunteer coordinator for Surrey, Kent, and Sussex. Before this role, Ted had a career with the Surrey Police and spent 32 years in the force, serving at various stations. On his appointment Ted stated: 'I am delighted and excited to have been called to Eastwick Road Church. It is such a friendly and welcoming church which openly displays the love of Jesus. I am sure Jane and I will be very happy here and we look forward to getting to know the Bookham community.' Eastwick Road Church holds worship services at 10:30 am each Sunday, and everyone is welcomed to attend. We particularly welcome those who may be interested in exploring more about the Christian faith. An energetic Junior Church for children meets at the same time. Eastwick Road Church is a part of the United Reformed Church denomination. The denomination describes itself as a family of Christians, worshipping in the name of Jesus in about 1500 local churches from Orkney to Cornwall.

Eastwick Schools

It's been wonderful to see Eastwick School almost literally 'buzzing' over the last few weeks as parents, children, and staff settle into the new school year. New friends have been made and existing friendships cemented. Children joining Reception and those moving into Year 3, have been exploring their new environments, well supported by their teachers and teaching assistants, and are settling in impressively well. Outside of the usual school-day activities, Eastwick offers a wide range of early morning, lunchtime and after-school clubs and it's been amazing how quickly these have been booked up - from art club to gymnastics, book club to tennis, many children have been keen to find their particular talents and to discover new ways to challenge themselves.

Reception children are enjoying their amazing outdoor classroom, as well as getting used to their indoor ones! As part of their settling-in activities they have enjoyed telling each other about their families and the important people in their lives using photographs that they have put up around the classrooms. This supports them in developing their confidence and communication skills as well as helping all of their classmates learn a little bit more about their new friends.

Year One are no longer the smallest people in the Infant school, and have definitely developed a new confidence in their abilities! They have absorbed extremely well the change in their daily school routine towards more classroom-based learning than they have been used to in Reception. Happily, they will still be using the outdoor classroom as they progress through Years 1 and 2, particularly in their Forest School learning, which all children in the Infant School have access to every term.

Year Two are enjoying being the eldest in the Infant school, and taking on some new responsibilities. This term is focused on Around the World experiences, discovering how life is lived by people in other countries and cultures. This topic is greatly enriched by Eastwick parents, who have experience of living in different countries and who come in to school to share their first-hand knowledge with the children. Year Two enjoyed a drumming workshop delivered by World Music Workshops which enhanced their learning about music in other cultures.

Year Three have been immersing themselves in the distant past, with their learning about the Stone Age. They have been looking at how people lived and writing job descriptions for a prehistoric monster hunter! The children have also been busy creating cave paintings using pastels. An upcoming highlight of the term is a visit to Butser Farm in Hampshire, which is a showcase for prehistoric Britain and includes a Celtic Village from that time.

Year Four have been developing their writing skills with some inventive character descriptions on Roald Dahl's story 'The Twits'. They have also had great fun investigating the Mayans as their topic. They have made chocolate, played Patolli games, made maracas and learned about the Geography of Mexico.

Year Five have been Antarctic Explorers, immersing themselves in the experiences of Shackleton, his team and his ship just over 100 years ago. They have built models of Arcticshelters, developed their own Arctic dens, researched the expedition in detail and created some wonderful artwork.

Year Six have begun their final year at Eastwick by thinking about conflict and 'The Right to Fight'. This topic is always very resonant at this time of year, but they also learn to think about other forms of conflict, such as differences of opinion in the last century over women's right to vote in the UK, peaceful mass protest, and the Jarrow March.

The whole Eastwick community is looking forward to our annual fireworks night for school families in November and, of course, the run up to Christmas. The build up is punctuated by our seasonal productions and school fairs. One in the Infant School, at which the children buy presents for their friends and families (escorted by volunteer 'personal shoppers'), and one in the Junior School which happens on a Saturday and to which all Eastwick families are warmly invited.

Eastwick School is proud to be part of The Howard Partnership Trust family, which enables us to collaborate and share best practice amongst all schools in the Trust. There is a commitment to 'bringing out the best' in young people of all abilities and aptitudes, so increasing their life chances. 

Leatherhead and District Local History Society



As local historians prepare for the months ahead, they can look back at the past year as one of major commemorations - above all, the end of World War One in November 1918 and

victory at last in the painfully long battle for women's representation in Parliament. Both featured extensively at the Leatherhead Museum, owned and run by the Leatherhead and District Local History Society at Hampton Cottage in Church Street, Leatherhead. New books were also published on both Little Bookham and Fetcham in the war as well. During Heritage Weekend in September, and amateur company performed "Keep the Homefires Burning" at Leatherhead Institute, a poignant drama about love and loss in 1914-18. It interweaved the story of men in the trenches, nurses in field hospitals, and the loved ones left behind. The same weekend also heard two contrasting talks about women in our neck of the woods. Museum curator, Lorraine Spindler, spoke on The Women of Leatherhead: Suffrage and Struggle 1850-1950. Using oral interviews, photographs, and newspaper accounts, she showed how education, war, romance, household responsibilities, religion, and entertainment all continue to enhance recognition of women's



roles in society once they had finally been given the vote.


Very different was Bookham Historian, Judith Witter's talk at the Pastoral Centre, St Nicolas Church on 'Mary Chrystie (1838-1911), benefactor, property developer temperance activist. Mary was one of the district's most remarkable women, whose activities and development of property made a major contribution to the appearance of the local villages we know today. Monthly lectures arranged by the L&DLHS at the Leatherhead Institute have previously included author Alice Graysharp, who revealed what happened when her mother, Edith Tompkins, was evacuated from London to Leatherhead as a child during WWII. Her lecture, "Out of the Frying Pan", followed the recent publication of her book, "The Keeping of Secrets" about a working class girl who experienced the shock of life in a largely rural society, while Britain endured bombings and massive social disruption.

In January, Tony Matthew's presentation on the extraordinary historical owners of Cherkely Court, the massive country estate now known as Beaverbrook on the edge of Leatherhead district. These people all left their mark locally in very different ways, whether philanthropic, popular, or controversial. Abraham Dixon, founder of the Leatherhead Institute and supporter of local education, could hardly have been a sharper contrast with Max Aitken, the media magnate and politician, who became Lord Beaverbrook and gave his name to the exclusive luxury hotel today.

Our monthly talks start at 8:00pm in the Leatherhead Institute with coffee served from 7:30pm. Entrance is just £2 per person. The Museum closes in December until April 2019, but next year's temporary exhibitions may include fashion through the ages, artistic representations of the local area, and a special

tribute to local historian Goff Powell - whose recent death sadly meant the loss of one of the history society's best loved and most active figures. For more information, please visit our website at www.leatherheadhistory.org.

Southey Court is a development of 33 studio flats and 7 one bed flats, managed by Clarion Housing Group set in lovely wooded grounds. These have been designed for over 50s Independent Living. The flats are serviced by a manager who is not on-site, but covers office hours and at present, 7-days a week. There is a Centra pull cord in all of the flats, and communal areas which are covered 24/7 for all concerns, repairs, or emergencies.

This is a wonderful place to live, as it has a safe, happy community for working, retired, or semi-retired people that are either isolated or in need of safe accomodation that provides a bit extra. We offer a 7-day week meal service, and the meals are cooked freshly once a day. We use local suppliers from the village of Bookham. There is a laundry and hair salon on site.

The Social Committee arrange entertainment throughout the year, and often there are exercise classes, a church service or a tea party going on in the communal lounge. We have community eyesight testing, and visits from other agencies to help support anybody that has mobility or health issues. You do not need to sell a property, or be homeless to rent here. Vacancies are always available and there is no waiting list.

Have you ever tried to tackle a challenging piece of work when you were angry, sad, hungry, or feeling sluggish? It's pretty hard to focus, isn't it? One of the things we value most about Polesden Lacey Infant School is that the school understands that the health and wellbeing of the children has a big impact on their ability to learn and reach their potential both in the classroom and beyond. A word often used to describe the school among the parent community is 'nurturing' and – thanks to an incredibly thoughtful and balanced

curriculum – we mean the minds, bodies and souls of our children.

As well as a fantastic art programme, weekly singing, and regular Forest School sessions, the staff has this term begun to embed a mindfulness programme, having successfully trialled these techniques over the previous year following training from Surrey County Council's Schools' Mind Up Programme. When your 5 year old comes back from school telling you what the amygdala, hippocampus, and prefrontal cortex do - it really makes you sit up and listen. We were shown how to do a 'Mindful Minute', which we now use at home when someone needs to feel calmer. Mindfulness is a hot topic, because research shows it can help to prevent or overcome mental health problems, and with the worrying rise in mental health issues for young people, it's wonderful that our children have the chance to start practising it from such an early age.

From a healthy mind to healthy eating, when it comes to food, Polesden Lacey Infant School quite literally offers the gold standard! The ever cheerful and much-loved school cook serves up the Surrey Schools' 'Gold' Menu,

which includes organic or Red-Tractor assured meat and locally-sourced vegetables, not to mention her delicious homemade bread and moreish shortbread biscuits. Each year, the Rabbit (Reception) parents and carers are invited to join their children for lunch in the school hall. It is such a treat for the mums, dads and other carers to get a rare insight into their little one's days and have the opportunity to taste the healthy food that the children come home raving about.

And alongside all that wholesome food, there are also ample opportunities to get active, which as we know helps us to keep our brains, as well as our bodies healthy. The school has long taken part in the Mile Run initiative, but this term staff and pupils have really pushed themselves to new levels by supporting the latest challenge of 51-year old Nikki Love, who ran 750 miles around Ireland to raise money for charity while inspiring schoolchildren to keep active and find their own physical and mental strength. Rainbow Playgroup



We had a very busy summer last term at Rainbow Playgroup. Along with getting ready for Village Day and preparing for our leavers for their transition to school, we celebrated the royal wedding by having a tea/street style party. The children spent the week before the wedding making flags, reading books about the royal family, and discussing why royal weddings are significant events. One of the favourite activities of the week was making scones - and of course, eating them in our snack bar with jam, cream, and strawberries! The week culminated with a traditional tea party, where the children sat along a long table, waved their

flags, and enjoyed some lovely treats.

The summer term saw us preparing our 4 year olds for the big changes that starting school entails. In order to get our children 'school ready', we invited them to our Rising Fives sessions. These two-hour afternoon sessions happen once a week throughout the last half of the summer term, usually 6/7 sessions. We focus on helping the children develop skills which will aid their independence and familiarise them with the routines of the school day. For example, having a packed lunch, getting ready for PE, and sitting at a table to focus on more structured activities. The activities this year included watching caterpillars turn into butterflies (and setting them free), making mini beasts, planting and measuring growth of bean plants - all of which was recorded by the children into their individual plant diaries with the help of experienced staff. Our sessions have been held for a few years now and we have noticed how they ease the transition to school and prepare them for life in receptions class.



The autumn term finds us busy developing our work in our varied outdoor environments, and supporting our new children to settle well. We work closely with children and their families, helping new children adjust to preschool life, so that over time every child feels confident and happy to come to playgroup.

The Arts Society Bookham



The Society has continued to thrive throughout the hot summer, despite no meeting in August. We did visit Frogmore House, following a Thames River cruise downstream from Maidenhead to Windsor.

The House, just half a mile from Windsor Castle is still very much used by the Royal Family - and only occasionally open to the public. We were very fortunate to have a private tour of the property so steeped in the history of Kings and Queens from the 17th century to the present day!

The month before we visited another Castle, Deal Castle; with its ancient battlements defending Britain from all who may have wished us ill. But it was not just castles this summer, in June TAS Bookham viewed a very much humbler establishment, the Clergy House at Alfriston. Built in the 14th century it was bought in 1895, the first property purchased by the recently founded National Trust, for just £10.00! The oak leaf logo, now synonymous with the NT, is copied from a carving found in a corner of the cornice in the



main room. The name of the carpenter is unknown, but his work lives on and will remain the emblem of this national organisation for years to come.

TAS Bookham is rightly renowned for its monthly lectures, and our recent programme was no exception. They included talks on the architecture of Surrey, seen through the 'eyes' of Nikolaus Pevsner from his 1960s travels around the county, and in July a sparkling lecture on an appreciation of Seaside Piers – just in time for those contemplating a visit with bucket and spade!

2018 will continue with the final lecture of the year in November devoted to 'Giles: his Life, Time and Cartoons'. The endlessly amusing characters, including the ruling matriarchal Granny, will be presented by Barry Venning from the Open University. To round off the year, our popular Christmas lunch will be held, followed by a talk 'Taste of Mrs Beeton's Cookbook' by Annie Gray.

2019 will begin on an historic theme, with a study of foreign artists in London in the 16th and 17th centuries, and their influence on British art. To follow this, we shall be looking at the work of the French sculptor Auguste Rodin, perhaps best known in England for "The Burghers of Calais", and highly influential in the world of modern sculpture. March sees a contrasting theme with pageantry and the River Thames.

Angela Stevens is the Heritage Volunteer Representative for East Surrey, and in this role she has been exploring the possibility of recording the library at West Horsley Place. There are in excess of 10,000 books left on the



shelves, following 7,000 going to Trinity College. All of these need to be recorded and training for the task will be provided by the Arts Society. If you are interested do please contact craigirstevens@aol.com.






