Preparatory work is still proceeding in connection with the Spring and Summer outdoor programme but we have the following in mind:-

#### ROYSTON PIKE LECTURES

14th December 1978 The last of this series is on "Brooklands Motor Course" by ANDREW CHILD and DUDLEY GAHAGAN of the Brooklands Society. The lecture is in the King George's Hall, Esher, 8 p.m. Admission free.

#### MOLE VALLEY EVENING INSTITUTE

In our last Newsletter we promised further details of the lectures deferred until the winter term. Unfortunately, at the September enrolment, only two persons registered and the Committee have decided that the course would not be allowed to proceed unless at least twelve persons had made a firm enrolment. We will consider this subject again for 1979/1980.

Two courses, each lasting ten weeks, beginning February/March 1979 could be of great interest to our members.

Course PA 982 "DOING HISTORY", Fee £8. Highly practical, showing how to go about historical writing and research. This is for home study and there are three radio and three television programmes associated with this course. There is a project in which students are encouraged to make an historical study of some aspect of their own locality.

Course PA 984 "INDUSTRIAL ARCHAEOLOGY", Fee £8. An introduction to the field of Industrial Archaeology again for home study in conjunction with three television Programmes. Each of the above courses include three computer-marked assignments and the successful completion of two leads to the award of a Letter of Course Completion (Short Course). DIPLOMA IN ARCHAEOLOGICAL PRACTICE Details of this diploma, consisting of seven separate certificates, can be obtained if desired through the Council for British Archaeology. The first examinations take place in the Summer of 1979 - courses are available. The registration fee is £15. and the cost of examination in each certificate is £15. (except Excavation Techniques £25.).

COMMITTEE CHANGES

We regret to have received a letter of resignation from Mr. William MILLAR who has served us with distinction, but feels that retirement is now called for. We well understand his point of view and are deeply grateful to him for his long service.

Your Secretary has also indicated to the Committee that at the A.G.M. 1979 he will have served five years and would welcome a replacement. It has been a very interesting and satisfying task but with two children still at home and a regular 1½ hour working day he finds it increasingly difficult to meet deadlines, and is afraid that this may lead to inefficiency and a poor image for the Society.
