VICE-PRESIDENTS

Alan Christian - From Mr L A Smith

News of the death of Alan Christian in October must have come as a great shock to the many members of the Society who knew him, especially to those of us who had the privilege of working with him on the restoration of Hampton Cottage.

Shortly after he retired from his job as an Insurance Surveyor, Alan's eyesight began to fail and it was not possible for him to accept the job of supervising the restoration works, but throughout the whole period from the purchase of the property by the Society until shortly before his death, he was a regular attender, helping the work along in whatever way he could.

Always cheerful and ever helpful, Alan was the person we all looked to for many small services and he kept us all properly organised at all times. His contribution was invaluable, not least of all in the later stages when he advised us on security measures and we feel that we have lost a part of ourselves because he was so much a part of the team.

Our sympathies go out to his widow, Muriel, and to their family.

John Ludford - From Mr J Parry

We had the pleasure of knowing John Ludford since he became a member in 1949. He died in November, aged 65, and our sympathy is extended to his wife, Margaret.

John was born in Leatherhead and attended Dorking Grammar School. During the war he drove an ambulance as a volunteer driver, and took a degree from London University in his spare time. After the war, he joined the firm of Hart Scales & Hodges (Solicitors) in Leatherhead, eventually becoming a Partner of that firm. He was also Clerk of United Charities, which runs almshouses in Church Walk, Leatherhead. Well known and well respected by everyone, he will be very greatly missed.

MUSEUM

The successful Ashtead Potters exhibition remained on view until the end of September (even now many examples of their work are on almost permanent display) and has been followed by an exhibition showing by way of many reproductions of old paintings, etchings and photographs, the changes that have occurred in and around St Nicolas Church, Great Bookham - this has been staged by Stephen Fortescue. A brief display, in the middle room, of samples of the Eastwick School, Bookham, projects was followed by the story of the Polesden Lacey Open Air Theatre, and this in turn has now been succeeded by John Blair's "Early Leatherhead", based on his new Occasional Paper.

The Museum will again close for the winter months - that is, from just before Christmas until the beginning of April, and already the exhibitions for next year are being planned and will probably include one of the Natural History of the area. Why not take on the production of one dealing with a local subject that particularly interests you - transport, a stately home, a favourite family? Or a local craft or industry? ARCHAEOLOGY

Our Archaeological Secretary, Mr E A Crossland, has been very busy recently, both in Hampton Cottage and around. He has sent us the following report:

"Hampton Cottage Garden

The two trenches on the outside of the well have now been filled and John Wall informed. He has undertaken to tell Mr Wicks, so that the paving stones can be laid. When that has been done and a firm foundation put around the top of the well, I shall be able to arrange for lifting gear to be erected in preparation for digging out the rest of the filling.

As a result of my membership of the Surrey Archaeological Society's Excavation Liaison Committee, I have been in contact with Reg Wood, who is in effect the SAS well expert. He has seen the well and thinks it could be contemporary with the cottage. If he is not using it himself, he may be able to let me have some gear for working inside the well. In any case he will advise me on how to proceed and will probably assist with the digging.

Also through the SAS ELC, I have sent to John Janaway of Godalming, samples of the beer bottle pieces from the filling, as he has considerable knowledge of the bottle manufacturing industry and may be able to date the bottles for me. Tentatively he agrees with me that this is likely to be the end of the 19th century.

In December I am to visit a retired building worker with a lifetime experience of well digging and repair.

Another item may be of interest to members - not, however, from a source within the Society's area, though near by. When walking through Sheepleas, West Horsley, earlier this year, I found on the footpath a worked flint which has been established as a Neolithic end scraper. The find spot is approximately one kilometre due west of a flint working floor excavated by Commander Todd in 1949 and reported in SAC Vol. 51, page 142, and Vol. 52, Page 11. (Incidentally, the index to Volumes 39 to 66 wrongly describe the site as a Neolithic flint MINE, due no doubt to the report also describing the excavation at the same time of an adjacent medieval flint mine.) Perhaps the tool could be put on exhibition in the Museum until such time as we can show flint tools from within our area."

Mr Crossland has also been doing some interesting research at Givons Grove, in a property belonging to Mr Letts, the garden of which is bounded on the east side by a public footpath from Mickleham to Leatherhead. Mr Crossland will be returning to this site a little later, and we hope then to have a full report of his findings.

RECORDS

The Ashtead Family of Aubrey

The Society has received an enquiry regarding the Aubrey family. Volume 1, Number 6 of the Proceedings states on Page 3 that "Work has been done on the histories of the following Ashtead families, and information on them has been collected from various sources: (a) The Aubreys, 1272-1409".

The four other names are not in alphabetical order, so it might be assumed that the Aubrey research ranked highest in the writer's estimation, but unfortunately no trace of this can be found in the Society's records.

Only two other brief mentions of the family are recorded on the Society's index cards. The first refers to John, son of Richard Aubrey of Ehstede, granting 10d annually to the House of Scholars, c.1270 (Merton College Oxford, Calendar of Deeds, Surrey, 655). The second is taken from "Chertsey Cartularies", Surrey Record Society XII, Vol. II, page 2, page 370, and mentions Richard Aubrey, Juror, 1333.

Please advise the Record Secretary (David Bruce, 7 Fox Lane, Little Bookham, telephone Bookham 58722) of any information you may have concerning this family, or of the whereabouts of the above-mentioned research documents.

LEATHERHEAD HISTORY

Mrs Linda Heath, who is researching for the Leatherhead History project, has sent this appeal for information:

"I should be extremely grateful for any information about the following items in connection with the history of the schools in Leatherhead:

1. Any information from anyone who attended or knows anyone connected with the British School, behind the old Congregational Church in North Street, in the rooms used for the Sunday School.
2. Any information from anyone who attended the National School for Boys in Highlands Road; the National School for Girls in Poplar Road; or the Infant

School on Gravel Hill, Upper Fairfield Road.

- 3. Any information on any of the private schools which used to exist in Leatherhead, eg either references to them, or prospectus forms or advertisements.
- 4. Any possible source of information for the assertion in Pigots Dictionary of 1832-1839 that there was a free school in Leatherhead for 10 boys, founded and endowed in 1596. I can find no authority for this anywhere else.

If anyone can help with any of these matters, I should be most grateful."

RAILWAYS

Railways have certainly been "in the news" recently.

Members - particularly those who travel by British Rail through Leatherhead Station - will be interested to know that, through the efforts of Mr James, the Stationmaster, Leatherhead Railway Station has been listed as a building of historic interest.

And secondly, at the Society's meeting on 13 November, Mr Crawforth gave a fascinating talk on the Surrey Iron Railway which cam into being in 1801. This was the horse-drawn goods train which ran from Wandsworth to Croydon, with a spur line to Hackbridge, and later on through to Merstham and Redhill. To a mere woman, the engineering system for the track looked highly unsafe! But as the train travelled only at the walking pace of a horse, it obviously managed to survive and carry its goods until the winding up of the railway in about 1876. Mr Crawforth's slides to illustrate his lecture must have taken him many years of research and photography - he is indeed a dedicated railwayman.
